Older boys camp schedule has been set by the YMCA for July 20-Aug. 2 (12-15 years, district girls (9-14 years) Aug. 3-12; Junior Red Cross high school boys and girls Aug. 13-23; Oregon Conservative Baptist junior high boys, Aug. 24-30; YM folk dance family camp Aug. 30-Sept. 1.

Red Cross to Recruit Blood Collectors

Blood collecting teams will be recruited and trained by the Marion County Red Cross Chapter, so that they will be immediately available in case of disaster, as part of the civil defense blood and plasma program for this area.

At the present time all Red Cross teams work out of Portland. Some Salem doctors and nurses are now working voluntarily on such teams but many more will be needed.

Lists of group "O" donors will be compiled and maintained by the Red Cross Chapter, to be deposited in areas where they will be available immediately. Blood from "O" donors, known as the universal type blood, can be used in emergencies, with any other type.

Stockpiles of necessary equipment and supplies for the procurement, processing, transporting and administration of whole blood will be maintained here for disaster purposes.

Wallace S. Wharton, director of the Marion County Civil Defense, said he believed the civil defense blood program should be integrated into the general Red Cross program because it has done such fine work in providing blood for members of the Armed Forces and for other hospital patients without cost.

Oregon Traffic Law Violations Climbing Fast

Oregonians have stacked up 17,275 traffic violations during the first five months of this year, which, according to Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry, exceed those of the same period last year by nearly 2,000.

May convictions alone totaled 3,762, a figure surpassed to date only by the 4,721 convictions reported in March.

Newberry said keeping tabs on traffic convictions makes it possible for officials to spot potential highway trouble makers. If a driver becomes a repeater he can if he fails to reform, have his license suspended.

During May the department suspended 232 licenses for driving while intoxicated; 11 for reckless driving; 11 for violation of basic rules; 4 hit and run; 2 failure to yield right of way; 5 for driving record or too many accidents or violations.

Music Teacher To Visit Salem

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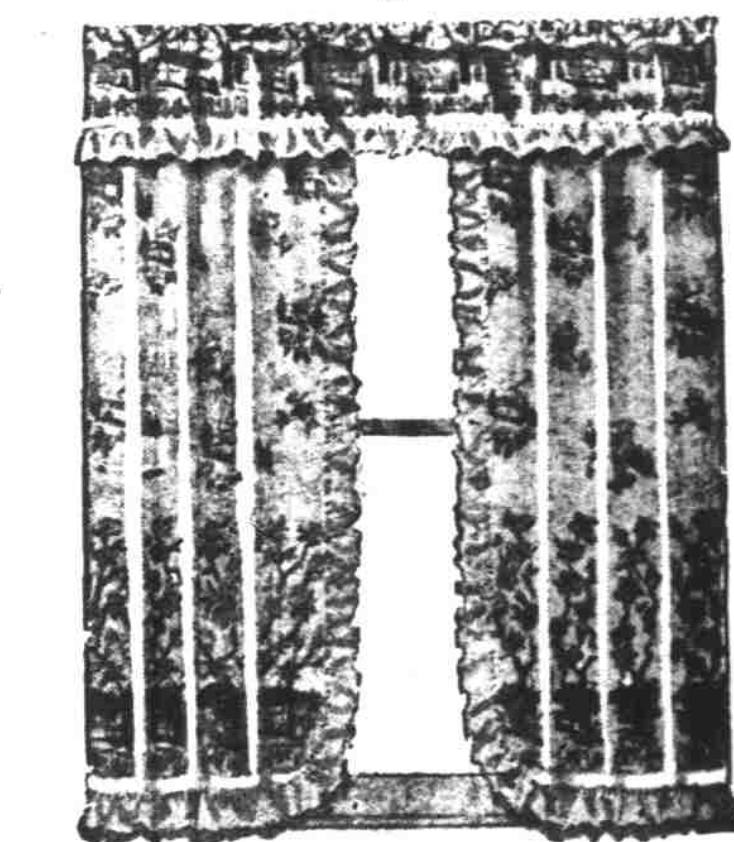
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
