

More Oregon Cities Go on Daylight Time

McMinnville and Hood River go on daylight saving time Sunday. That makes 16 Oregon counties seats now on fast time.
Most of the Yamhill County towns, including Dayton, Amity, Willamina and Sheridan, will go along with McMinnville in changing the clock.
In Hood River County Odell and Parkdale are expected to go along with the city of Hood River. Cascade Locks earlier advanced its time.
In Multnomah, Washington, Clackamas and Columbia Counties practically all the towns have made the shift. Linn is one of the counties where some towns followed the county seat in changing time, but some did not.
The county seats on daylight time: Burns, Portland, Hillsboro, Oregon City, Astoria, McMinnville, Eugene, Roseburg, St. Helens, Albany, Corvallis, Hood River, Bend, Prineville, Klamath Falls and Lakeview. (List of daylight time cities on page 16).

Extra-Heavy Fuses Pose Fire Hazard

Use of unnecessarily large fuses in electrical systems is probably the most common fire hazard people unknowingly have in their homes.
Such is the conclusion of the Salem fire department, currently conducting an extensive home fire inspection program, which eventually will include every residence in the city.
Inspector Alden J. Addie, who is doing the inspecting, says people generally do not realize that a 15 ampere fuse is sufficient for most houses. In many cases, fuse boxes have everything for a 15 to 30 ampere fuse doing the job only a 15 should be doing.
In line with this, he says, is the lack of attention shown to extension and appliance cords. Nearly every home has frayed cords, with wires dangerously exposed. Many of these cords, he says, are draped over nails, curtain rods and other objects which make perfect conductors of electricity.
These are two of the most common hazards. But there are others.

Rubbish is often found piled in corners, on stairways, in yards, basements and attics. They provide perfect material for flames, in addition to that, rubbish, toys and household equipment scattered on stairs hamper firemen who must fight fires.
It is Addie's job to go through a house with its occupant, pointing out to him what constitutes a fire hazard and how it can be eliminated.
On the report which he leaves with the occupant, is listed the condition of the outside area, heating units, electrical wiring, appliances, chimneys, smoke pipes, fuel storage, flammable liquids, waste material, and any other hazards. When necessary, Addie adds any remarks to the bottom of the sheet which he feels is necessary.
"Many times elimination of the problem means an extensive expenditure of money, like rewiring of the house," Addie says. "Even if the people can't have that done, knowing that the wiring system is faulty will cause them to take greater care in using electricity."
He has found it necessary to explain to many persons such apparently little known facts as refrigerators being a major source of fires. The motors become dirty, get clogged up, perhaps need lubrication and become overheated, he explains.

Sometimes he has shown people how to use appliances so that electrical systems aren't overloaded. Often he has discovered flammable liquids in adequate cans but without tops, allowing the vapors to escape.
"Nine times out of ten it is the vapor which burns, not the fluid," Addie reported, "but few of the people I've talked to realize that."
Credit for the program goes primarily to Chief William P. Roble and Fire Marshal Ellsworth L. Smith, who have been working out plans for the home fire inspection for some time.
Salem never before has had a regular inspection of this type. By law, any business, or dwelling beyond the classification of a duplex, must submit to periodic fire inspections. But home inspection is a different matter.
"It is something in which the public must cooperate if any good is to result," Roble said. "Because Salem is an old city, with many homes which were built 25, 30 and 50 years ago, fire is an ever-constant problem. Through fire inspection of this type we can eliminate much of the possibility of disastrous fires."
Although eventually he or someone will reach every home in Salem, Addie will inspect the home of any person at any time during the day if contact is made with him through the fire department.

Catholics Ban Works of Gide

VATICAN CITY (AP) — All the literary works of the late Andre Gide, Nobel Prize-winning French writer, were placed on the Roman Catholic Church's index of forbidden books Saturday.
Accompanying the Latin decree, which forbids all Catholics to read Gide's writings, was a front-page condemnation of the author in the Vatican newspaper L'Osservatore Romano. The newspaper accused him of living a non-Christian—even anti-Christian—life.
Gide is considered one of France's greatest modern men of letters. He was awarded the Nobel Prize for literature in 1947.
His works shocked and tantalized two generations of readers throughout the world by their unabashed discussion of homosexuality, lust, theft and murder—all written in a style considered by many as the classic of the present day.
Gide was reared as a Protestant.

Presbyterian Group Forms Unification Bid

ALBANY, Ore. (AP)—The United Presbyterian Church laid the groundwork Saturday for uniting with two other Presbyterian denominations next year.
Commissioners at the 94th general assembly of the church approved the proposal to join with the Presbyterian Church U.S. and the Presbyterian Church U.S. A. The combined membership of these bodies would be about 3 1/2 million.
The proposal is expected to come up for final action by the general assemblies of all three denominations next year.
The board of administration also reported, noting that contributions totaled \$9,054,836 in the last fiscal year, an average of \$41.60 per member.

The missionary budget for the coming year was set at \$1,400,000, about the same as this year.
Special church services will be held Sunday at Oakville, where the first of the United Presbyterian churches was formed in 1852. Oakville is eight miles southwest of here.
CHERRYVILLE, Mo. (AP) — The Rev. J. J. Ivie, who says he has gone without food for 41 days, took exception Saturday to news accounts saying he is fasting in hopes of bringing about a spiritual revival against sin and Communism.
He sent one of his six sons to nearby Steelville with the copy of a note explaining his fast. It said: "I am seeking the more perfect will of God for my own life and asking God to show me why the signs do not follow my ministry as Jesus said they would.

Jewel Thieves Steal Crowns From Church

NEW YORK (AP)—Nocturnal thieves invoked a two-million-dollar Roman Catholic shrine in Brooklyn and stole two gem-encrusted gold crowns donated by hundreds of women during World War II as an offering to peace.
Church officials, who discovered the theft Saturday, said the two crowns were insured for \$100,000 but their "moral value can not be replaced."
The crowns were embodied in a painting of the Virgin Mary and the Christ Child that hung above and behind the main altar in the Regina Pacis Votive Shrine, which was built and maintained by the St. Rosalia Catholic Church.
Police said the thieves had sawed through a bronze grill surrounding the shrine to reach the glittering crowns, which were hung by hooks over the heads of the Virgin and the Child.
Msgr. Angelo R. Cioffi, pastor of St. Rosalia Church, said the thieves were believed to have hidden Friday in the lower chapel under the shrine and emerged during the night.
The thieves passed up two other jeweled ornaments on the painting—a diamond bracelet on the cuff of the Virgin's robe and a diamond necklace for the collar.
Msgr. Cioffi said the shrine was protected by a burglar alarm system but the thieves apparently had discovered a way to circumvent it because no alarm was sounded.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Allen J. Ellender of Louisiana said Saturday night that Southern Democrats must present their own candidate for the presidency if the party platform endorses a "near-lous" civil rights program.

Making an obvious call for a Dixie bolt from the party under such circumstances, Ellender said: "Ample notice has been served on the Democratic Party that a civil rights plank, very similar to that adopted by the 1948 convention, will perhaps be forced on the party again this year."
"If such happens and this nefarious proposal appears again, then the Democrats of the South can pursue only one course: They must present their own candidate for the presidency."
