

Beaver Boys State To Nominate Today

A whirlwind of state, county and municipal knowledge is being absorbed by the 200 delegates to the annual Beaver Boys State on the campus of Willamette University. They enter their fourth day of session today.

Nominations to state offices, which will include some 60 boys, are to be made today and the general election for the State is to be held Friday.

County elections were conducted Tuesday for the two counties of Lausanne and Baxter. The counties are named after the two living areas of Lausanne and Baxter Hall on campus. Elected district attorney for Lausanne County was Douglas Basham, Portland; judge, John Harding, Portland; commissioners, Charles Schnorberg, Eugene, and Richard Towell, Roseburg, and sheriff, Howard Bloomberg, Portland.

Elected county clerk for Lausanne was Terry Sherwood, Medford; treasurer, James Yoes, Portland; assessor, Bruce Hamilton, Ashland; school superintendent, Carl Mohr, Medford; coroner, Samuel VanArsdale, Woodburn, and justice of the peace, Wayne Spencer, Cave Junction.

Elected district attorney for Baxter County was Leonard Andis, Bend; judge, Laurie Burghart, Eugene; commissioners, Jack Alstock, Portland and Richard Gavall, sheriff, Charles Frost, Medford; clerk, Thomas Linder, Portland; treasurer, Don Jambura, Pendleton; assessor, Kenneth Hotelling, Eugene; school superintendent, Clyde Gibbs, Dallas; coroner, James Pound, Albany, and justice of the peace, Kenneth Bond, Baker.

Included in governmental education for Tuesday at Boys State were lectures on the workings of the Senate by Mark O. Hatfield, dean of students at Willamette University and geopolitics by

Maj. John W. Thompson, assistant professor of air science and tactics for the AROTC at Willamette.

Ike Favors End of Controls On Economy

General Dwight D. Eisenhower Tuesday advocated an end to all economic controls as rapidly as possible.

Eisenhower said "I would be in favor of eliminating every single artificial control, unless there is such an obvious necessity that you might say an overwhelming mass of our population would say, 'yes, we need that.'"

The general told a delegation from Louisiana in an open press conference that he has "much more faith in the interplay of economic factors than in bureaucratic controls."

Meanwhile, Eisenhower and Sen. Robert Taft fired new salvos at each other.

Eisenhower lambasted Taft as an advocate of "sit at home" tactics keyed to air power as America's major defense line.

Eisenhower said firmly he does not believe mere hit-back power is enough to win peace.

Taft, in turn, ripped into Eisenhower for his failure to attack the Truman administration's foreign policy which he said has plunged this country into "a mess."

School Board Opens Bids On Equipment

Bids on buses, pianos and classroom furniture were opened Tuesday night by Salem District school board, but no contracts were awarded. Call for bids also was authorized for next year's fuel oil and gasoline supplies and for a pre-heating installation at Bush School.

Truck Sales and Service Co. at \$6,647 was lowest of three bidders for a 60-passenger bus. Valley Motor Co. at \$5,400 was lowest of three bidders for a 48-passenger bus. The transportation committee is to study the bids, prior to purchase of one bus of each size.

Bids came from seven firms on seven pianos for various schools. Salem Music Center's proposals were lowest. The supplies committee was given power to act on this matter, as well as on purchase of numerous chairs, desks and tables for new elementary classrooms, for which bids came from 12 companies.

Gardner Knapp, by seniority, became new chairman of the board, and LeRoy Stewart was elected vice chairman. Connell C. Ward was retained as clerk-business manager.

Boyd Hillesland, temporarily at Lincoln School, was assigned as teaching principal at Hayesville after acceptance of the resignation of Brad Dodson, because of family illness. Also accepted was use of one-third of the time of Paul F. Wilmoth as a trades and industry coordinator, shared with other communities, allowing transfer of William Bender to industrial arts teaching.

Mrs. Caroline Gentle Ward of Klamath Falls and Miss Maxine Warner of Cherokee, Iowa, were elected as elementary teachers, and resignation of Mrs. Florence Forgard as a Hayesville teacher was accepted.

The board also last night: Supported a proposal to add fluoride as a tooth-decay preventive to the Salem Heights Water District water, which now serves Salem Heights School and will serve Liberty School as well.

Confirmed sale of the old Ankeny School and site to Ankeny Full Gospel Church for \$1,000.

General Found Fatally Shot In Pentagon

WASHINGTON (AP)—Brig. Gen. Francis G. Brink, chief of the American Military Assistance Mission to Indo China, was found fatally shot late Tuesday in a Pentagon office.

He died while being hurried to Walter Reed Army Hospital. A spokesman for the Defense Department said a pistol was found by his side.

Brink, 56 years old, arrived here from Indo China about two weeks ago for staff conference.

The District of Columbia coroner, Dr. A. McGruder McDonald, was notified by the hospital of the death.

Friends said the general had been badly depressed during his stay in Washington.

Brink, a native of Marathon, N. Y., was named chief of the United States military assistance advisory group in Indo China in October, 1950.

Coroner MacDonald said a verdict of cause of death will probably be issued Wednesday, after an investigation which is now underway. He said the wounds appeared to be self-inflicted.

Demo Delegates To Organize

PORTLAND (AP)—The 12-member delegation to the Democratic national convention will organize at a committee meeting here next Saturday.

The meeting was called by State Sen. Thomas R. Mahoney, Portland, chairman of the 1948 delegation.

Among those mentioned as possible candidates for chairman of this year's delegates are Multnomah County Sheriff Terry Schunk, who received most votes in last month's election, and Joseph Carson Jr., former Portland mayor, who now lives in Washington, D. C., but maintains legal residence in Portland.

More POW's May Decide to Return To Commie Rule

KOJE ISLAND, Korea (AP)—A total of 78,000 Communist war prisoners—not 70,000—may decide they want to return to Red rule.

That became a possibility Wednesday as Allied camp authorities completed screening 15,000 prisoners on this island. Unofficial estimates were that about 5 percent of these chose freedom from Red rule.

Even if the figure hits 78,000, however, it is unlikely that will have any effect on the deadlocked Korean armistice talks at Panmunjon. Red negotiators are demanding the return of all military prisoners.

Sen. Morse Bid for Foreign Relations Board Predicted

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse (R-Ore.) may be readying another bid for a seat on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee as a result of the recent primary election defeat of Sen. Brewster (R-Me.).

Morse won't comment on his plans, but the Brewster defeat will leave a Republican vacancy on the committee which Morse has coveted almost since his arrival in the senate. The vacancy won't occur until the next Congress convenes in January.

Morse has made several tries for assignment to the committee.

Disabled City Police Officer to Register Protest Over Discharge

Protest over the discharge of Arch Wilson from Salem police department will be brought to the city civil service commission today by Wilson. He indicated Tuesday he is not interested in work with the city engineer, offered after Wilson sustained disabling injuries as an officer.

Wilson was notified yesterday by Police Chief Clyde Warren that his police work would terminate June 30 on the grounds of "physical unfitness for the position you hold."

At the behest of the civil service commission, the City Council instructed the city manager to place Wilson and Officer Roland Wiebe, also injured on duty, in other city jobs they could handle. Wiebe is on park patrol duty already, still with the police force.

Wilson was offered work as yardman at the engineering shops. City Engineer J. H. Davis said this would have less salary than for a policeman but would provide a house. He added that Wilson had agreed to begin the work July 1. Wilson, however, said last night he was not interested in the offer because the job was not secure, presumably because the department is not under civil service.

The officer was run over June 17, 1950, by a truck as he was effecting the capture of a city jail escapee. He was off duty for five weeks with leg and hip injuries. Wilson has been with the department most of the time since June, 1950.

Chief Warren's letter said, in part: "In the hope that recovery might be made, I have carried you on the force. . . . Your disability is apparently permanent so it now becomes necessary that you leave the force. . . . If there is anything I can do to find you another position you can handle . . . please call me."

State Rests Case Against Mrs. Kader

PORTLAND (AP)—The state rested its case Tuesday against Mrs. Jada Kader, 22, accused of killing her 3-year-old daughter, Sherrie, last January because the tot cried often.

The state, which had counted on getting 4-year-old Vickie Kader to testify against her mother, was refused permission to put the girl on the stand.

Circuit Judge Frank Lonergan said the girl was too young to be a competent witness.

Nevertheless the state made one damaging point in its closing testimony. Dr. Harold L. Richardson, state criminologist, testified Sherrie was smothered to death by something pressed over her mouth and nose.

This contradicted Mrs. Kader's story that Sherrie was killed accidentally when Vickie hit her over the head with a chunk of concrete while at play.

Empty Courthouse Attracts Trio of Boys

Salem police returned three young lads to their homes Tuesday evening after the boys went on an escapade in the deserted courthouse building on North High Street.

Police reported that no damage was done and that the boys were apparently just "having fun."

Bakers Union, Owners To Start Negotiations

Salem's AFL Bakers union will start negotiations on a new contract with Salem bakery owners this week, union officials announced. The discussions follow closely the settlement of the Portland bakers strike.

Bread prices were raised one cent for the 1½-pound loaf in Portland and Salem last week end.

Jewelry Stolen, Thief Breaks Store Window

A reported \$1,898 worth of jewelry was stolen early Tuesday morning from a display window of the Pomeroy and Keene Jewelry store at 379 State St.

It appeared the theft was accomplished by kicking out a portion of the plate glass in the display window. The burglary was reported by David M. McHugh, a construction worker who lives in the Elgin Hotel, when he discovered it on his way to work.

Normally breaking the glass would have set off a burglary alarm in the police station but for some weeks the alarm has been broken and only recently repairs were in the process of fixing it. Police reports stated that the system had been cut in at least 11 places by the breakage and had set off an immediate alarm.

Greatest surprise in the burglary was the fact that a \$2,000 set of platinum ring mountings, inset with diamonds, was not taken. The largest accumulated loss was several wedding ring sets ranging in wholesale price from \$19.50 to \$287.50.

WOODBURN (AP)—A total of \$150,000 worth of 20-year sewer bonds were sold Tuesday to the First National Bank of Portland by the Woodburn City Council. First National submitted the effective bid of 2.52 per cent interest.

Also at the City Council meeting Tuesday evening the P. L. Construction Company, Portland, was awarded the contract for construction of a treatment plant and trunk sewers. Cost of the operation was bid at \$124,633.

Authorization for picking up the option to purchase the Hurst property in Woodburn as a site for the disposal plant at a cost of \$2,000 was granted at the meeting. With this purchase, construction is expected to begin in a short time.

The council passed an ordinance levying a \$30,279 city tax for 1952-53 at the Tuesday meeting. Also purchase of a new police car was authorized by the council.

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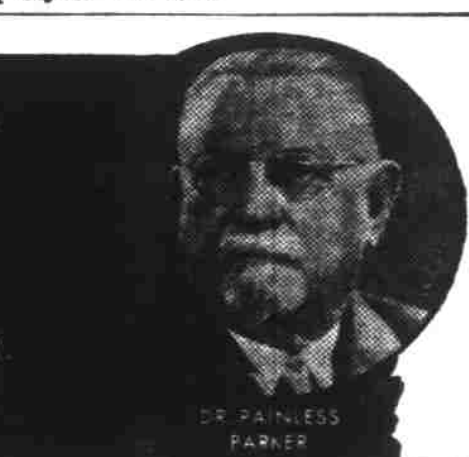
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
