Uranium Ore in Northern Alberta

EDMONTON, Alta. (AP)-Discovery for the first time of indications of uranium ore in Northern Alberta was reported here Monday.

The report said the find has been made by a party of Edmonton prospectors operating in an undisclosed area north of Lake Athabaska, about 450 miles north of Edmonton.

Samples obtained in the erea have been forwarded to the atomic energy control board in Ottawa and reports of tests are expected shortly.
