23 Floats in Lions Parade Due Monday

A full 23 floats and numerous marching groups are included in the Lions Club parade scheduled to form at 3 p.m. Monday just south of State Street on Winter Street and to begin at 3:30 p.m. Included in the marching groups is the Hillsboro 1950-1951 championship drum and bugle corps. Entries in the parade for both marching organizations and floats are drawn from as far away as Medford and Hood River.

Locally the mounted groups will be made up of the Oregon Governor's Guard, the St. Paul Rodeo group and the Salem Saddle Club. Judging of the entries has been divided into four groupings, according to Sheriff Denver Young, in charge of parade planning for the Lions. The groupings are bands, marching groups, floats and

mounted groups. There are three winner's ribbons for each group. The parade route has been outlined as beginning on Winter Street just south of State; moving west on State Street to Liberty

Street; north on Liberty to Court Street; East on Court Street to Waverly Street; south on Waverly Street to State Street and west on State Street to Winter Street.

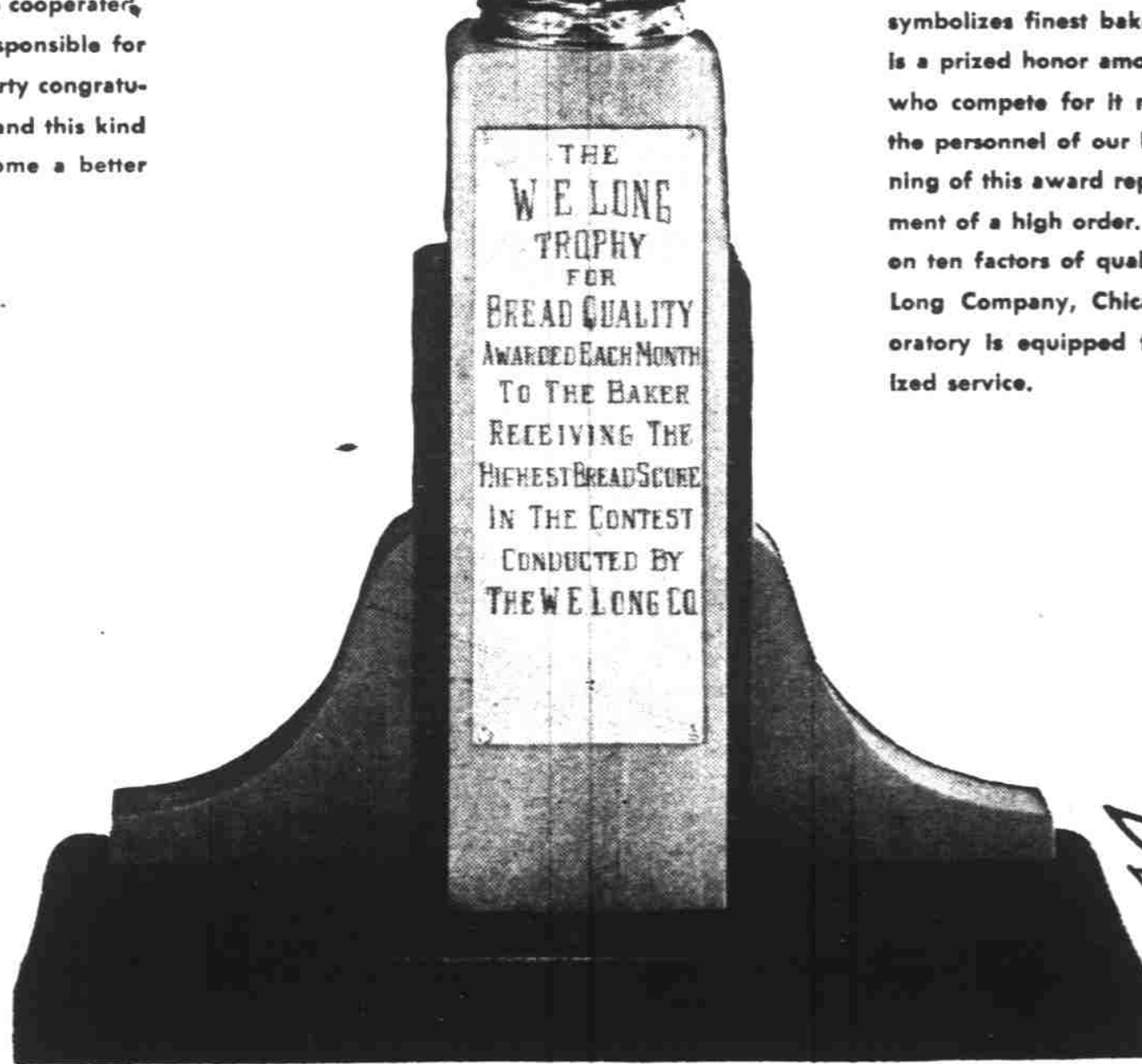
