

Oregon Christian Churches Open Centennial Convention Monday at Tabernacle in Turner

More than 2,500 persons are expected to attend the 100th annual state session of the Oregon Christian Missionary Convention (Disciples of Christ or Christian Churches in Oregon) at the Turner Memorial Tabernacle at Turner beginning Monday evening, June 23. It will extend through Sunday, June 29.

John Paul Pack, minister of University Christian Church in Seattle, will be the principal speaker, appearing each evening and at the closing day's afternoon session.

Missionaries participating include Hallim C. Shorrock Jr. of Seattle, on furlough from three years of educational youth work in Japan under appointment by the United Christian Missionary Society, and Mel Byers, returned missionary to China and Burma.

Daily Bible studies will be conducted by Roger Carstenson, professor at Phillips University, Enid, Okla., formerly an Oregon minister and professor at Northwest Christian College.

Salem ministers who will participate include Harold H. Lyman, Court Street Christian, who will deliver one of a series of six sermons by Oregon ministers on Tuesday afternoon.

Hubert Stas, minister of Malloy Avenue Church, Portland, will preside. Orville F. Mick, minister of the Dallas Church, is the program chairman.

Although the history of the Christian Churches in Oregon goes back to 1846, when three congregations were formed in Yamhill County, the annual convention dates from 1852, when the first meeting was held in an oak grove near the present community of McCoy.

From 1852 to 1885 the annual gatherings were held at locations including Rickreall (Dixie), Luckiamute, Mill Creek, (near Aumsville), Monmouth, Eola, Silver Creek, Bethany Central (near Albany), McMinnville, Bethel, Dallas, Portland, Amity, Eugene and Salem.

Since 1885 the convention has been held at Turner every year since with but one exception. Several acres of land was given to the church by the Turner family.
