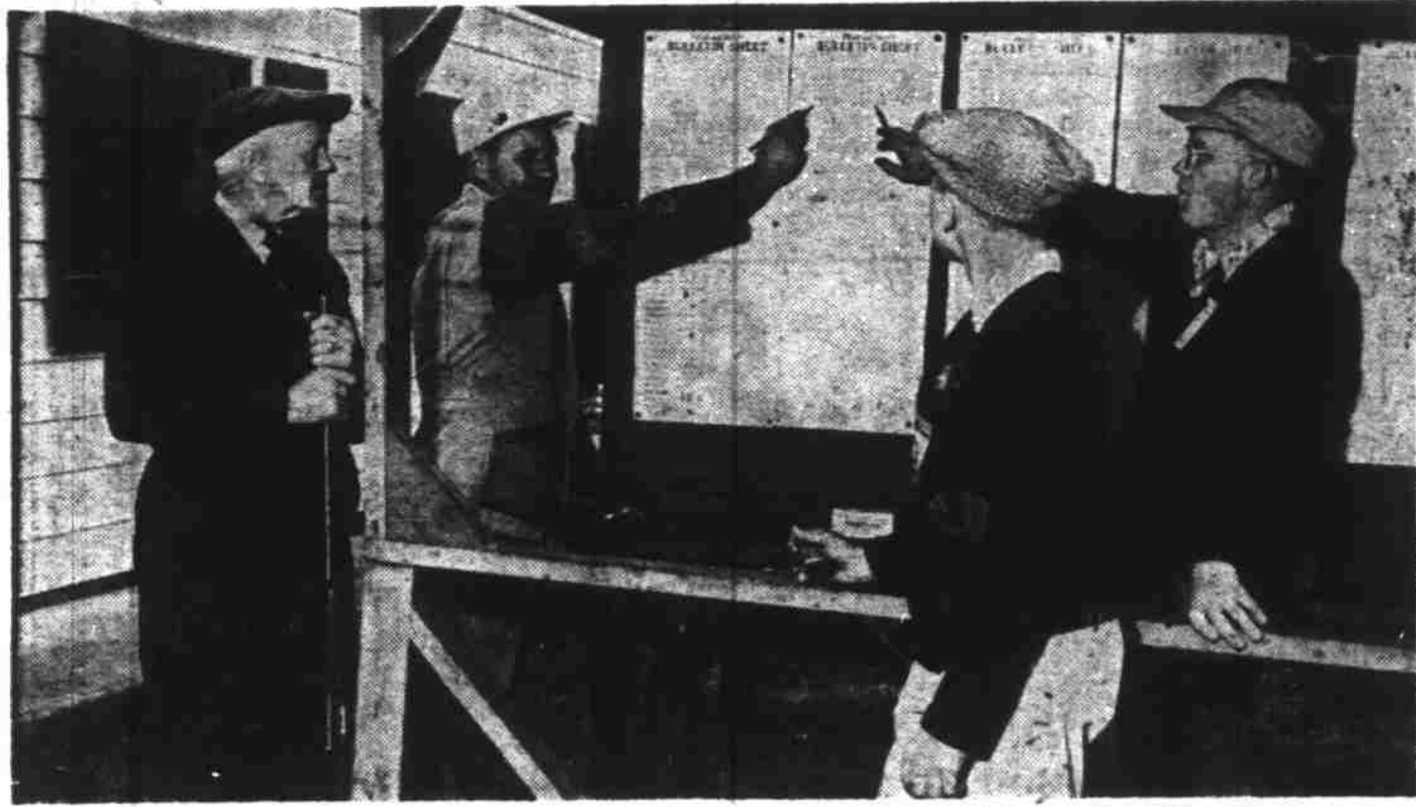


Checking Over Doubles Scores in Big Meet

Troeh Doubles Winner; Beavers Stop Rainiers

Veteran Hits 92 as Shoot Classic Opens

The veteran Frank Troeh of Portland, one of the all-time greats of Oregon trapshooting, proved Thursday he's still got it by leading the 1952 State Tournament at Salem Gun Club. The sharp-eyed and quick-fingered Troeh shattered 92 of 100 "birds" in the doubles competition, besting second placer S. Simpson of Cornelius by two hits.

Troeh is a Class A shooter while Simpson is in Class B. Among the trapshooting fraternity, fifty-five entries banged away at the flying discs in the doubles event, and those winding up the first day of shooting were hampered considerably by a sudden cold and drizzle.

Four runners cracked a perfect 100 in the 16-yard practice event before the doubles Thursday. The four are George Jantzer of Medford, O. Milligan of Coos Bay, Fred Neitling of Stayton, and R. Simpson of Portland.

In the 50-yard, non-registered handicap event Thursday another of the older veterans, Glen Hilliard of Salem, showed the way with 48 hits. J. Willener of Eugene and Larry Imah of Salem each led 47 and Neitling of Stayton, Burch of Coquille, M. Clagston of Medford, J. Glaser of Tangent, T. Coleman of Asea, R. M. Simpson of Cornelius and Morris Ray of Junction Day all had 46.

WIL to Keep Veteran Rule

Western International League teams will continue to operate this season with no more than nine veteran ballplayers on any one roster, according to Salem Senators Director Tom Holman who attended the league meeting at Yakima Wednesday. Holman reported upon his arrival home that an attempt was made to vote out the veteran rule, but that it was defeated in a 5-3 vote. Vancouver President Bob Brown led the move to hike the number of vets from nine to 10, but it was defeated.

It was also decided to raise the league waiver fee from the \$1,500 to the \$2,500 level.

A brief discussion was held on the itinerary for Minor League President George Trautman when he visits the league later in the month, and the brief meeting was adjourned.

Seals Snatch Two Yak Bears

YAKIMA (AP)—The sinking San Francisco Seals, who've lost their last nine straight in the Pacific Coast League, plucked two players from their Yakima farm club Thursday.

Dario Lodigiani, manager of the Yakima Bears in the Class A Western International League, said the Seals had called up Bill Andring and Gene Klingler. They are the only two Bears hitting over the 300 mark—Andring at 340 and Klingler at 330.

Lodigiani said Andring will take over immediately at first base for San Francisco, while Klingler is scheduled to replace Bill McCawley in center field.

Lodigiani will take over at second base, himself, and Phil Steinber, the Bears' centerfielder last year, is reported en route to Yakima from Los Angeles.

The Bears have lost the services for several days of Dick Briskey, who sprained his ankle in the final inning of Wednesday night's game.

NCAA Will Allow Video Broadcast

CHICAGO (AP)—The National Collegiate Athletic Association membership has given a 92 percent approval to a previously announced plan to televise a top football game nationally each Saturday during the 1952 season.

Walter Byers, NCAA executive director, announced that in a referendum vote, 185 colleges voted for and 15 against the football TV plan submitted by the NCAA's video committee.

In other games the Hollywood Stars' Johnny Lindell pitched a 2-1 win over San Francisco for the Seals' 10th straight loss, Los Angeles' Monk Dubiel blanked Oakland 5-0 on six hits, stopping an Oakland winning streak at seven in a row and Sacramento took a 15-inning 6-5 win over San Diego, slicing the Padre lead over Hollywood to one game. Richie Myers tripled in the 15th for the Seals and scored when Pitcher Walked him in with the winning run.

Leon Brinkopf walloped a homer in the Los Angeles cause. Lindell's victory was his 10th of the year.

Seattle scored in the eighth off Sanford when George Vico singled and went to second on Art Wilson's single. Vico went to third when Paul Lehner forced Wilson at second and scored when Bob Boyd drilled a single.

Veck's Trophy From Brownie Players Labeled Poor Gag

ST. LOUIS (AP)—The loving cup Bill Veck got for firing Rogers Hornsby as manager of the St. Louis Browns, engendered some crossfire of its own Thursday.

The outspoken Hornsby said he was almost positive Brownie Owner Veck had the trophy with him at the showdown conference with the Rajah in a Boston hotel room Tuesday.

The trophy was presented to Veck in a ceremony that night by Browns players. Inscribed upon the 24-inch loving cup was:

"To Bill Veck for the greatest play since the Emancipation Proclamation, June 10, 1952, from the players of the St. Louis Browns."

Thursday veteran Sports Editor J. Roy Stockton of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch took Veck and his traveling secretary, Bill Durney, to task.

"That was not the spontaneous humor of a bunch of ball players," he wrote in his daily column. "It was the humor of Bill Durney, who knew it would please his boss."

"Nor was the trophy purchased by contributions from a group of ball players. The trophy was charged to the Browns' account at the Hotel Kenmore in Boston. It was a club project and Bill Veck and Bill Durney should be profoundly ashamed of themselves by now."

Stockton said Veck and Durney were entirely out of order "when they participated in the public humiliation of Hornsby, a great baseball figure in his own right, a member of the Hall of Fame and a name that will live long after all the Bill Vecks stunts and Bill Durney's sophomoric jokes have been forgotten."

Durney insisted he arranged for the purchase of the trophy for "about 15 of the players." He said Pitcher Ned Garver, a 20-game winner last season, but having his troubles this year, was among them.

Wrote Stockton: "The only excuse you can make for Durney and Veck is that they have been striving so hard for so long to be funny that they have lost all perspective."

"As for the ball players, they are equally excused. Most of them couldn't be expected to know any better."

"When the news broke that Hornsby was being fired it was difficult not to feel a bit sad for the Rajah. It seemed that he might really be at the end of the line."

"But that's all out of the picture now. Hornsby came out of the mess still a man. And the ones we feel sad about are still Durney and Bill Veck."

Tommy Milone turned in a three-hit shutout Thursday as the pace-setting New York Yankees concluded a prosperous home stand by defeating the Detroit Tigers, 3-0.

The victory was the Yanks' sixth straight and their 12th in 15 games since arriving home from their first tour of the West.

Browns Bumped

Boston and Cleveland remained hard on the heels of the Bombers. The runner-up Red Sox downed the St. Louis Browns, 7-5, and the third-place Indians whipped the Washington Senators, 7-4. The Red Sox trail by 13 percentage points and the Indians are a half game out. The Senators dropped from fourth to fifth place. The Chicago White Sox beat Philadelphia, 10-4, to move into the last Monday spot.

Bucs Again Blasted

In the National League, the St. Louis Cardinals hammered the league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers, 18-10; Boston trounced Pittsburgh, 11-2, as Paul Burris drove in six runs; and Chicago tamed Philadelphia 3-1, behind Warren Hacker's five-hitter. The runner-up New York Giants and Cincinnati were rained out.

Sid Hudson, obtained by the Red Sox from Washington two days ago, received credit for Boston's victory over the Browns. Boston collected ten hits to St. Louis' 12 but the Red Sox blows included a home run by Hoot Evers and two doubles by Billy Goodman.

Cardinals Hit

Bobby Feller coasted to his sixth straight victory for the Indians. Chico Carrasquel paced the White Sox to victory over the A's, driving in five runs on a pair of triples and two singles.

The Cards hammered 18 hits and the Dodgers 17 in the slugfest at St. Louis. Solly Hemus, Dick Sisler and Fred Glavin, the Cardinal attack with three blows each. Gil Hodges hit two homers for Brooklyn.

Richter Swap Worth 11 Men

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The Los Angeles Rams, in one of the biggest deals numerically in the history of the National Football League, Thursday announced they have acquired California's All-America linebacker Les Richter from the Dallas Texans in exchange for 11 players.

President Dan Reeves of the champion Rams announced the deal after a lengthy conference in Dallas between Ram coach Joe Stydahar and Jimmy Phelan, coach of the newest team in the league.

Heading the list of Ram regulars going to Dallas are fullback Dick Hoerner and Tom Keane, an end on offense and halfback on defense.

Others traded to Dallas included End Dick Wingo, O'Brien, who played for Phelan and the Los Angeles Dons in the now defunct All-America Conference in 1949. The Rams obtained him but he did not report.

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—Bespoke Al Brosch, a 39-year-old Garden City, N. Y., home professional, wrenched the first round spotlight from golf's glamor boys on Thursday by firing a two-under-par 68 in the National Open Championship.

Two Coaches 'In Dutch'

More Violations Flushed As PCC Pow Wow Ends

PORTLAND (AP)—Five more cases of possible purity code violations bobbed up Thursday at the closing session of the Pacific Coast Conference's annual summer meeting. Commissioner Victor Schmidt reported two of them were flagrant violations involving coaching staff members. Presidents of the schools involved were told to take disciplinary action.

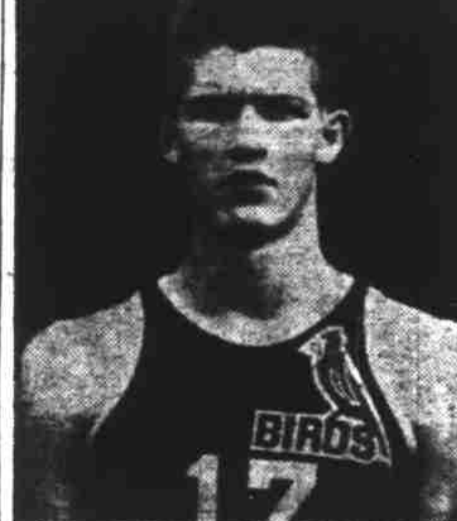
The other three were possible violations of rules against recruiting of athletes, Schmidt said. The college presidents were instructed to investigate the cases and report on what action is taken.

That made a total of seven cases brought up at this meeting—in three of which college heads were told to inflict punishment. On the others, they will conduct investigations to determine guilt.

As usual, the conference did not disclose the schools involved or any details, though Schmidt indicated most or all of them involved recruiting of athletes, which is banned in the conference code.

There was little other action on the final day, and a number of matters were set back to the winter meeting, which will be at Pasadena, Dec. 7-11.
