

Courthouse Evacuation Ahead of Schedule, Few Offices Still in Building

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Marion County Courthouse is ahead of schedule this week in becoming a deserted castle. Only a handful of offices still held out Monday in the building whose demolition will start this month. The departments moving to the Public School Office Building three blocks north will be joined today by most of those remaining—juvenile, bookkeepers, Circuit Judge Joseph B. Felton and recorder. The sheriff will be probably the last to transfer. In general he plans to take to Linn County jail all prisoners due to stay more than 30 days and all others to the Salem city jail.

The moving and necessary refurbishing, in charge of Ted Kuenzi, assistant county engineer, was far enough ahead of schedule yesterday that the county clerk's office packed hurriedly and was still trying to unscramble desks and files in the new office in late afternoon. That office had little business during the day, but June altar-bound couples did not slacken the recent pace—as seven duos applied for marriage licenses.

Few Telephones
The new quarters were still almost without telephones, with a central switchboard not expected until the first of next week. The clerk's office was taking calls on the District Court phones. When moving is concluded, the County Court said, two of the three Courthouse janitors, both past retirement age, will be released, as well as the two elevator operators, since there is no operator in the temporary quarters.

To Start Building
At the Courthouse square, where Viesko and Post will launch building operations next month on the new \$1,700,000 structure, workmen were preparing a fence to surround the project. The locations of the departments in the school building, on Marion Street between High and Church, are as follows:
First floor—Already occupied by tax collector and assessor, reached from Marion or Church Street entrance. The county welfare office has the south wing of this floor, but is not a part of the Courthouse setup.
Second floor—The extension
