

\$17,320 in City Park Projects Authorized

Spending of \$17,320 this summer to improve two city parks was authorized Monday night by Salem City Council, on recommendation of the newly created Parks Advisory Commission. Funds are from the parks and playgrounds millage approved at the May election.

Largest item is \$8,500 for irrigation of Bush's Pasture Park, using water from Pringle Creek. City Manager J. L. Franzen noted also that diversion of some of the city's water from Mill Creek to Pringle Creek to overcome sluggishness is under way.

The fund also will provide restrooms, picnic tables and a fire-place at Kay Park in Englewood and additional picnic facilities in Bush's Pasture Park.

Expresses Gratitude
A resolution in memoriam to Paul B. Wallace noted his service on the City Council in 1905-06 and expressed gratitude for the westside river-front park area which he had donated.

A new ordinance was introduced to require licenses for merchant police patrols, watchmen and private investigators. It would make them wear badges, let them

wear uniforms and let the manager issue licenses.

Public hearing on the request of V. J. Osko for a zone change at 1465 N. Capitol St., to allow a second story on his building was canceled when Osko withdrew the proposal. The planning and zoning commission had recommended against it.

Other Action
The Council last night also: Set a special meeting for July 10 to take final action on the 1952-53 budget.

Accepted the bid of \$18,900 by E. E. Batterman Construction Co. of Salem, lowest of four received, for an outlet tower and control building at the Turner water reservoir.

Ordered stop signs at the alleys, entering the 13th and 14th Streets between Court and Chermeketa. Refunded log-hauling permit fees paid by two firms prior to the city's repeal of that ordinance in April.

Approved crossing of Bush's Pasture Park with three houses to be moved from Summer and Chermeketa Streets to Leffelle Street.

Set a hearing for July 14 on a request for change from class I residential to class III-X restricted business zone for property on Judson Street between Rex and Mountain View for a duplex residence.

Doubled to \$40 the offer to A. L. McCafferty, 705 Kingwood Dr., for damage to three trees in a trash-burning mishap last year.

Suspended rules to allow John Perry a special setback so he can build a fireplace at his Breyman Street home.

Accepted a deed from L. H. Perlman to a 20-foot strip of land running north from Pine Street for alley purposes.

Cherry Crop Ripens, Berry Crop at Peak

While calls for cherry pickers may be issued the latter part of this week or the first of next, farmers still need berry pickers.

According to Harold Roessler, manager of the Salem Employment Office, the largest crop of berries in the valley in several years are at their peak and waiting to be picked.

"Possibly the best they've had for a number of years," says Roessler of the berries, which will pay pickers 4 1/2 to 5 cents a pound. Picking on the valley floor may possibly be through this week, weather permitting, but the Silverton Hills area, just reaching its height, can be picked for at least two more weeks.

Farmers have been picking up workers between 6 and 7 a.m. in front of the employment office. Cherries are expected to reach their peak at the end of this week or the first of next. Cherry pickers will receive up to 3 cents a pound.

PORTLAND (AP)—Dick Hanen of Coos Bay, a three-under-69 to win medalist honors Tuesday in the qualifying round of the 24th annual Oregon Golf Association championships.

Pat Lesser of Seattle and Mrs. R. L. Borst of Portland shared honors in the women's round, both turning in scores of 39-35-77. They will play off for the medalist award later.

Hanen's 35-34 gave him a one stroke margin over four others who fired 70s for the 18 holes. They were George Beecher, Ontario, 38-35; George Harrington, Medford, 35-35; Dr. Edwin Palmrose, Astoria, 37-33; and Fred Mueller, University of Oregon, 36-34.

Dick Yost, Portland, carded a 73 and Defending Champion Bob Atkinson, also Portland, did not turn in a qualifying score.

Wife Charged With Fantastic Extravagance

PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Charles Edward Merrill, wealthy 66-year-old New York broker, filed a divorce suit Monday charging his wife, Mrs. Kinta Desmare Merrill, with cruelty, lack of affection and "fantastic" extravagance. He petitioned said his wife refused to have sexual relations with him for eight years, started violent arguments about family matters, and frequently "threatened to sue the hell out of him."

Due to his 50-year-old wife's "wasteful and extravagant tastes" and unwillingness to supervise the household, Merrill charged, their expenses amounted to \$300,000 a year, more than his net income.

Merrill, a member of the brokerage firm of Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Beane, said he had had a series of heart attacks and operations in recent years but his wife was "indifferent" about his condition.

His petition said she was worth \$1,500,000 which he had given her or earned for her through investments. He said he was worth "at least" five million dollars.

The Merrills maintain homes in Palm Beach, New York City and New Orleans. They were married March 8, 1939, and have no children. Merrill has six children by two previous marriages.

Deaf Woman In 17th Day of Religious Fast

OSBURN, Idaho (AP)—A 55-year-old, 185-pound woman went into her 17th day of a religious fast Monday in an effort to regain her hearing.

The woman, Mrs. Mabel Heminger, started losing her hearing 35 years ago and has been totally deaf for the last 10 years. She plans to fast and pray for 21 days.

Her husband said she has taken only water since beginning her fast and has lost about a pound a day. She doesn't feel hunger any more and the smell of food seems to nauseate her, he said. She spends most of the day now sleeping and praying.

Beaver Boys State Hears Gov. McKay

Gov. Douglas McKay advised members of 1952 Beaver Boys State Monday evening that "there's nothing like the free enterprise system" in his address to the 200 delegates.

The "State" this year is being held on the campus of Willamette University.

In his address in Waller Hall on campus, Gov. McKay outlined the benefits of the American system of government, showed the boys how it benefited them and the many ways it can be helpful. A question and answer period followed his presentation.

During business sessions Monday, the boys set up six mythical states and elected officials to these cities. The cities have been named after popular automobile titles for the sake of convenience.
