Death Claims S. Thompson After Illness

Seth B. Thompson, Oregon State Insurance Commissioner and fire marshal from 1940 to 1949, died Wednesday in San Francisco, friends in Salem learned Thursday.

Death followed an illness of about nine months. He was 57. Thompson, who was appointed Insurance Commissioner and fire marshal March 1, 1940 by Gov. Charles A. Sprague, left that post July 1, 1949 to assume the job of vice president of Western Life Insurance Co. in San Francisco. He had made his home there since then.

Private funeral services will be held in San Francisco. He leaves his widow, Mrs. Louise Thompson, to whom he was married Feb. 19, 1907; two sons, Seth B. Jr. of Portland and David M. of Palo Alto, and four grandchildren.

A graduate of Stanford University, Thompson was born in Saratoga, N. Y., and went through public school in Montana. He entered the life insurance business in San Francisco in 1906 and came to Oregon in 1923 as general agent for the Penn Mutual Life Insurance Co. in Portland, a position which he retained until named to the state post in 1940.

He was a past president of the Life Managers Association and Life Underwriters Association; member of several Portland business and social organizations, and a past master of Imperial Lodge 150, A.F. & A.M. in Portland.

Train Strikes Truck; Driver Hospitalized

The second vehicle-passenger train collision in two days along North 12th Street sent a 22-year-old Milwaukee man to the hospital with cuts and bruises.

Tom Morgan was injured when he was thrown from the cab of a truck and trailer rig when it was struck by the southbound Cascade Thursday night at 12th and Marion streets.

The truck was badly damaged, but the trailer, which was carrying produce, was only jarred, police said. Morgan was going west on Marion Street, he told police, and had just moved out on to the tracks when he heard the train whistle.

He was taken to Salem General Hospital for treatment, and released.

Wednesday, a Salem man, U. H. Peterson, of 535 N. Winter St., escaped from his car just before it was hit by the Klamath at 12th and Center Streets.

In another accident Thursday, a 10-year-old boy, Arthur Winter of 960 N. 15th St., was slightly injured when he was hit by a car in the 1500 block of D Street. First aidmen treated him and took him home. Driver of the car was Ben B. F. Evans of 396 N. 23rd St.

Salem-Dallas Road Carries Most Traffic

The Salem-Dallas Highway in West Salem carries more traffic than Highway 99E south of Brooks, the State Highway Department reported Thursday.

A recently completed survey by the department shows a daily average of 10,000 cars on the Salem-Dallas Highway in West Salem about 1,100 more than used the Pacific Highway daily south of Brooks. An average of 8,000 vehicles travel the highway between West Salem and the Independence cutoff, surveys showed.

Traffic along the entire highway from West Salem to Rickrealt is about twice what the road was designed for, the highway department said. With the completion of the Marion Street bridge, traffic on the highway will probably increase, making it paramount to widen and straighten the entire highway.

Highway department officials said a two-lane roadway as crooked and antiquated as the Salem-Dallas road should not carry a load exceeding a daily average of 3,000 vehicles. No other road, in comparable conditions, they said, bears such an excessive load.

The Salem-Dallas highway follows the course of an old country road laid out almost a century ago. In 1919 the road was paved and in 1934 widened and in some places slightly realigned. No major improvements have been undertaken since.

Broader Atom Weapons Plan Asked by HST

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman asked Congress Thursday to vote more than three and a half billion dollars to beef up the nation's atomic weapons program.

He said the money would provide for a "major further expansion" over a five-year period.

"The national security and the security of the free world," Truman said in letters to congressional leaders, "demand that we maintain and increase our leadership in this field."

"Not to do so invites disaster," the President gave no details of the projected \$3,410,000,000 expansion, saying only that it would "provide greater capacity for the production of fissionable materials and for the fabrication of such materials into atomic weapons."

The Atomic Energy Commission declined to elaborate except to say that the program embraces one Ohio river valley plant which it has announced is under consideration.

Presumably, however, any such major expansion would speed up additions to the U. S. stockpile of conventional A-bombs and would also permit greater speed in the development or production of such weapons as atomic artillery, nuclear-powered submarines and aircraft, and the fearsome hydrogen bomb.

Truman gave an indication of the importance which he attaches to the effort by the AEC and the Navy to hurry to completion the world's first atomic-powered submarine, which officials hope will be a working reality within two years or less.

Military specialists have said that, named the "Nautilus," will revolutionize the art of undersea warfare by making it possible to maneuver under water at greater speeds and for much longer periods than with subs powered by conventional engines.

A 16-year-old Salem girl was placed in custody of juvenile authorities Thursday following her arrest by police at Salem High School charged with larceny of an automobile.

The larceny complaint was signed by Duane Kottke, 995 Alberta Drive, owner of the car alleged to have been stolen by the girl from the high school parking lot last Tuesday. The car was returned to the lot the same afternoon.

The girl, and five other juveniles, was arrested last Oct. 3 on the same charge.

Pearson to Go East To Sign Bonus Bonds

State Treasurer Walter J. Pearson and his chief deputy, Fred H. Paulus, will go to New York City early in June to sign 46 million dollars worth of state veteran bonus bonds.

They will spend three days signing the bonds, which will enable the state bonus division to begin paying the bonus about July 1.
