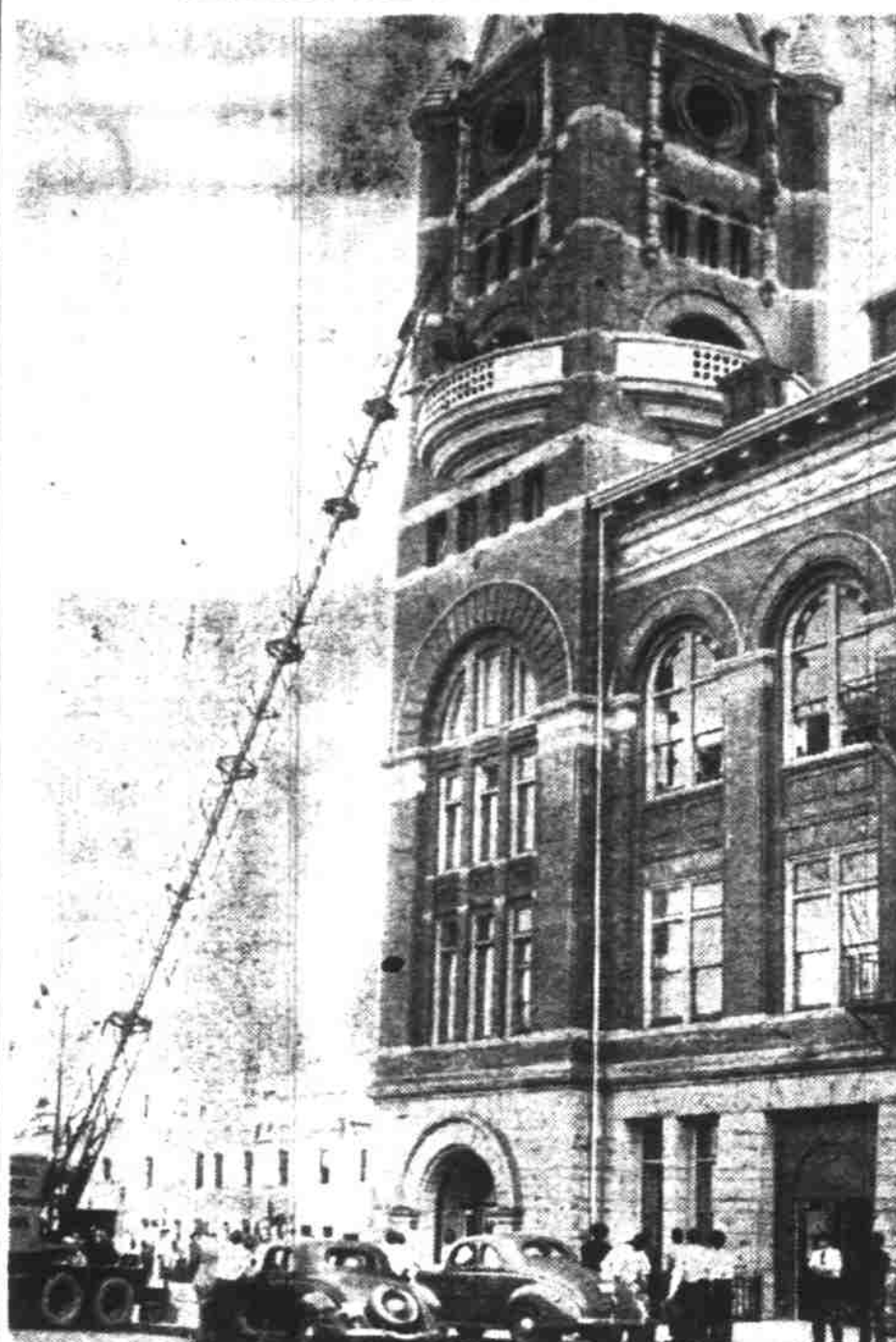

Highway Ave. Improvement Sought of City

Petition for improvement of Highway Avenue as originally planned and for a hearing on proposed curbing changes was filed with Salem city recorder Friday by 26 residents of the street.

The issue arose in City Council last Monday night in a request from Willamette Valley Transfer Co. to have a total of 105 feet of driveway in its 180-foot frontage, which would require special Council approval.

At that time one of the residents said the original petitioners for the street had understood that the city engineer's office would be according to the standard ordinance, allowing 30 feet per 100 feet of frontage.

He said the transfer firm had not signed the improvement petition and accused it of allowing its trucks to knock down residents' mail boxes.

Yesterday's petition asks for the paving and curb work, already started, "pursuant to the ordinance in effect when the petition was granted."

The ordinance applied to every citizen and property owner without favoritism, discrimination or partiality.

The Council tabled the matter until its July 14 session.

Lawyers Give Service for Bonus Cases

The Oregon State Bar Association has agreed to waive minimum fees in connection with setting up guardianships for beneficiaries of the Oregon bonus, the State Veterans Department announced on Friday.

The boards of governors of the bar association decided that a general policy could not be established but recommended that attorneys consider each guardianship case upon its own merit and that where hardship is indicated, they recommended members of the bar handle the necessary legal proceedings on a reduced fee basis or even waive the entire fee.

The Oregon bonus act requires that a guardian be appointed where an incompetent veteran, or the surviving child of a deceased war veteran, is entitled to a bonus payment of more than \$250.

Where payment is \$250 or less, and no guardianship exists, the payment will be made to the person who has assumed the major responsibility for the care of the minor or incompetent, as determined by the director of veterans affairs and the department advisory committee.

Where an Oregon serviceman died in service during World War I or dies after discharge from injuries, wounds or disease incurred in service, the bonus act provides in payment of the \$600 maximum, in priority to the unmarried widow, to the child or children, or to the parent or parents of the deceased.

If two or more children are the beneficiaries, the bonus is divided equally among them, so guardianship is necessary where division of the bonus reduces the payment to each child to \$250 or less. If the widow has remarried and removes herself from entitlement, the children of the deceased serviceman may still receive the bonus.
