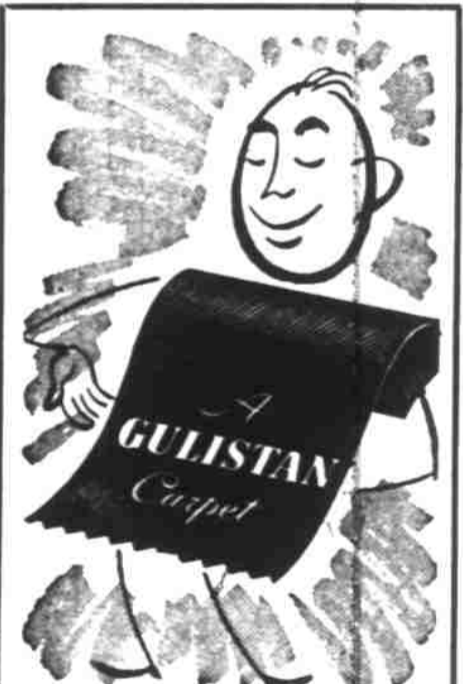

The naturopath, Mrs. Ruth Barnett, is under indictment on a charge of manslaughter by abortion. The case has not yet come to trial.
