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The Time Is Now

Cherry and Raspberry Time, Calls For Maraschino, Jam Recipes

Pressure from our constituents requires that we give them the maraschino cherry recipe, though our better judgment says we'll be sorry.

The maraschinos are to be brined now, and finished off anywhere from two weeks to two years. By the time our ladies get around to making the syrup, half of them will have misplaced The Statesman.

One year we published the recipe twice and sent out 25 additional copies to readers who had either lost or not seen the recipe. That's the reason for our reluctance. Anyway, here goes for our most popular recipe of the whole year.

We understand that this year readers may purchase the brine for bleaching and hardening at drugstores, in one case at least, labeled for "Maxine's Maraschinos."

MARASCHINO CHERRIES

1 gallon water 3 ounces sodium-acid sulfite
1/8 ounce citric acid 1/2 ounce calcium carbonate
Stir mixture together in a stoneware glass or wooden container with wooden paddle. When combined, (it will be milky) add unstemmed and unpitted cherries, keeping well covered with the brine.

After at least two weeks (commercial packers often let them stand for years before finishing), remove from brine and freshen. It is best to keep the cherries under running cold water for several days to freshen. We put ours outside and let the hose run into them slowly for at least two days. This washing is important, as the cherries will taste of the sulphur if not thoroughly washed free of it. Test by stemming and pitting one and tasting if entirely free of flavor, they are ready.

When thoroughly washed, stem and pit. A pair of rubber gloves is recommended to protect the hands.

For each gallon of syrup needed, combine 1 gallon water, 8 cups sugar, red coloring to desired tint and 1 teaspoon citric acid. Add cherries and boil 3 minutes. Set aside to cool for 24 hours. Drain off syrup and measure. To each 4 cups syrup, add 4 cups more sugar and coloring if needed, and add almond or wild cherry flavoring to suit the taste. Return cherries to syrup, heat to boiling and pack in hot, sterilized jars. Put into water and boil for 15 minutes, complete the sealing.

Raspberries are in, too, so here is the recipe for a stirred jam, which turn out to be a bright, fairly thick consistency without the necessity for lemon juice or other thickening agent:

STIRRED RASPBERRY JAM

3 cups crushed berries 3 cups sugar
Bring berries to a boil, boil two minutes then add sugar and stir until dissolved. Boil for 1 minute, put over a low flame and beat hard whole cooking for 4 or 5 minutes. Pour into glasses. Do not double recipe.
