

Morse to Give GOP 'Silent Treatment' if Sen. Taft Nominated

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse (R-Ore.) said Sunday night he will give the Republican Party the "silent" treatment if its presidential candidate and platform don't meet with his approval. Morse, appearing on NBC-TV's "Meet the Press," said in effect, that he would follow that course if Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio is the candidate.

Rockefeller, 'Cinderella' Trade Charges

NEW YORK (AP)—Winthrop Rockefeller tossed a long-distance counter-punch at his estranged "Bobo" Sunday, claiming he has supported her and their son to the tune of a thousand tax-free dollars a week.

The millionaire oil heir's statement was issued through an attorney in answer to the "Cinderella" bride's sour comment on being told he had set up a million-dollar trust fund for the boy, Winthrop Paul, 3.

The fund, lawyer Timothy N. Pfeiffer said, is "irrevocable." And Rockefeller, he added, has given her and the boy more than \$128,000 since the separation in October, 1949.

The sudden flare-up along the rocky Rockefeller marital road started with an interview Mrs. Rockefeller gave to the former Mrs. Barbara Sears, daughter of an immigrant coal miner—granted at her parent's home in Indiana.

Rockefeller promptly issued a statement saying he had tried to discuss financial arrangements with her, was "anxious" for the "companionship" of his son and that the trust fund for "the support, maintenance and education" of the boy had been established last Feb. 15.

Rockefeller spoke of "repeated but unsuccessful" attempts to discuss the boy's financial future and custody.

From Lowell, Ind., "Bobo" replied that Winthrop's disclosure of the trust fund was in "bad taste"; it looked good "at the first shot, but the child will never see a million dollars."

She also said her husband has seen his son only at her prompting; and that she had received no income at all from her wealthy spouse.

Peterson New SOCE Mentor

ASHLAND (AP)—Alex Peterson, former Oregon State College basketball letterman, has been appointed football coach at Southern Oregon College of Education.

The appointment is subject to approval by the State Board of Higher Education, school officials said. Peterson has been coaching high school teams at Astoria while studying for an advanced degree at Columbia University.

IRRIGATION TOUR SET

A Marion County irrigation tour is scheduled for the St. Paul-Fargo area on Tuesday, June 24. The tour will begin at 1:30 p.m. on the George Settlemeier farm three miles east of St. Paul on the Donald highway and continue to the Racette Brothers farm, one mile northwest of Fargo.

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Morse, an original supporter of Gen. Dwight Eisenhower, called the general "a sane, conservative Republican" with an "open mind."

"What we need," he asserted, "is a man in the White House who will unite the people of this country, give us a change of administration and... give us a fair hearing on the evidence." He said Eisenhower is such a man.

The Oregonian, known as a liberal Republican, was asked if he would support the party in view of his "marked differences" with it.

"I'm going to support the party if it has both a candidate and a party (sic) and a platform that in my judgment is for the welfare of the country," he replied.

"If it doesn't, I'll at least take a walk in the sense that I'll be silent during the campaign."

Morse then was asked whether he would or would not support Taft.

"It's very doubtful that with intellectual honesty I could possibly make a speech in behalf of Robert Taft," came the reply, "but I won't go out and campaign against him."

"That all depends on who the Democratic candidate will be."

"You mean you may leave the party?"

"As an individual citizen, when I walk into that ballot booth I'm going to vote on the basis of the man that I think is best for my country, as will millions of other people."

2 Teen-Agers Drowned in Wrecked Car

KLAMATH FALLS (AP)—More details were learned here Sunday of the traffic accident that claimed the lives of two Portland area teen-agers.

Their bodies were found Saturday in a car submerged in the Little Deschutes River 90 miles north of here.

Police said the pair, Bonnie Winter, 18, Sandy, and Sharon Baylink, 19, Troutdale, were en route from their homes to visit Mrs. Kenneth Coleman here.

Baylink, who was driving, left his home at about 5 p.m. Friday, police said. They speculated the accident occurred at about 11 p.m. that night.

Police said the car missed a bridge, jumped 65 feet across the river and hit the bank on the opposite side. The pair, apparently thrown into the back seat by the impact, drowned.

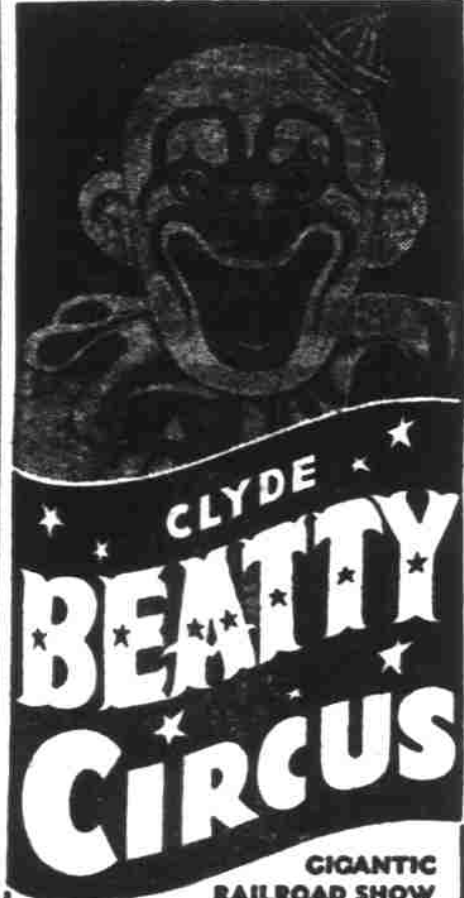
Cubs Buy Brown

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Widening of 99-E Nears Completion

Pen Escapee Returned to Prison After Short Life as Berry Grower

A 33-year-old convict is back in the Oregon State Penitentiary after 82 days of freedom and a life as a prosperous berry grower near Gresham.

In what state police in Milwaukee describe as a "fantastic story," Lee J. Marsh, with another convict, escaped from the prison annex last March, hitchhiked to Albany, eluded officers there, persuaded a friend to fly him to Montana, then, after working there for awhile, bought a car and came back to Oregon to operate a thriving strawberry farm south of Gresham.

Marsh was picked up near Brightwood Saturday while he was hunting for pickers. He was known in Gresham as Bert J. Hall, he told state police.

State police said they recognized the license number on the

car Marsh was driving. The number had been given to them by Washington state police as being those on a car seen near the home of Marsh's brother in Washington.

He said that the strain of being at large was almost too much for him and he had a notion to give himself up last Friday.

State police officer Sgt. Howard Benninghoff, who picked Marsh up, said the mild-mannered convict decided to come back to Oregon after his flight to Montana because he thought it would be safer here. People at the prison, Marsh said, knew he intended to head for Colorado, where he has a part interest in a mining operation.

Marsh said he spent three years overseas in the army, serv-

ing in Europe and the South Pacific.

Another year will probably be added to Marsh's original three-year sentence, Warden Virgil O'Malley said Sunday. He had only 13 months remaining when he walked away. Marsh was sentenced for larceny from Tillamook County.

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East Germans Balk at Red Military Plans

BONN, Germany (AP)—East Germany's Communist rulers are running into trouble—including some with the Russians—in their plans to rush creation of a full-fledged army on the side of the Kremlin, Allied intelligence officers said on Sunday.

The Reds' troubles are manifold. First, the East German people are balking at remilitarization.

Second, where is the money to come from out of an economy already hard pressed by Russian exploitation?

Third, the ever-suspicious Russians don't trust the Germans and, even if they did, they would hardly be prepared to give them heavy armaments free of charge.

Lack Support

This is the picture drawn by Western intelligence.

There are indications the Russians have no intention of supporting rearmament on the scale announced. The East German Communists are reported aiming at 12 divisions with 375,000 men.

Shortly after throwing off the wraps for their rearmament program, East German leaders, headed by Deputy Premier Walter Ulbricht, asked Soviet authorities for financial aid.

The Germans specifically wanted investments in industry to launch an armaments production program and a reduction in the amount of goods shipped to Russia as reparations.

But Soviet authorities vetoed all

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the proposals. In addition, the Soviets have pointedly withheld any promises of military equipment to the East Germans.

See Exploitation
In the opinion of some officials economic exploitation of East Germany remains the main objective of the Soviets. East Germany is now delivering more and better goods to Russia than any other satellite.

The total rearmament program charted by East German leaders would require large amounts of heavy equipment from the Russians and Soviet investments in East German cadre army of 60,000 will be expanded but that the Soviets will not permit the creation of 12 divisions.
