

Jefferson Man Wins Bronze Star in Korea

A Bronze Star for heroism and two promotions were granted mid-Willamette Valley soldiers serving with the 40th Infantry Division in Korea, according to news releases.

M. Sgt. Daniel L. Kolke, son of Mrs. Irene Moore of Jefferson, won the Bronze Star medal for action on March 23, when his patrol was ambushed by the enemy. His citation reads that Kolke was "responsible for building and delivering a base of fire on the enemy positions and directing the successful evacuation of two wounded men."

"Although wounded himself, Sergeant Kolke continued to direct and inspire his men, until through his efforts the enemy force was turned back," the citation continued, lauding the soldier's display of fearless action and accurate thinking in the face of the enemy "as responsible for the success of the mission."

Kolke is a platoon sergeant with Company I, 223rd Infantry Regiment.

The promotions, both to sergeant, were gained by William J. Bernard, son of Mr. and Mrs. P. A. Bernard, St. Paul, member of Company I, 224th Infantry Regiment; and Thomas H. Geck, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Geck, Mt. Angel, member of Tank Company, 223rd Regiment. Both men entered the Army in October, 1950.

The 40th, a Southern California month of training in the U. S. Korea early this year after 16 National Guard outfit, arrived in and Japan. It has been holding a sector south of Kumsong.

Flare in Sky Believed to Be Meteorite

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP) — A spectacular flare in the midnight sky, followed by trailers characteristic of an exploded meteorite, was reported from a wide area early Friday.

Airmen gave the most vivid description of the 12:36 a.m. phenomenon.

"It seemed to explode right alongside me and scared my pants off," said Capt. Mickey Milliken, who was flying from Victoria to Vancouver for Trans-Canada Airlines.

Ken St. John, who was in the Vancouver Airport tower, described it in his log as "a bright orange object with a greenish halo . . . very bright . . . seemed to be a meteorite."

John Cordell, a United Air Lines pilot who was about 25 miles south of the Canadian-United States border, said the flash lighted up the cockpit with "a brilliant bluish light. I saw the tail as it burned out. I have seen longer trails behind meteorites but never such a brilliant flash."

A few people in the Seattle area, 100 miles south of the border, reported seeing a distant flash.

Boys' School Trio Back in Custody Again

Three boys who escaped from the MacLaren School for Boys in Woodburn last Monday were back in a segregation ward of the institution Friday, Superintendent James Lamb reported.

The three stole a car belonging to T. C. Gorman, a Woodburn justice of the peace after their escape from the school, and one of the boys, Carl H. New, 16, was captured when they drove to McMinnville. The other two ran into the brush and eluded capture but were caught by authorities in McMinnville when they attempted to burglarize a restaurant there, Lamb reported.

The two were Donald Holvert and Albert H. Steeprow, both 18 years of age. Lamb indicated that there was still a matter of decision pending on whether a charge of larceny of an auto would be filed.

"This should stand as an example," Lamb stated Friday night, "of the crying need for an intermediate institution to take care

Atomic Ash Offers Way to Sterilize Food

NEW YORK (AP) — Radioactive ashes of the atomic age promise cheap sterilizing of foods, drugs, and other uses, says Paul J. Lovewell of the Stanford, Calif., Research Institute.

These ashes are atoms formed as by-products when uranium atoms split in atomic ovens. The ashes now are just a headache. They must be removed to prevent the chain-reaction fire in the ovens from being smothered. They give off dangerous rays, though, and millions of gallons of radioactive waste solutions now are being stored for safety in underground tanks.

They probably can be put to use, Lovewell writes in Scientific American, describing a Stanford study made at request of the Atomic Energy Commission. The rays could sterilize foods so meats, fish and dairy products might be packaged and stored without refrigeration. Fruits and vegetables might be preserved longer. Foods might be irradiated before canning, sterilizing without heating.

Some drugs now are sterilized by heat, but the atomic rays might do this job, too. They could inspect metals, with X-rays, to find internal flaws, or aid the hunt for new chemicals and synthetics, Lovewell writes.

The potency and quantity of rays available from the radioactive ion, now costs \$15,000 to \$20,000. ashes is amazing. One gram of radium, giving one curie of radiation, but one curie of radiation from the atomic ashes would cost from a few cents to a few dollars.

Problems of processing and safe handling of the atomic ashes probably can be solved, Lovewell said.

Sheep to Test Atom's Power In Next Blast

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Sheep will be used to test, as nearly as possible, human reaction to an atom blast when the next explosion in the spring series is set off, probably Sunday.

A thousand troops, advancing immediately into the central blast area from foxholes further away than the animals, also will participate.

Details of the maneuver were given newsmen by Brig. Gen. Harry P. Stork, in charge of the Army's phase of the tests.

Stork was asked if animals would be used under fire, and authorized the following direct quote only if used in its entirety:

"Since we are using a limited number of sheep because we want to learn, in advance of any possible wartime use of the atom bomb, the blast, thermal and radiation effects of any atomic explosion on humans cannot expose humans to any practical tests, we are using the warm-blooded animal most available and closely resembling a human being. The use of these sheep will undoubtedly result in the saving of American lives if the atomic bomb is ever used in the vicinity of our troops in wartime."

The sheep are handled as humanely as possible and receive the same care and protection that would be available to soldiers under similar conditions. After the blast they are given priority attention by our veterinarian who is a member of the control group, the first group to approach Ground Zero area after the shot."
