Parrish High Principal Sets Eastern Tour

It will be one conference after another for busy schoolman Carl Aschenbrenner, principal of Parrish Junior High School, when he travels in the East June 15-July 5. As a member of the national board of directors of National Education Association, he will serve on the NEA budget committee in Washington, D. C., June 16-17. Then he will visit the Horace Mann experimental school at Columbia University in New York City. Aschenbrenner will participate in an NEA-sponsored workshop on professional standards of teacher education, June 25-28 at Kalamazoo, Mich. From there he goes to the NEA convention, opening in Detroit June 29, as an Oregon Education Association representative.

Damage Suit Grows From Auto Mishap

Suit for \$15,800 damages for injuries allegedly sustained in an accident early this year on the Mt. Angel-Scotts Mills Road was filed Thursday in Marion County Circuit Court. Vera Jell filed the complaint against Clarence F. Pilcher and Martin Lester Treaster, operators of a car with which hers collided Jan. 15. She asks for \$15,000 general damages and for \$800 special damages for expenses incurred as the result of alleged injuries including scalp lacerations, face laceration, cerebral concussion, bruises and shock.

Management Of Resources Urged at Meet

Proper management of the abundant natural resources of the Pacific Northwest will contribute heavily to national solvency and world peace, Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone told Salem Exchange Club Wednesday.

Stone, from Portland, pointed out that the U.S. Forest Service and other agencies each year face the question, "Can we afford conservation?" in their requests to Congress. Declaring that natural resources form the basis of all wealth, he urged "we can't afford to defer or slow up on basic conservation measures."

The forester urged increased timber cutting on federal lands, more planting of denuded areas, thinning of young growth to aid remaining trees, cutting of salvage to help fight decay and insects, strengthening of the Oregon forest practices act to assure planting and to protect immature trees, adding of reclamation areas.

As to more lumbering as an aid to conservation, Stone said that the sustained yield program on national forests and Bureau of Land Management areas would allow a boost from 2 to 2½ billion board feet of cutting yearly in the Northwest. This would ease the drain of overcutting on small holdings, in areas such as Roseburg and Eugene, he asserted.

Also tending to permit such an increase, he said, is the fact that large private holdings are generally being managed properly for sustained yield. The federal agencies have not added to the lumbering as much as desired, however, because of lack of funds and personnel.

All this is needed, Stone urged, to avoid having to build up Northwest resources from the depletion stages reached in much of the Eastern United States. Named to a nominating committee for a June 25 election were Chairman Robert Brownell, Otto Wilson, L. P. Campbell, Kenneth Sherman and Richard Kenneth herbst.

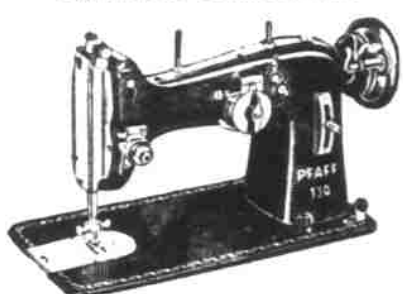
WEDDING ENDS RECORDS

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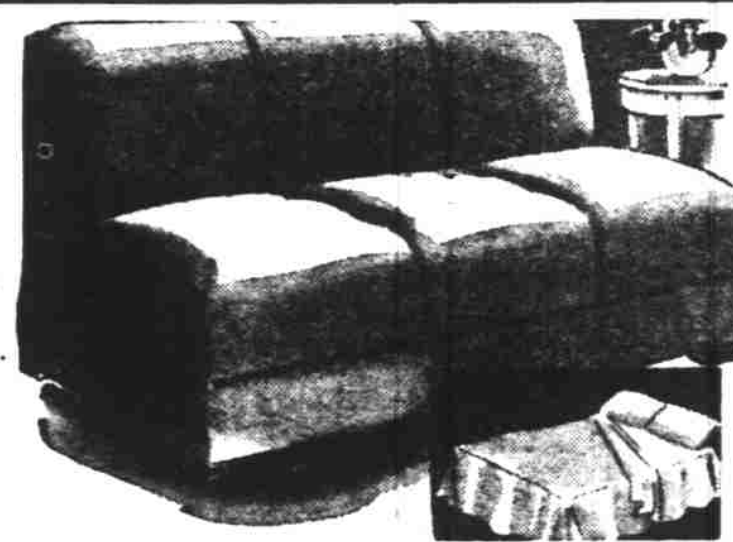
