Chilling and Filling

Iced Soups, French Favorite Make Good Hot Day Food for Americans

"Let's cool off with a nice bowl of soup." Sounds a bit odd, but actually chilled soup is an excellent (and fashionable) food and good for summer time.

Our trusty French cookbook comes to our aid again as usual, providing more iced soups than we could ever use in one story. Most are vegetable soups and all sound mighty good. There is iced leek and potato soup, cold chicken custard, iced chicken and curry soup, iced borscht, chilled broccoli, cream of cucumber, Jerusalem artichoke, asparagus, pea and curry and iced tomato soup.

Borscht is definitely not of French origin but, just because it is Russian is no sign it isn't one of the best of soups and can't be among the French dishes. The iced version is new to us, though the hot is not.

ICED BORSCHT
4 cups strong beef stock
1 bunch beets, grated
2 tablespoons tomato paste
2 bay leaves
3 beaten egg whites
Grated rind 1 lemon
Salt, cayenne, pepper
5 tablespoons sour cream
Add beets, tomato paste, bay leaves and egg whites to stock. Beat over fire until it comes to a cool, then draw aside and stand 10 minutes. Pour through damp cloth and let stand in refrigerator until cold. Serve with cream that has been combined with salt, pepper and lemon rind.
With asparagus in the markets, it is reasonable to serve in soup.

ICED ASPARAGUS SOUP
1 pound asparagus
1 bunch sliced scallions
Salt and pepper
2 tablespoons rice flour
2 cups water
Withhold about 4 asparagus spears, and slice remaining. Add scallions (green onions) and add 4 to 5 tablespoons water. Cook slowly until soft. Stir rice flour (or cornstarch) in water, season and add to soup. Let boil up, rub through sieve and let chill. Add cream. Garnish with remaining asparagus tips which have been cooked and chilled.

A canned food manufacturer thinks so much of iced soup that he puts a 10-page booklet on the subject. The borscht includes a can of beets, half cup minced onion, a can of undiluted condensed consommé, a cup of water, salt, 6 tablespoons vinegar and ½ cup sour cream.
Beets are chopped added to their own juice, onion, consommé and water. They are heated thoroughly but not boiled, seasoned and vinegar is added, chilled and served with cream.

JELLIED MADRILENE
¼ teaspoon unflavored gelatine
1 tablespoon cold water
1 10¼-ounce can condensed consommé
½ cup tomato juice
Softest gelatine in water. Heat tomato juice to boiling; dissolve gelatine in it. Add to consommé and chill until firm. Stir once or twice while chilling. Makes 1½ cups.
