KSLM Asks TV Channel; Site Selected

Willamette Valley television-set owners will be viewing TV on Channel 3 if the application submitted to the FCC Monday is granted to Oregon Radio, Inc., according to Glenn McCormick, president.

Application for television for KORE at Eugene, sister station of KSLM, was filed at the same time.

McCormick also announced that a tower site had been selected in the Eola hills above Popcorn School which will allow a tower elevation of 1394 feet above sea level. An alternate site of Gehlar Road was also offered for approval of the first choice site will assure primary TV coverage from Eugene through Portland, according to engineering surveys.

Present plans, McCormick stated, call for expanding studio facilities at the present KSLM transmitter location in Kingwood Heights for television production. Dr. Collins W. Utter, also from Salem, and Dr. Bernard E. Smith of Independence, are Army reservists.

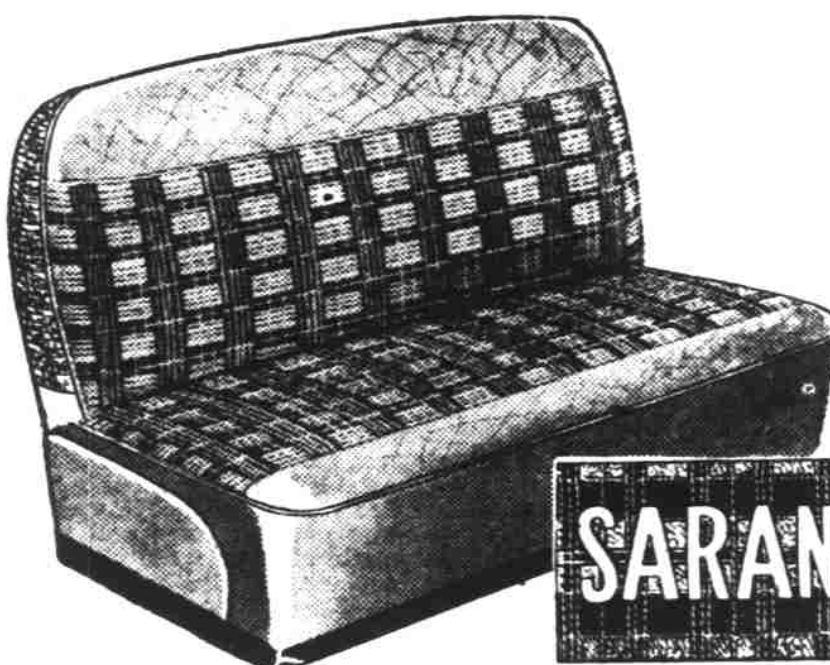
