Stocks Show Ragged Note; Close Mixed

NEW YORK (AP)—An indecisive mixture of gains and losses at the close Thursday gave the stock market a ragged appearance.
An early advance in the market was nullified by a turn around that kept the list pointed downward right to the final bell.
The Associated Press average of 60 stocks lost 20 cents, just half of the gain it made Wednesday, and stood at \$105.20. The industrial component was down 10 cents, railroads down 40 cents, and utilities held unchanged.
There were 1,119 individual issues on the tape as compared with 1,099 Wednesday. Plus signs came to 424 and minus signs to 385 with 52 new highs for the year and 20 new lows. Volume amounted to 1,370,000 shares as compared with 1,190,000 Wednesday.

Grain Prices Mixed at End

CHICAGO (AP)—Soybeans dropped sharply on the board of trade Thursday in a wave of profit-taking following inability of the July contract to reach the ceiling level in early dealings.
Wheat closed 3/4 lower to 1/2 higher, corn 7/8-1 1/4 higher, oats 1 1/2-1 3/4 higher, rye 1/2 to 1 1/4 lower, soybeans 2 3/4 to 7 cents lower and hard 2 to 5 cents a hundred pounds higher.
Wheat advanced for small gains early, but lost practically all of them before the finish. Glowing reports on yields and quality of the crop were coming from the Southwest. Receipts expanded sharply, Enid, Oklahoma, getting 945 cars and Fort Worth, Texas, 237 cars.
