

Wheat Prices Hold Up Well

CHICAGO (AP)—Wheat held up well on the board of trade Monday in the face of surrounding weakness.

The bread cereal was off most of the day, but a rally in the closing hour left all contracts with fractional gains.

Wheat closed 1/4-1/2 higher, corn 1/4 to 1 cent lower, oats unchanged to 3/4 higher, rye 3/4-3/8 lower, soybeans 1/4-1/4 lower and lard 15 to 20 cents a hundred pounds lower.

Receipts of south wheat were heavy in the northwest, but most of the grain now was being held off the market, either for higher prices or for putting into government loan.

NEW YORK (AP)—Railroads called the turns in the stock market Monday—first higher and then lower.

In the end the market closed with prices of leading issues spread out over a range of between 1 and 2 points higher to around a point lower with the downside more crowded. A few high priced issues were well outside this range on the declining side.

At the close the 60-stock averages was off 10 cents from the previous day at \$105.40.

The industrial component lost 30 cents while utilities remained unchanged.
