Wage Board Curbs Near In Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) - Administration lieutenants in the Senate strove Sunday—but without very much hope—to head off proposed tight curbs on Wage Stabilization Board (WSB) powers.

The issue has overshadowed others in the forthcoming votes on a bill to continue the wage-price controls law.

This measure, properly known as the Defense Production Act, also provides the basis for the government's rent and credit controls, the rationing of scarce materials to industry, and disputed provisions for embargoes on imports of dairy products, rice and peanuts.

The Senate turned down by a 51-18 vote on Thursday a proposal to let the whole wage and price controls section of the law die. It then sidetracked the bill until Wednesday. It then will resume work on the measure under an agreement limiting debate,

with leaders aiming for a vote not later than Thursday.

The House, behind the Senate in considering the issue, has set itself a tight schedule to beat the June 30 deadline when the existing law expires.

The House Banking Committee does not plan to start for another week the actual drafting of its version of a controls law extension.

The two chambers, working through a conference committee, then will attempt to agree on a final draft, with prospects that they will have to step lively to beat the end-of-the-month deadline.

Heirs of Italy King to Regain Royal Property

ROME (AP)—Heirs of the late King Vittorio Emanuele III of Italy Sunday prepared to take over nearly two million dollars worth of property restored to them by the Roman court of appeals.

The King died in exile in Alexandria, Egypt, Dec. 18, 1947. The appeals court announced its decision Friday, ending a long suit aimed by the present Republic of Italy to expropriate the King's personal property.

Female heirs of the late King started the suit in 1949, pointing out that he died three days before the expropriation law was passed. A lower court ruled in favor of the heirs, and the appeals court upheld that decision.

The Italian public treasury estimated the late King's private property in Italy at about 1 billion two hundred million lire (\$1,920,000).

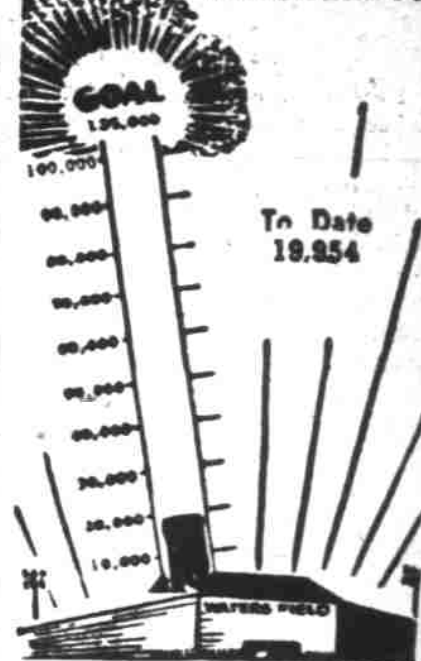
JEWELRY STOLEN

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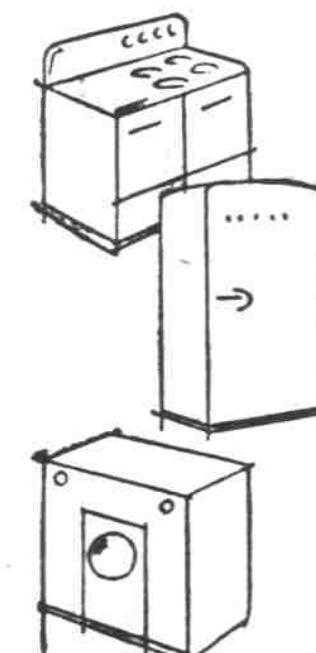
"This crew's on duty for me all the time!"

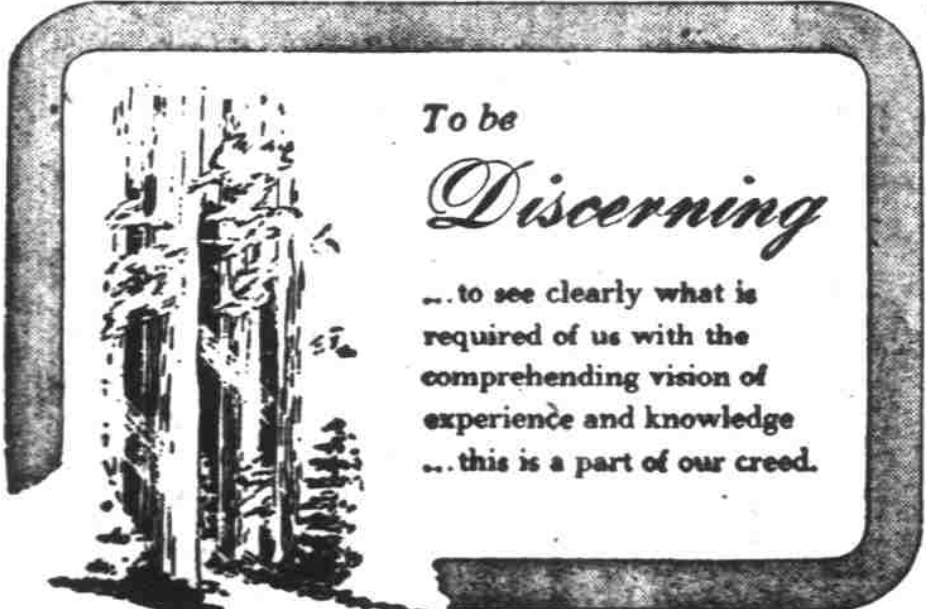
Aye, sir, he works for peanuts, and never gets a decent leave or liberty—but he sure gives the skipper (that's my mom) plenty of liberty.

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
