At the meeting Friday the group heard reports from Denton on traffic safety and from George Huggins on the Soap Box Derby.

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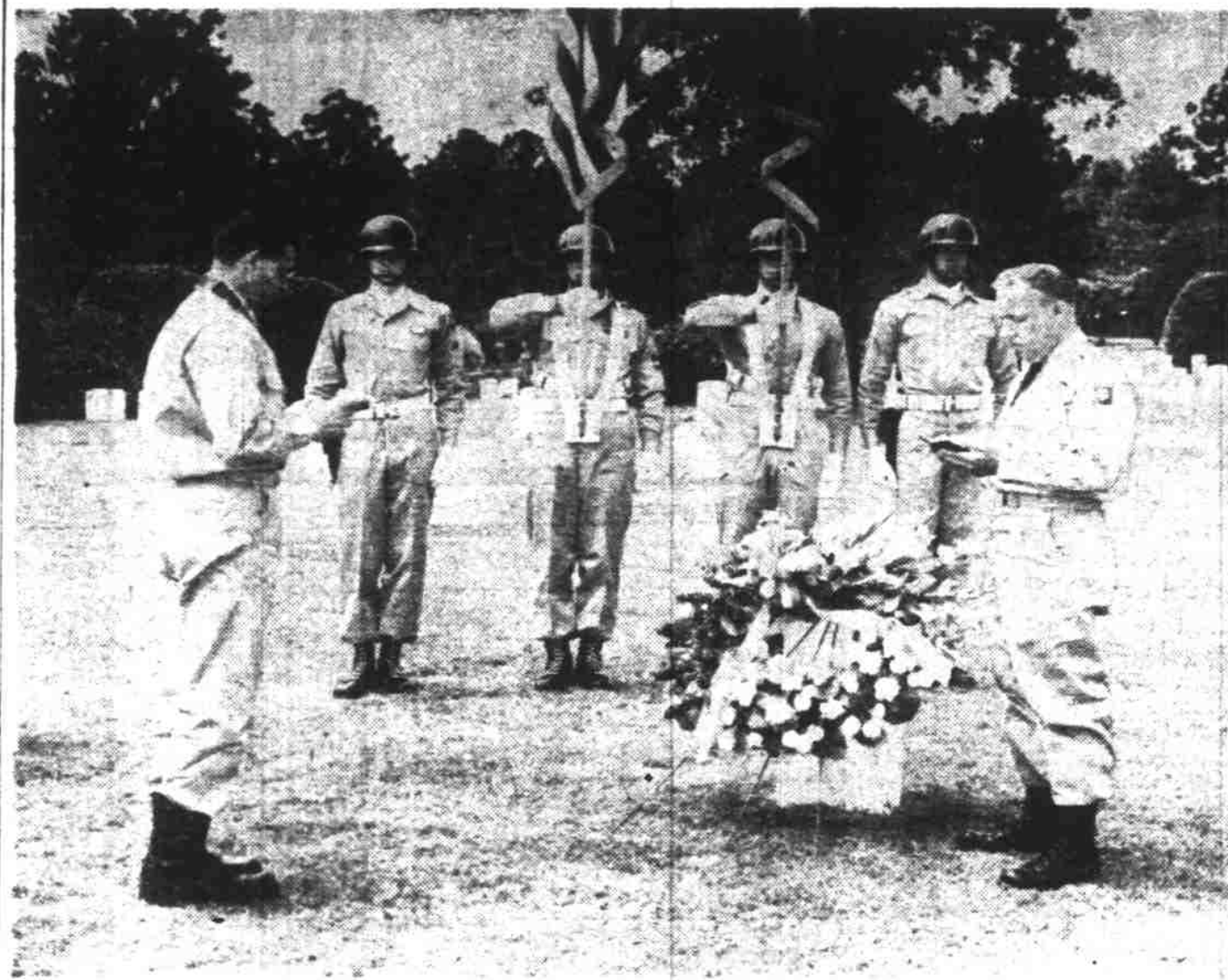
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Salem Chaplain in Airborne Memorial Rites

Cyclists Draw Warning From Police Officers

Bicycle traffic is picking up now that school vacation is on, Salem police were reminded Friday after several complaints had been received about bike riders in traffic.

The city officers urged safe driving habits for youthful pedal pushers as well as for motorists and issued this reminder:

Under state law bicycles must operate in traffic just as cars should, keeping in proper lanes and observing all traffic signals and laws.

The cyclists are entitled to the same caution in passing that they would use in passing a car.

Bicyclists are not permitted to ride on the sidewalks. Another complaint reaching police is that bicyclists are using one-way streets in the wrong direction, which is definitely unlawful.

As it darkens in the evening, bikes should have a red reflector light in the rear and a headlight in front. Both bikes and cars should display lights at dusk, police reminded.

Applicants Answer Police Recruit Call

Response to advertisements for additional personnel has been encouraging according to Police Chief Clyde A. Warren.

"Recent reductions in the force notwithstanding the outlook for the future looks much brighter than our present total force of 64 men would indicate," Chief Warren stated Wednesday. The total authorized strength of the Salem police force is 67.

Four present patrolmen are temporary appointees not under civil service and three clerks, the policeman and three communications men are not civil service employees.

Civil service records show two examinations have been held for patrolmen since January, 1950, resulting in 12 men employed last November and two this spring under civil service status.

Resignations of several men on the force, most of whom sought positions other than police work, had reduced the total force since Jan. 1.

Resignations have been received from Vernon E. Schmidt, Walter H. Page, Eugene L. Grunwald, Edward B. Callahan, Wesley C. Neugart, Richard S. Nicholson and Donald C. Benson.

Also, effective July 1, LaVerne Jenness is leaving the force. Two other men are to be relieved of their duties on the force because of physical disabilities.

Applications are still needed and interested applicants are invited to come to the station and discuss the matter with Chief Warren.

Defeat of a measure on the May 16 ballot left the requirement for one-year residence still valid.

An order boosting telephone rates in Beaverton, Tigard, Sherwood and Stafford areas was signed Friday by Charles H. Heltzel, Oregon public utilities commissioner.

The new rate schedule will add \$14,328 to West Coast Telephone Co.'s annual revenue, he estimated. But Heltzel in his order criticized the company for "laxity" in improving its facilities.

Pedestrian Wins \$28,816 Damage Suit

An auto accident victim was awarded a judgment of \$28,816 Friday, one of the largest of its kind ever handed down by a Marion County Circuit Court jury.

Recipient of the award is Earl Comer of Salem, former Oregon Pulp and Paper Company employee, who was injured last Aug. 4 when struck by a car, driven by Archie Lewis, 23-year-old Newberg service station attendant. The verdict came Friday afternoon following a two-day circuit court trial with Lewis as defendant.

According to testimony advanced by Comer's attorneys, Bruce Williams and Otto R. Skopel Jr., 56-year-old Comer was struck while walking along Lancaster Road just north of the Macleay junction for three weeks with a skull fracture and doctors testified at the trial he is in need of institutional treatment.

Attorneys and court clerks agreed that the large judgment, which was the exact amount asked for by the plaintiff, is the largest arising out of a contested accident case in at least the last 20 years.

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
