

Codling Moth Spray Advised

The second cover spray for codling moth control in Willamette Valley apple and pear orchards should be applied as soon as possible, according to Dr. B. G. Thompson, entomologist at the Oregon State College agricultural experiment station. Dr. Thompson reports there has been a heavy codling moth flight and considerable egg laying during the recent period of warm weather.

The recommended sprays for codling moth control are 3 pounds of lead arsenate or 1 pound of 50 per cent wettable DDT powder in 100 gallons of water.

In some orchards, it may be necessary to add materials for control of red spider mites. One of the following may be added to the codling moth spray solution: DN

111, one-half pound; parathion, one pound of 25 per cent wettable powder; or EPN-300, one pound. The use of DN 111 during periods of high temperature may result in serious spray burn.

Pear growers having a pear psylla problem can use either parathion or EPN-300.

Growers must handle parathion, EPN-300, and similar materials with caution. All warnings and precautions recommended by the manufacturers should be followed carefully. Dr. Thompson states. Materials of this type are highly toxic to men and other warm-blooded animals. Growers cannot afford to take chances in handling these materials.

Albert Karnes Bound Over To Grand Jury

Albert William Karnes, appearing without counsel, waived preliminary hearing and was bound over to the grand jury Monday when he was brought to Marion County District court to face charges of slaying Mrs. Susan Litchfield with an axe June 7.

Karnes told District Judge Val D. Sloper "I don't have an attorney and I can't afford one," when asked if he was represented by counsel. Sloper advised him that the court had no authority to provide him with an attorney.

A first degree murder warrant was served in the courtroom on Karnes by Detective Wayne Par-

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ker of the Salem police department as he awaited arrival of Judge Sloper. Outwardly calm, the 24-year-old Astoria farm laborer appeared in prison garb of striped denim shirt and blue denim trousers. He is serving a State Prison term for burglary at The Dalles.

Karnes, who has confessed killing the 81-year-old widow, will appear in Circuit Judge George Duncan's court at 2 p. m. today for arraignment. It is expected that Judge Duncan will name an attorney to represent Karnes during the murder trial.

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
