

Suspect Cleared of Litchfield Murder; Trail Grows Colder

Salem police Friday were confronted with an almost cold trail in their search for the killer of Mrs. Susan Litchfield, found slashed almost a week ago in the woodshed of her home at 1333 Waller St.

Chief of Police Clyde A. Warren ruled out any possibility that a former Salem man held in The Dalles had anything to do with the brutal slaying. The man was arrested there Wednesday. He was charged by police with the assault on a young woman.

Investigation showed that there was no evidence that the man was anywhere near Salem on the day Mrs. Litchfield was killed, Warren reported.

No additional clues were found by investigation into the 1950 killing of an 82-year-old Tacoma woman. Information learned Friday revealed that the case was solved with the convicted killer hanged.

Police still continued reviewing the 1946 killing of a Greenleaf, Ore. woman, but nothing has yet been discovered which sheds any light on the Litchfield slaying, Warren said.

In six days since Harold Shell, a roomer at the 81-year old woman's home, discovered the mutilated body in the woodshed, police have questioned more than a dozen individuals. A meticulous search of the dead woman's little Sunday and Monday added little to the search for the killer.

Police have alerted law enforcement agencies throughout the Northwest in the search for a former roomer of Mrs. Litchfield who was reported by Shell as having been in the vicinity of the house last Saturday, the day Mrs. Litchfield is believed to have been killed.

Still a mystery is the time of the killing and the weapon used to inflict the 14 gashes about the woman's head and shoulders.

She was last reported seen shortly before noon Saturday, a week ago today, by neighbors and a delivery boy from a grocery store. She was found by Shell around 4:40 a.m. Sunday morning, when he returned home from his job of driving a taxi.

An axe was found within a foot

of Mrs. Litchfield, along with a heavy piece of wood. Both were at first believed to be the instruments used by the killer. Following the results of the autopsy last Monday, police said the nature of the wounds indicate that another type of weapon may have been used.

Still to be learned are results of laboratory analysis of materials sent to the Oregon Criminal Laboratory in Portland, which included clothes worn by Shell, and voluntarily submitted for investigation. The crime lab report is expected early next week.

Portland Firm Low on Detroit Area Road Job

The Warren Northwest Co. of Portland was low bidder on resurfacing 15 miles of the Santiam Highway along Detroit reservoir, W. H. Lynch of the bureau of public roads, reported.

The project calls for bituminous surfacing of the new highway, built several years ago, but whose completion has been delayed during construction of Detroit dam. The road skirts the eastern end of the reservoir.

Low bid on the project totaled \$240,493, Lynch said, and awarding of the contract to the Portland firm has been recommended to the bureau.

Work is being completed on the grading of the last section of this road, Lynch said that it is expected the new highway will be surfaced by fall.

Gromyko Named Soviet Ambassador to Britain

LONDON (AP)—Moscow Radio announced Friday night Andrei A. Gromyko, chief deputy foreign minister, has been appointed Soviet Ambassador to Britain.

The poker-faced career diplomat, a one-time boy wonder of Soviet diplomacy, previously served in Washington and at the United Nations as the Russian chief delegate.

Girls Consider Parole Board, Time Measure

Bills upholding standard time for Oregon, seeking to abolish the state parole board and eliminating capital punishment in Oregon were introduced at a mock legislative session Friday of Girls State.

The 220 girls will wind up a busy week-long program of experimental government today with election of two girls to Girls Nation.

The all-girl senate, after heavy debate Friday, defeated the bill which sought to abolish the parole board. Both the house and senate passed a bill requiring all Oregon cities to comply with Gov. Douglas McKay's order to remain on standard time.

Introduced and debated but not acted on were bills requiring all primary and secondary schools to have at least one hour noon lunch periods, permitting 18-year-olds to vote in political elections, establishing a civil defense program in all schools, urging statehood for Alaska and eliminating capital punishment for criminals.

An act requiring all Oregon teachers to take a loyalty oath was sent back to committee, where it died.

Twelve candidates for the two positions of representatives to Girls Nation in Washington in Washington in July were chosen Friday. The two winners will be selected tonight. Girl circuit court groups will meet this morning and a court trial will be conducted by the girls this afternoon. A candlelight ceremony, open to the public, will be held at 8:15 o'clock tonight in the rotunda of the state capitol. Girls will leave for home Sunday morning.

EUGENE (AP)—The second man involved in the fatal beating of Edna F. Lee has received a prison sentence of eight years.

He is Celbie Bowers, 19, Creswell, who pleaded guilty to a charge of manslaughter.

Earlier John Frazier, 35, also of Creswell, pleaded guilty to manslaughter and was sentenced to 12 years in prison. They were convicted of beating Lee to death in a quarrel over whether Frazier's wife, who made lunches for Lee, deliberately put cold coffee in Lee's thermos.
