

Dulles Urges More 'Creative Democracy'

BUFFALO, N. Y. (AP)—John Foster Dulles said Saturday night that "freedom on the defensive is not defensible." He urged a return to what he called creative democracy in the fight against "the moral monstrosity" of Communism.

In a strongly-worded criticism of America's post-war foreign policy, the chief advisor on foreign affairs to the Republican Convention Platform Committee attacked the idea of containing Communism. He declared:

"We have acted belatedly and inadequately, merely as a response to Soviet pressures. We have been trying to plug a hole here, to stop a gap there, always awaiting bad news before we acted."

Dulles, a former State Department advisor and architect of the Japanese Peace treaty, spoke before 400 editors and publishers of weekly and small daily newspapers at the 6th annual convention of the National Editorial Association.

"These deficiencies and inadequacies are, I suspect, largely due to the fact that our nation seems to have lost, at least temporarily, the dynamism which until now has characterized our conduct," he declared. "Our policies have been almost entirely defensive policies of so-called containment. That marks a serious retrogression . . .," he said.

Presbyterians Erect Church In Single Day

SANTA ROSA, Calif. (AP)—Montgomery Village Presbyterians will worship Sunday in their church built in less than a day.

The prefabricated little redwood church was erected Saturday in five hours and 16 minutes—about three hours ahead of schedule.

One hundred eighty workmen, tools in hand, stood ready at 7 a.m. A minister said a prayer. At 7:06 a.m., a pistol shot signalled the men to begin work.

Twenty minutes later the walls had been raised on the previously prepared foundation. By 8:39 the steeple was in place; and by 12:25 p.m., the church was completed.

Hugh Codding, the construction contractor, commented: "We just underestimated our ability to put this thing together."

His men had been busy for the past two weeks prefabricating the sections, pouring the foundation and putting in plumbing and wiring.

Small Tornado In Kansas Area

KANSAS CITY (AP)—A small tornado was reported at Basehor, Kas., about 15 miles west of Kansas City, as a violent thunderstorm swept this area Saturday night.

No injuries were reported immediately in the Basehor community. Trees were uprooted, electrical and telephone wires were knocked out. At least one barn was demolished.

The storm swooped into Kansas City with shifting blasts of wind measured at 74 miles an hour. Trees were knocked over in various sections of the city. Many windows were smashed. Power lines were broken in several places.

The city's traffic slowed almost to a standstill as a deluge of rain caused waves of water to roll across streets at some points.

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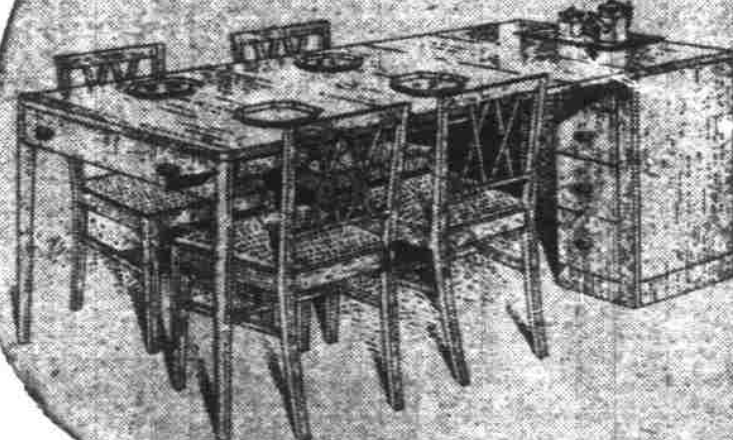
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
