

Town, Country Church Meet Set July 15-18

Rural and town pastors as well as lay folk are making plans to attend the annual meeting of the four-day Oregon Leadership Institute for Town and Country Churches at Corvallis July 15 through 18.

The Rev. Don F. Pielstick, department of town and country church, National Council of Churches, New York City, will be among the top-notch speakers at the institute. The Rev. Mr. Pielstick will discuss: "A Rural Church Acceptable to God," during the opening morning's session. He will also make the institute summary at the closing session Friday afternoon, July 18.

As in the past institutes, dormitory space and meals for those attending the institute are available at nominal cost. Dr. Glenn A. Bakum, head of the Oregon State College sociology department and chairman of the institute planning committee, reports. National town and country committees of several denominations are offering scholarships which are obtainable by applying directly to state or district headquarters of denominations concerned. Dr. Bakum advises seeing your local church in reference to these should you wish one. Those attending the daytime sessions and not wishing dormitory space, may have their meals at the college with the others, Dr. Bakum adds.

Stated purposes of the institute are to bring together rural pastors, lay leaders and professional church workers; to discuss better methods for town and country work; to become better acquainted with the significant functions and opportunities of the rural church; to recognize available social, economic, religious and educational resources of the local community, state and nation, and to develop fellowship through planned discussions and informal social and recreational activities.

Report of an analysis of Oregon rural church life will be presented by Dr. John W. Berry, Pacific University sociological department, Forest Grove.

A symposium on rural life will also be given by members of the rural life committee of the 1952 agricultural conference which was held in Corvallis last March. Leader will be Harley Lloyd of Jefferson. Others appearing with him will include Mrs. Floyd Fox, Silverton; Mrs. Lee Holiday, Klamath Falls, and Mrs. Leslie Kribbs, Bend.

Those planning the institute report that there is more interest in rural churches in the Willamette Valley now than there has been for some years past. Some of the older pioneer churches, which had been closed for some years, are showing indications of "life" again, the reports show.

The non-eating competition will be held at a Buenos Aires side-show, with the contestants sealed in glass.

Two Hospital Patients Die In Heat Wave

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—Two patients at Brice hospital for the insane died from heat exhaustion the past week due to lack of ventilation, Supt. J. S. Tarwater said Monday.

One man died from overheating Sunday and another last week, Tarwater said. He declined to give their names.

He added that the recent heat and lack of a ventilating system have been contributing factors in the deaths of several other patients.

Tarwater made the disclosure in appealing to the state building commission for a \$27,000 allocation to install window and attic fans.

Sec. Acheson Joins Austria 'Freedom Fight'

VIENNA, Austria (AP)—U. S. Secretary of State Dean Acheson gave Austria a pledge from President Truman Monday the United States would do everything within its power to restore "final freedom" to this occupied country.

He promised American troops will stay here as long as the Russians, whom he blamed for blocking the independence of this Western outpost astride the Iron Curtain.

After a visit with Dr. Theodor Koerner, Austria's aged Socialist President, Acheson told a news conference:

"Soviet refusal to accept any sort of treaty is due to the fact the Russians do not want any sort of a treaty, which means that occupation is something they regard to their interest."

Acheson is making a two-day visit to Austria which is still occupied by American, British, French and Russian troops seven years after the war.

He came here from Berlin to praise the "tenacity" of Austrians in their struggle for full freedom. Tuesday the American official takes off in President Truman's personal plane, the Independence, for Brazil for an official visit before returning to Washington.

Everywhere Acheson went in Vienna, he was cheered by thousands of Communist-hating Viennese.

To the conference of Austrian and Allied newsmen, Acheson said: "Make no mistake about it: Of the four powers in Austria, three want to go home."

The U. S., British and French troops here total 25,000; the Russians have an estimated 40,000.

Lebanon Girls Returned Home

Two teen-age Lebanon girls were returned home Monday with the aid of Salem city police after the pair had spent seven days away from their homes.

The two, ages 14 and 15, had left Lebanon June 23 while a carnival was playing in town during the Strawberry Festival. A police report revealed that the girls had traveled to Salem with two 24-year-old carnival workers and the two men were said to have paid for the girls' lodging in a motel. The girls said the men then left them and they hadn't seen them since.

The father of one of the girls took them home Monday.

GOP Committee To Elect Officers

Officers of the new Marion County Republican Central Committee are to be elected at a meeting of precinct committeemen tonight at 8 o'clock. The session will be in Judge Joseph Felton's courtroom in the Salem School Office Building.

Leon Margosian, Salem, who has served as chairman during the past year, said he would not be a candidate for the position again.

Winton Hunt, Woodburn, was considered by leaders as the most likely candidate for the chairmanship. He is president of the county chapter of Oregon Republican Clubs.
