PORTLAND (AP)—The weekly fishing report from the State Game Commission.

NORTHWEST—Trout fishing on Willamette River above Meridian reservoir site and on McKenzie and tributaries is improved over last weekend. Clear Lake continues fair and Linton Lake spotty. Dorena reservoir is poor. The Clackamas, Molalla, and Sandy rivers have been slow.

SOUTHWEST—Trout angling is fair on central coast lakes, with best catches made on fish or spinners and worms. Salmon fishing at Winchester Bay is poor. Trout fishing in southern coast streams is fair and salmon angling in lower Rogue is only fair. Rogue River trout angling is good with best results on spinners in daytime and flies in the evening.

CENTRAL—Cold, rainy weather has slowed angling pressure considerably. Clearing weather is expected for the weekend and fishing prospects are good. Crane Prairie reservoir is producing some good catches. Limit catches have been made at Lava Lake, Mud Lake and Big Cultus. East and Paulina lakes continue to yield good catches on troll and bait. Good catches have been made at Diamond Lake with 3 and 5 pound Rainbows reported. Fly fishing at Odel Lake has produced some nice catches of Rainbows, and a few Mackinaw are still being caught. Blueback fishing continues good at Odel Lake. Suttle Lake is still very good. Rainbow fishing at Blue Lake is very good and a few Bluebacks are being taken. Pines, spinnies and worms and fish are all producing. Little Deschutes and Crescent Creek are only fair due to cold weather. Clear Lake continues good on troll and bait. Metolius River is expected to be good this weekend—also Suttle Lake. Ochoco reservoir continues good. Lower Deschutes River continues to drop and rain and fishing is fair to good.

Games Torch Begins Trip

ATHENS, Greece (AP)—Aristides Rubanis, Greek javelin champion, carried the Olympic flame into Athens' new marble stadium Thursday night and was applauded by an estimated crowd of more than 30,000.

Last of the relay team carrying the torch from Mt. Olympus, Rubanis carried it around the arena and lit a flame on an altar erected for the occasion.

Bishop Erulup, acting for the Archbishop of Athens, blessed the Greek athletes who are scheduled to participate in the Olympic Games at Helsinki.

Then Basil Sillis, Greek 400-meter champion, lit his torch from the altar and started off to carry the flame to the Helsinki airport from which it will be taken by air to Copenhagen, where it will be carried by a relay of runners to Helsinki.

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Final Olympic Trials Slated This Weekend

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The first half of the powerful 1952 United States Olympic track team will be chosen Friday in final trials in Memorial Coliseum that promise to be as spirited as the games themselves.

The balance of the team will be selected Saturday. Highlights of Friday's program will be the 100 meter dash, 800 meter run and shot put.

The inflexible American Olympic rule prevails—the first three finishers in each event make the team. No exceptions will be made, not even for world record holders.

Navy, Princeton To Vie in Prelim

NEW YORK (AP)—Navy's undefeated varsity eight will row against Princeton and Harvard in a preliminary heat in the Olympic trials at Lake Quinsigamond, Worcester, Mass., July 3.

The rest of the eliminations will be held on July 4 and 5. All races in the trials will be at 2,000 meters (about 1¼ miles), the Olympic distance.

In the other heats for eight-oared shells, Yale, Stanford, California and Cornell will meet in the first heat, and Wisconsin, Buffalo (N.Y.) West Sides, and the University of Washington, in the third heat.

The first two in each heat will qualify for the Friday semifinals. The finals will be held Saturday.
