11-Year-Old Bride Back Home After One-Day Honeymoon

DENISON, Tex. (AP)—An 11-year-old bride was back home with mother Friday after a one-day honeymoon with an Air Force enlisted man.

Apple checked Mary Kendrick, who will be 12 on July 19, and Airman Sergio Maldonado Tristan, 21, of San Antonio were married Wednesday at Sherman, Tex.

Her mother, Mrs. Cleo Kendrick of Durant, Okla., had police pick up the couple Thursday. Tristan is on KP duty at Perrin Air Force Base.

"She looked more than 11 to me," said Justice of the Peace Jim Spangler, who married them. The bride's mother, who has eight other children, will meet with Air Force officials Saturday to take steps to have the marriage annulled.

"If I thought she had any idea of what marriage means," the mother said, "I'd leave them alone."

"I told him that my daughter was only 11," Mrs. Kendrick said. Mary sobbed.

"Yes, and I told Tristan not to believe her or anyone else. I told him I was 16 going on 17. But I do love him, I'd rather be with him than anyone."

But she admitted to reporter John Clift of the Denison Herald that she was only 11.

The bride said she met the airman two months ago at Durant. After their marriage they decided to tell her mother and were enroute to Durant when police

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picked them up at Denison. "We were just going to talk to mama," the girl said, "but we never got a chance."

Police held Mary as a juvenile runaway until her mother arrived. They took Tristan back to the base.

Perrin officials quoted him as saying he was "sure she is older than 11."

Later he told a reporter he had nothing to say until he sees a lawyer.

Mary said she had read how to cook in books. She completed the fifth grade this spring. She is 5 feet 2 1/2 and weighs 115 pounds.
