Grain Prices Head Downhill

CHICAGO (AP)—Prices of commodities on the board of trade took off in different directions Wednesday. Grains went down while soybeans and lard went up. The divergence in trends didn't develop until about mid-day in the session. Until then, the whole market had acted quite firm, although soybeans easily were outdistancing everything else. From mid-day on wheat led a slow retreat in all grains. Wheat closed 3/4-1/4 lower, corn 1/4-3/4 lower, oats 1/4-1/2 lower, rye 1/4-3/4 lower, soybeans 1 3/4-4 1/4 higher and lard 7 to 20 cents a hundred pounds higher.

Stock Market to Close Saturdays

NEW YORK (AP)—Major stock and commodity markets embark on a summer operating schedule this week-end that will see most closed on Saturdays until the first Saturday in October. Prominent exceptions to Saturday closing will be the Chicago Board of Trade and the Winnipeg Grain Exchange, which will work as usual throughout the summer on Saturdays.

Rail Stocks Step Ahead

NEW YORK (AP)—Railroad stocks stepped ahead smartly Wednesday but the rest of the stock market lagged. Advances in rails were a steady influence during most of the session but they couldn't pull other groups ahead with them. The gains in the rail group ran from fractions to around a point with Seaboard Air Line up three points at 93 1/4 to provide the top performance. The volume ran to 1,130,000 shares.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks dropped a dime at \$103-40, with the industrial group down 70 cents and the utilities off 20 cents. The rail group, however, advanced 80 cents at \$80.40 to a new 1952 high.
