Far Away Places

Nomadic Tribeswomen in Iran Live Happy Life; Cooking Details Told

Housekeeping details of the nomadic Kashgai tribesmen who live in tents and range from Persian Gulf pastures to windswept highlands in the Zagros Mountains are told by Jean and Franco Shor in the latest number of the National Geographic magazine. The Shors traveled with the tribe for some time as a guest of the Khan and his brother.

Though legal subjects of the Iranian Government, the Kashgais are ruled actually by Khans. Numbering some 100,000 these nomads are on the move almost constantly, but according to the authors, live well and are careful with household details.

ALWAYS BUSY

Men of the family spend much of their days hunting, boys tend sheep and (in some cases) practice their lessons. Women and girls remain at camp and are never idle. Milking goats and ewes in the morning, they make butter and cheese in a primitive manner.

Cheese is made from soured goat's milk and the curd packed in a homespun cloth. The bag is twisted to free the curd from moisture and then is left in a running stream to wash. Later the curd is compressed in small cakes and eaten with bread.

Pots and pans are scrubbed in streams with sand then boiled for several minutes. Milk is covered as it cools, dirt floors are swept several times daily with bunches of twigs.

Culture for the yogurt is brought by the young bride from her mother, and the strains are preserved for generations. A little is saved from each batch to turn into the next bowl of milk.

WEALTH IN SHEEP

Wealth among the tribesmen is counted by the number of sheep and carpets. Women set up looms outside the tents and when chores are finished, the women gather around the looms, each housewife taking her turn at weaving and rug making. A spindle and wool are constantly with the Kashgai woman. As she walks or rides, she twirls the spindle and spins her wool.

Though the diet is deficient in green vegetables and fresh fruit according to our standard, the heavy consumption of milk and by-products and their active outdoor existence is thought by the authors to account for the robust health of the tribesmen. There is no doctor in the tribal lands, though the son of the present Khan is now in the United States studying medicine. Khans are well educated.

GOOD FOOD

Much of the diet consists of meat—rice is a staple. Dinners, according to the authors, were served on a linen cloth spread on heavy carpets in a tent with open sides. Silver dishes were used in the Khan's tent, where they were entertained part of their visit with the tribesmen. The first meal (and typical those served) consisted of rice, one encrusted with saffron and flavored with raisins and pistachio nuts, the other filled with breasts of partridge. Other platters were heaped with roast moulton (a wild sheep), ibex and lamb mixed with peas and spiced heavily with cumin. Eggplant was stuffed with partridge and cooked in oil. Yoghurt, whole roast partridge wrapped in bread and rich goat cheese were served. Persian melon cooled in an icy stream were dessert.

Unlike most Moslems, women of this tribe are unveiled and do not live in seclusion. A woman keeps title to her own dowry and has the right to inherit property. She is not required to do the heavy labor of making and breaking camp. Men wear European dress, much of handwoven wool, but women dress in multi-colored skirts of Iranian-made cottons made in voluminous proportions. A shawl-like headpiece is fastened beneath the chin.
