U.N. Given Documents Showing How Russia Spreads Slave Labor

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—The United States has turned over to the U. N. a three-foot high stack of documents it says provide shocking evidence Russia is spreading her slave labor system under the Red flag.

The U. S. was the first government to present such evidence to the U. N. special committee on forced labor. The committee winds up its second session of closed hearings with a preliminary appraisal Tuesday of testimony from refugee groups and international labor unions.

More than 18,000 statements from Polish soldiers who were Russian prisoners of war are included in the documents. The originals are housed in the Hoover Library at Stanford University.

In addition, the U. S. produced several thousand more statements gathered for the State Department by International Public Opinion Research, Inc., a New York group.

Its investigators talked with returned German and Japanese prisoners of war who described how the Russians were overworking and starving their own people in concentration camps up to 1950.

Among the documents were official statements and legal extracts showing how Communist countries passed special laws to govern the use of forced labor and boasting how so-called enemies of the state were put to work on roads, canals, irrigation ditches and farms.

Walter Kotschnig, deputy U. S. representative on the U. N. Economic and Social Council, turned the documents over to Sir Ram-

aswami Mudaliar, Indian chairman of the committee.

Wherever the Communist flag goes, slave labor practices follow, Kotschnig said. He told a new conference the documents were "shocking evidence that in the 20th century there should still be practiced—and by some members of the United Nations—slavery of a type and on a scale the world has never before known."

"It is worse than any slavery which has gone before because it is aimed at wiping out dissidents, at destroying ethnic and political groups. Communism stands indicted by it."

Later, the announcement said, clothing may be canned for shipments within the United States "if it becomes practical."

The command's headquarters at Wright-Patterson Air Force base, Ohio, made test shipments which proved that the containers were cheaper and better than any other type of clothing package in general use, the Air Force said.

WASHINGTON (AP)—They've canned everything else. Now the Air Force is canning clothing.

The Air Material Command announced Sunday that the 195 quartermaster-type items worn by airmen—5,418 varieties and sizes of uniforms, underwear, shoes and the like—are being packed in iron drums for overseas shipment.

A fire equipment display and show by the McMinnville Volunteer firemen will precede the fireworks and is scheduled to get underway at 9 p.m.



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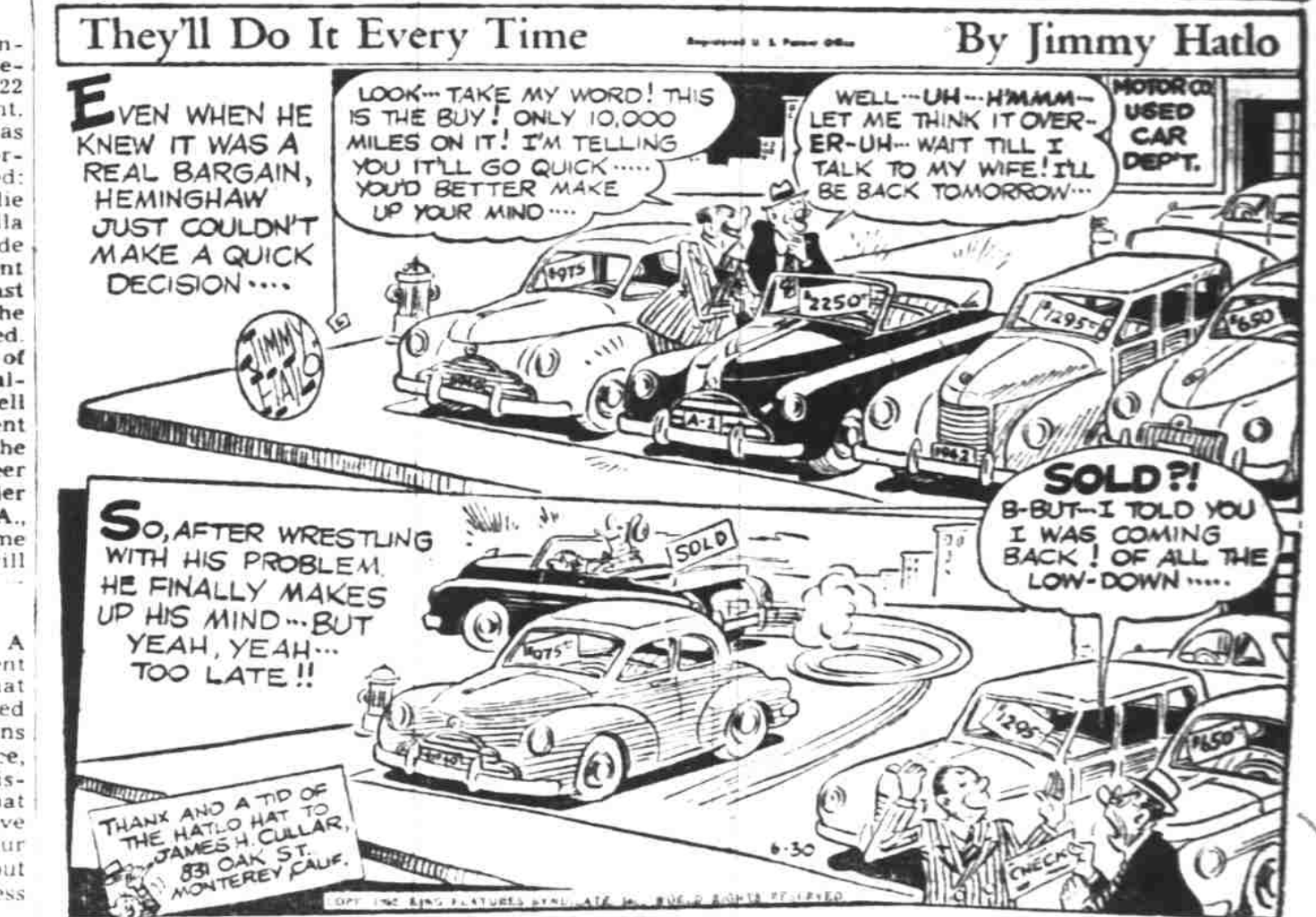
100 Attend Powell Clan's 35th Reunion

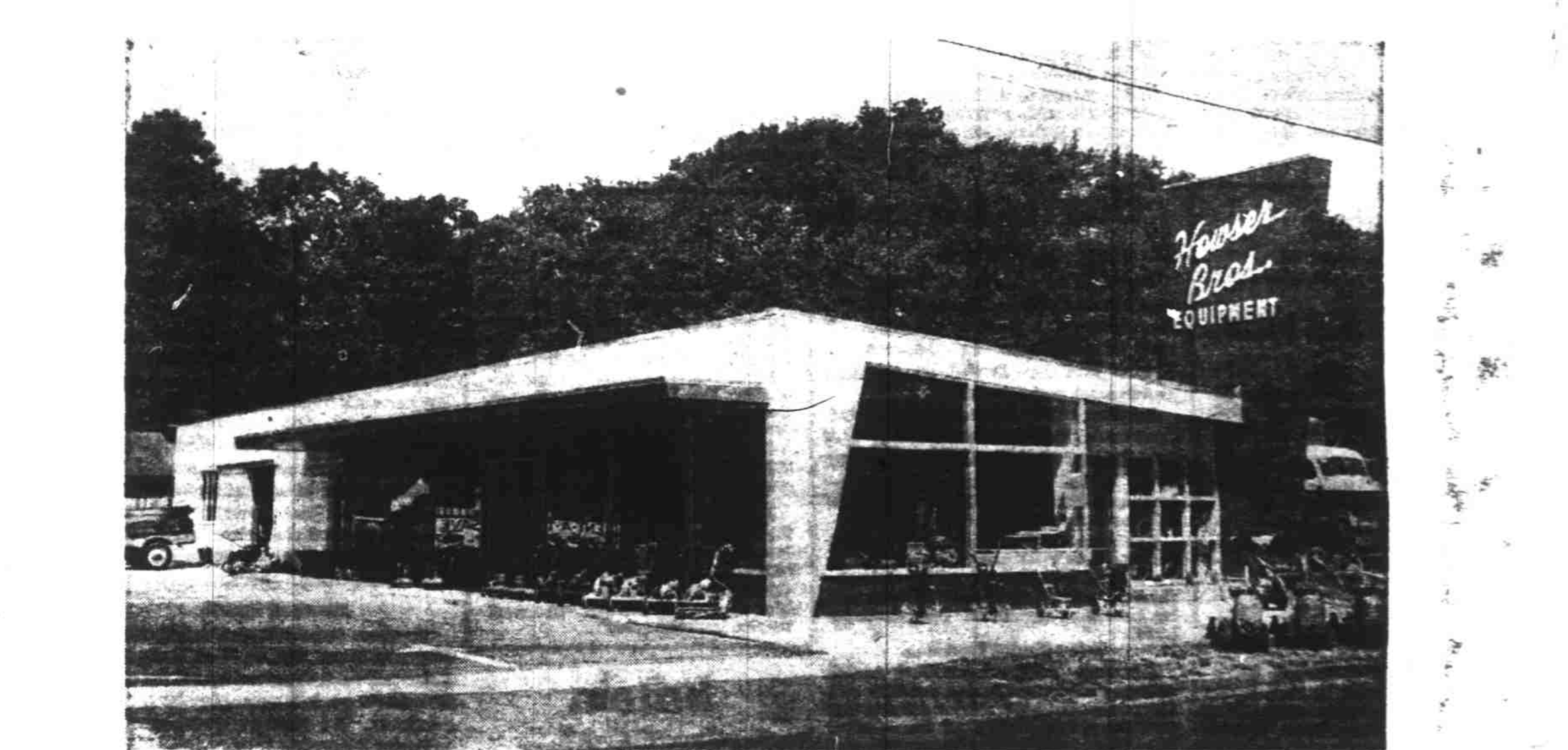
CONVERSION
