Buying for Your Home

Here's How to Remove Those Special Summer Stains, Cleaning Problems

This is the time of the year when I receive many inquiries from readers about taking grass stains, mud spots and similar marks from clothing. The nice weather lures people outdoors for picnics, back-yard meals and walks that often bring them back with spot-souvenirs of their day in the open.

Here is a handy reference for any family to keep over the summer. It comes from Inez LaBosier, Extension Service specialist at Rutgers University, and covers most of the warm weather cleaning problems.

For grass or foliage stains, get to work as soon as you notice them. Washable white material will react to a warm soap solution. Rub the spot between your fingers. Use a household bleach if a yellow stain remains. For washable colored fabrics, try lukewarm soap suds first, then dilute alcohol for stubborn stains.

For non-washable fabrics, sponges the spot with half water and half alcohol mixture, using a pad beneath to absorb the moisture. Brush irregularly into the fabric and dry quickly to avoid a ring.

Mud stains can usually be washed with soap and water, but let the mud dry first and brush off as much as you can before washing.

For non-washable fabrics stained with mud, sponge with denatured alcohol. A cut raw potato can be rubbed into black or dark silk of firm weave to remove mud. Let the area dry and then brush off the potato starch with the mud.

If the mud is mixed with grease or oil use a grease solvent such as carbon tetrachloride. Red mud often contains iron rust and, in washable fabrics, the rust stain

can be removed with lemon juice and salt. A commercial rust remover can be used for non-washable fabrics.

For mud stains on shoes, wipe the mud off as soon as you can, and before it dries, then let the shoe dry away from heat and use a cream polish with a soft cloth.
