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Buying for Your Home Best to Check Clothes Tags Before You Start Laundering, Special Instructions

Washable clothes are wonderful in summer because nothing really takes the place of that clean, fresh feeling of a newly laundered garment on a hot day. However, it is a good idea to save all your tags on summer clothes because some garments are in need of special attention in the laundry process.

Cotton knit garments are practical for small children because they seldom need ironing, but you should pat out the moisture in a towel and place the garment on a sheet of plastic to dry—like a sweater. If you don't hang up a pair of cotton rompers or a polo shirt until it is dry enough not to pull out of shape, you will have it for a long time.

The cotton knit and the seersucker infants' suits, especially the sunsuits with plastic linings, are excellent for hot weather. However, if you shop for any of

the quick-drying fabrics in children's clothes, make sure it is in one of the porous weaves which will be more comfortable for hot days.

There are a number of lovely dark fabrics on the market that might not be entirely color fast. You should wash such garments separately and keep them apart from the lighter articles when you want to iron them. If you save the transparent plastic bags that many foods now come in, you will have them handy for this purpose.

Here's a tip on washing white cotton gloves. If they have a grimy look, particularly around the fingers, wet them, rub soap well into all the soiled spots and roll them up, tips inside, to stand for an hour or two. Then, wash in warm soapsuds and you will find the dirt has been loosened.

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
