

# Upsets Rock Opening Matches in PGA

## Snead Knocked From Tourney

Harrison Also Victim As Classic Starts

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Defending champion Sam Snead and medalist E. J. "Dutch" Harrison were blown to the sidelines Friday in a cyclone of upsets that swept the opening rounds of the PGA golf championship.

It was another "Black Friday," the worst first-carnage for the tee titans since Detroit's Plum Hollow in 1947 when Ben Hogan, Sam Snead, Jimmy Demart and Bobby Locke fell in one thunderous lump.

Three former PGA champions—Chandler Harper, Jim Ferrier and Denny Shute—were cut down during the long day of double eliminations, along with Lloyd Mangrum, 1946 national open king; graying Fred Hawk, one of the giants of the '30s; and Jack Burke Jr., season's leading money winner.

**Middleoff Favored**  
Out of the debris emerged tall Dr. Cary Middleoff of Memphis the lone remaining favorite in Saturday's field of 16 members, scattered with little known home pros.

Snead bowed to Lew Worsham, Oakmont, Pa., pro, on the 19th hole. Then, Worsham went out in the afternoon to lose to rangy Fred Hass of New Orleans, one up, in the second round.

Harrison, 42-year-old Arkansas traveler, succumbed to Marty Furgol of Atlanta, two up, thus upholding the ancient tradition that a medalist never wins the championship.

**Kroll Posts Wins**  
A little, 32-year-old pro named Ted Kroll, built along Hogan's lines, produced two of the major victories over Big Spring's sun-baked, par 72 course. A former infantry sergeant, he won the first two holes on the 18th hole, one up, and then staged a great come-from-behind battle to trip the heavily-favored Mangrum, 2 up. Against Mangrum, Kroll won the last four holes, two in birdies.

Harper, slender swinger from Portsmouth, Va., who won the PGA two years ago, played six-under-par golf to win 6 and 5 from Charles Larpe of Doylestown, Pa. Then, Harper bowed to the veteran Jim Turnesa of Briarcliff Manor, N.Y., 3 and 1.

**Honsberger Tops Ferrier**  
Jim Ferrier, who survived the 1947 carnage of Plum Hollow, had to go 19 holes to beat Leonard Dodson of Mission, Kans., in the morning, but it took all the sting from his game. He lost in the second round, one up, to Ray Honsberger, a jowly 42-year-old little known pro from Clarkston, Wash., playing in his first PGA.

Honsberger had won his first round match in the morning, scoring a one-up victory over Tom Blaskovich of Connelville, Pa. The only other Pacific Northwest campaigner fell in first round play. He was Frank Newell Jr., of Tacoma, Wash., who dropped a 4 and 3 decision to Mangrum.

Denny Shute, PGA titleist in 1936-37, lost to long-hitting Chick Harbert of Northville, Mich., in the first round, 5 and 4. Jackie Burke, after beating Jimmy Walk-up of Middletown, Ill., in the first round, lost to Argentinian's Roberto de Vicenzo, one up, in the afternoon.

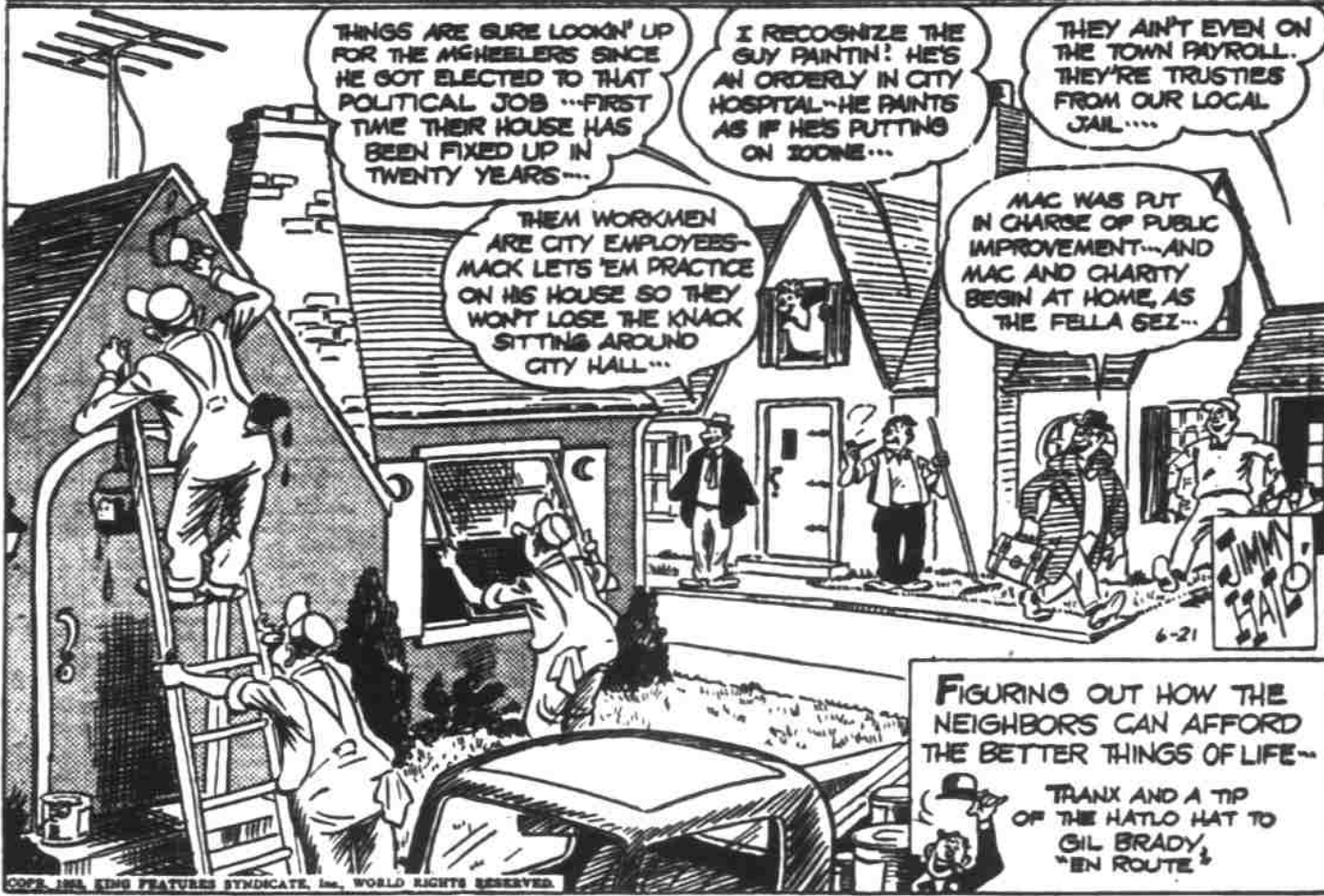

# New 'Phillips' Softball Park Dedicated Monday

Salem's new softball field in Bush Pasture will be officially labeled "Phillips Field," Monday night at dedication ceremonies.

Salem Fire Chief William Roble said the field is to be named for a long-time, prominent Salem fireman, Paul L. Phillips, who died last July.

Capt. Phillips died of a heart attack following a softball game. He was manager of the local fire ladies team and a sports enthusiast for many years.

Mayor Alfred W. Loucks will open the dedicatory ceremonies Monday at 6 p.m. He will read the proclamation issued by the Salem city council giving the field its new name.

Also on the brief 15-minute program will be Roble, Mrs. Phillips and son, Jack, who will throw the first ball to start an exhibition game between the Fire Department and Salem Teamsters. The game will follow the ceremonies.

Gene Goode, local sports writer, will be master of ceremonies. Firemen, all in uniform, will present \$500 check to Mayor Loucks for the field lighting fund. The field is located in the southeast corner of Bush Pasture.
