## Stocks Reach 1952 High on Second Day

NEW YORK (AP)—The second straight new 1952 high was reached Thursday as the stock market with steels and rails showing a rally.

The railroads started the ball rolling forward as the market opened, and the steels took over after the carriers faltered and fell into an irregular price pattern.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks gained 40 cents at \$104.90, the best of the year and equal to Sept. 10, 1930. Previous to that it was the best since June 13, 1930, when the average stood at \$106.70.

Some brokers were beginning to feel that the strong showing of the market in the past two days—in which the AP average of 60 stocks added \$1.80—could well be the start of the traditional summer rally.

With the AP average up 40 cents at \$104.90, the industrial component advanced 80 cents, rails held unchanged, and utilities were up 10 cents.
