## Willamina Budget Hearing Set July 7

WILLAMINA—Public hearing on Willamina's proposed budget for the coming fiscal year will be held July 7. Total proposed budget is \$48,025, which is within the six per cent limitation. To be raised by taxation will be \$21,525. The millage rate will run around 22 mills, compared to 41 mills last year. A wider tax base because of annexation accounts for the millage decrease.

An engineer will be retained soon to investigate possibility of a new intake point for the municipal water system. At an emergency session the council imposed a ban on sprinkling by water users outside the city limits as a conservation measure.

## Brahma Cattle Misnamed, Asian Asserts

The cattle which we call Brahma or Brahmin cattle are in reality the Nari breed. Brahmin is the name of a high Hindu caste and not of a cattle breed—Nari is pronounced Naw-ree.

These were just a few of the bits of information which Dr. Abdul Aziz Kahn, director of agriculture in the Baluchistan province of Pakistan let drop during his recent visit to the Willamette Valley. He has been in the United States some weeks, looking over American methods of farming. Much of what he has seen here can not be applied to much of his homeland, he said.

"As in every other country in South Asia we have great pressure on the land. The result is many holdings too small to be economic and no possibility of using machinery as you do here until conditions are changed," he said. "We are one of the few countries in the area with enough food for our own people and an exportable surplus. But manufactured goods are scarce and high in price. We use coal as our principal fuel and much kerosene, but gasoline is on the scarce list and will be until we build refineries and improve our transportation system. You know our country is only five years of age."

He returned to the cattle program in his home land: "People in this area have maintained a rigid selection program for many years and have large herds. Legs of these Nari milking buffaloes are white, muzzles narrow and horns erect and shiny. Any off type animal is discarded immediately and sire selection is rigid. Buffalo bulls are ferocious but the cows are docile and a child can handle them. Buffalo feed on forage only but they produce milk with butterfat content of from 7 to 8 per cent. This butterfat is highly refined

and used for cooking fat. Moslems prefer butterfat to meat fats for cooking."

Dr. Aziz was very interested in our systems of irrigation, looking over a number of systems carefully, as he explained a system of well irrigation developed by the Arabs centuries ago and used on steep hillsides today.

"This system," he said, "consists of a series of wells connected underground by tunnels. The result is that additional water is collected in each well downhill in the series. The surface of the lower well is far below the bottom of the first one so water flows from the lower well without pumping. Some of these wells are reported to be 200 feet deep. Of course, all of these have been dug with hand labor."

"When Pakistan was carved out of India, much of our irrigation water in the low lands was diverted to Hindu territory. We have several dams now under construction, one of which will irrigate two million additional acres, besides furnish greatly needed power."

Dr. Aziz was interested in buying kerosene camping equipment and kerosene ranges and refrigerators while here, but found these items scarce. He marveled at the amount of electric power available in the northwest.

## Labor Disputes Cut Employment

Employment in Oregon in May was 20,000 less than a year ago, and labor disputes were listed as the chief cause.

The State Unemployment Compensation Commission said 18,000 persons were idle because of labor disputes last month. The commission said there were 435,800 non-farm workers in the state in May.

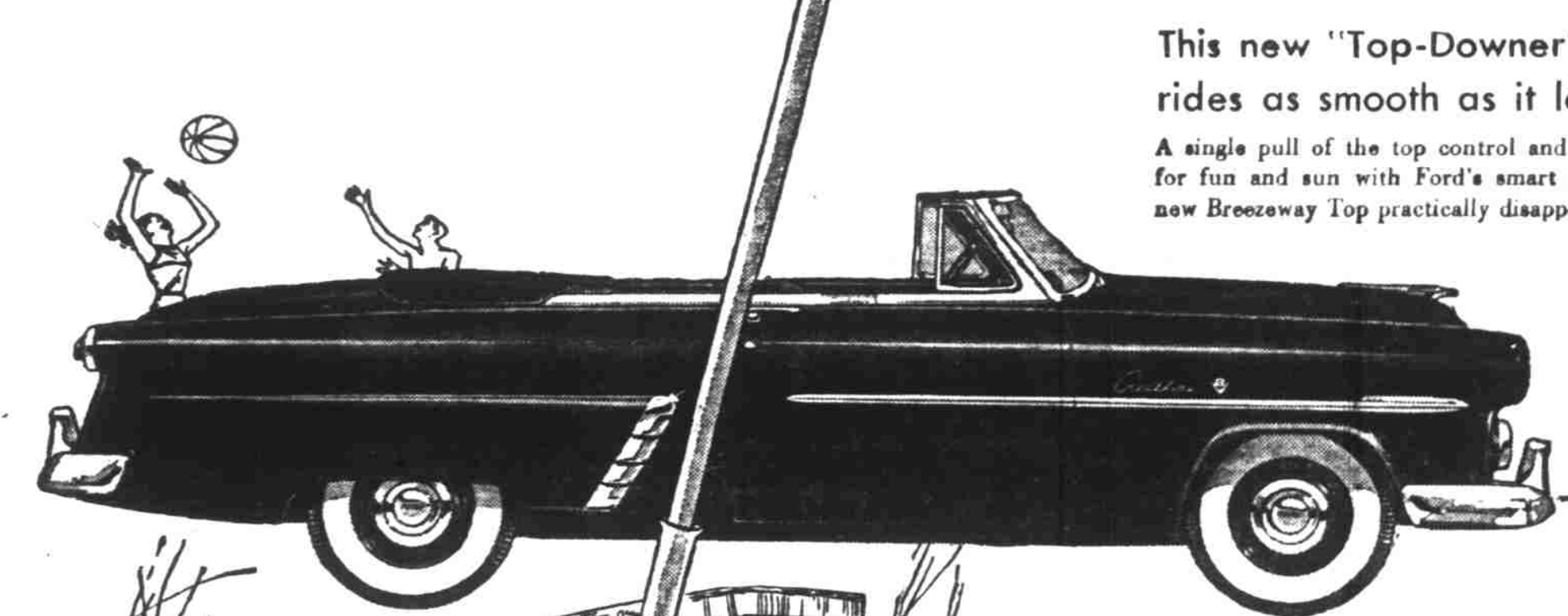

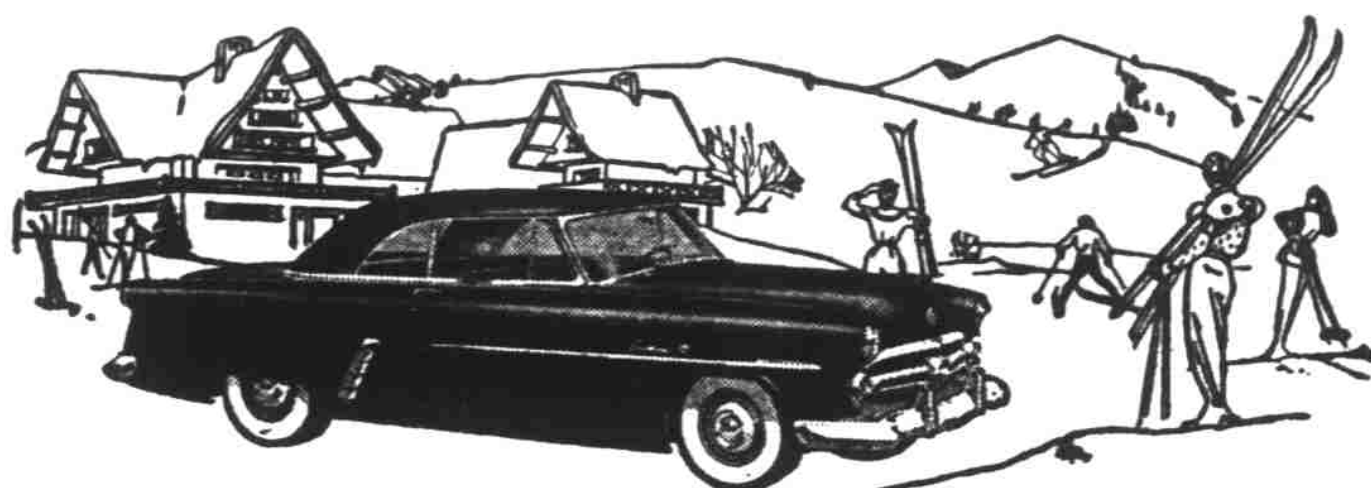
