The determined first sacker got off to an inauspicious start, but for the past few weeks has been carrying much of the offensive load for the team. His 20 two-baggers are only a couple short of the league lead in that department. And since Dick has been married only a few weeks, no doubt the pretty and inspirational Mrs. B. is deserving of some of the credit. So eager are the Idaho Vandals to get going with the 1952 football season that they've already submitted their prospective grid roster, same listing the charts on 50 aspirants, including 22 lettermen. Of the squad Vandal Coach Babe Curfman has here to say: "Football prospects here at the University of Idaho for the 1952 season are the brightest they have been since I came to Idaho in 1949. We will have a rather odd squad in a way—all seniors and sophomores; but if you will remember last fall saw one of the best freshman classes, athletically speaking, to enroll at the university in years. Out of that freshman football group three won letters and the remainder gives us the nucleus for a fine football squad this fall." Speaking of football, Portland's Multnomah Stadium lists one of its most attractive schedules in history for the coming season. August 23 starts it off with the 5th annual Shrine Hospital All-Star game, and then in order: August 30, Los Angeles Rams vs. Chicago Cardinals; September 19, the gigantic game that is the Portland high school jamboree; September 26, U of Hawaii vs. Lewis & Clark; September 27, Oregon vs. Nebraska; October 4, Oregon State vs. Michigan State; October 11, California vs. Oregon; October 18, Southern California vs. Oregon State; October 24, Central Catholic vs. Columbia Prep; October 25, Willamette vs. Lewis & Clark; November 1, Washington vs. Oregon State; November 14, quarterfinals for state high school championship; November 15, Idaho State vs. Lewis & Clark; November 22, Oregon vs. Oregon State; November 29, high school championship game.

Consequently if Portland fans don't get their full share of the nation's touchdowning next Autumn, it won't be the stadium's fault.

## Durocher to Coach

## Brooks, Giants Lead List Of Nationals in All-Star

CINCINNATI (AP)—Brooklyn and New York, running one-two in the National League pennant race, will provide 12 of the 25 players on the league's squad, which will clash with an American League outfit in the annual major league all-star game at Philadelphia July 8. Makeup of the National League's all-star group was announced Sunday through the office of President Warren Giles. Leo Durocher, as manager of last year's pennant-winning New York Giants, will pilot the All-Stars and under game rules he'll be required to start the eight players selected in a nation-wide vote of the fans. They must be used for three innings. Durocher picked the remaining members of the squad and all of the pitchers. Here is the complete squad Durocher will send against the American leaguers:

Under that setup the Dodgers will be represented by seven players, New York by five, St. Louis by four, Philadelphia and Chicago by three each and Cincinnati, Boston and Pittsburgh by one each. The vote of the fans named these players as starters: Stanky, Shellenback Named

Durocher named Manager Eddie Stanky of the St. Louis Cards and Frank Shellenback of the Giants as his coaches. Herman Franks of the Giants will be the batting practice catcher. Batting practice pitchers will be Coach Fred Fitzsimmons and Dave Koslo of the Giants with one to be named later.

Frank Bowman of the Giants will be the trainer; Eddie Brannick of the Giants, secretary; Henry Russell of the Phils clubhouse attendant, and Kenneth Bush of the Phils, batboy.

Making their first appearance on an all-star squad will be Simmons, Staley, Westrum, Atwell, Lockman, Hammer, Hatton and Durlilo.

# Giants Sweep Pair as Dodgers Lose

## Sacs Shade Senators 4-3; Spokanes Here Tonight

### 3,330 Watch Salems Outhit

### Foe; Errors, Passes Do It

Joe Gordon's Sacramento Solons caught the town Senators with their defense sagging in last night's exhibition battle at Waters Field, and despite collecting but five base hits, all singles, scored four runs to beat the resident nine 4-3. Three of the four tallies were unearned. A crowd estimated at 3,330, second largest of the season, witnessed the game. The 3,387 of opening night was the only gathering topping last night's, and when the final official attendance totals are in, perhaps the Sac game will move to the No. 1 spot on the turnstile list. The Senators tonight get back to the serious WIL business at hand, that of elaborating on a sizzling streak that has seen them win eight of their last 10 league outings. The Spokane Indians, nestled in third place in the standings, open a three-game series here tonight, with game time at 8:15 o'clock. The Salems are but 6 1/2 games in arrears of the third placers bossed by Don Osborn, and could make up some right valuable ground in the forthcoming three mixes.

The Salems are but two games out of fourth place. Tall Dick Aubertin, the buzz-balling member of the Senators staff who could beat the New York Yankees if he could only get his serves over the plate consistently, was last night's victim. He had a frightful time with his control, allowing 10 walks and committing three wild pitches and an error in his 6 1/2 innings.

The Sacs weren't giving Aubertin any trouble with their hit-willows. He brought it all on himself with such generosity.

And even at that were it not for his own error in the sixth and another by Tommy Galli in the first frame, the Coast Leaguers would have scored but one run.

Galli's error and four walks pushed in two unearned runs in the first. Two more walks, Aubertin's throwing error, a wild pitch and Al Anieich's squeeze bunt scored again for the Sacs in the sixth. Then with two out in the seventh Bill Glynn and Eddie Bockman singled off the tiring Aubertin. When he walked both Jim McKeegan and Jack Steinagel to force in the fourth run, Boss Hugh Luby motioned in Bud Francis. The 20-year-old righthander breezed through the enemy in easy fashion thereafter.

Another hard-throwing, and wild righthander opened for the Sacs, a long and tall kid named Roger Osenbaugh. A walk to Gene Tansell in the first frame, Connie Perez' line single to right and a force play scored one for the Senators. They got another in the fourth on Perez' bunt hit on which a throwing error was also made by Osenbaugh, a ground-out and a wild pitch.

Salem threatened Osenbaugh and his successor, Righthander Jerry Hall, in four innings after that, but bad base running in the fifth and insufficient punch in the seventh, eighth and ninth ruined the local bid for a second straight verdict over PCL opposition. Salem had two runners on in both the seventh and eighth but could not produce.

The final Salem run in the ninth was unearned. Dick Bartle lashed out a single to start with, and with two out Center-fielder Ed Roberts dropped Galli's high fly. Perez immediately drilled his fourth hit of the night into right field, scoring Bartle. Big Bill White had a chance to do some real damage right after that, but ended the game with a high fly to left field. Salem had nine hits, all singles, and four by Perez. Bartle and Devo each had two. McKeegan rifled out two of the five Sac hits, and the other Sacramento visiting hero, Richie Myers, could do nothing damaging in four tries. Richie did bounce around the shortpatch with his customary class, however. Mgr. Gordon didn't play, limiting his appearance to hitting infield practice and joining the Sac batting exhibition shortly before game time. Myers did the pitching to Gordon, Glynn and Joe Marty, but must have had too much for them. Neither could loft one out of the ball yard.

## Luke Easter

### Optioned to Indianapolis

CLEVELAND (AP)—Luke Easter, on whose six-foot-four frame the Cleveland Indians had pinned a big chunk of their 1952 pennant hopes, was optioned to Indianapolis Monday night.

The 235-pound first baseman will be on 24-hour recall, and both Manager Al Lopez and General Manager Hank Greenberg say they expect to bring him back when he regains his stride.

In 63 of the 69 Cleveland games this season, Luke's batting has averaged only .208, lowest of any Tribe regular. His 11 homers are seventh high in the league, but in addition to 35 strikeouts, Luke—slowed by a bad knee—has hit into frequent double plays. Recently his batting slump appeared to have affected his fielding for the worse.

From Indianapolis, Cleveland's American Association farm club, the Indians purchased Dave Pope, 27-year-old Negro outfielder from Library, Pa.

Harry Simpson will move from right field to Easter's place at first base, and Pope, a left-handed batter, or Jim Fridley, a right-handed hitter, will take over for Simpson in right field.

## Chisox, Senators Move Up; Cards, Cubs Post Victories

Sal Maglie looked anything but an All-Star pitcher Monday night as his New York Giant teammates took a two-night doubleheader from the Boston Braves to chop Brooklyn's National League lead to 3 1/2 games.

Maglie received credit for the Giants' 8-7 triumph in the opener while Larry Jansen turned in a 4-0 five-hit victory in the second game. The Dodgers dropped a 4-0 decision to Karl Drews and the Philadelphia Phillies. In other National League games the St. Louis Cardinals downed Cincinnati, 7-3, and Chicago edged Pittsburgh, 5-4, in the lone day action.

The American League race also tightened up as the Boston Red Sox knocked off the front-running New York Yankees, 4-3.

Chicago moved into third place by trouncing the tail-end Detroit Tigers, 7-2. Washington climbed from fifth to four by beating the Philadelphia Athletics, 6-2. Cleveland's idle Indians, tumbled to fifth, only four games off the pace and two percentage points behind Washington.

Maglie, who has finished only one game in his last eight starts, was given a 7-2 lead but he was tagged for two runs in the seventh and pounded out during a three-run eighth. Dave Koslo came on to save Maglie's 11th victory.

Hank Thompson, with a pair of homers, led the Giants' 13 hit attack. Drews mowed the Dodgers down on five singles and was greatly aided by four double plays. The shutout was Drews' third and his second over the Dodgers.

Gerry Staley, an All-Star mate of Maglie, recorded his 10th victory for the Cards. Staley blanked the Reds for seven innings and then tired but he managed to finish up. Stan Musial started the Cards off to victory with a two-run homer in the first inning off Ewell Blackwell.

Roy Smalley drove in all of Chicago's runs in last Pittsburgh's shutout. Smalley won the game with a three-run homer in the eighth.

Dick Brodowski, 19-year-old rookie righthander, turned back the Yanks on four hits and fanned eight as Boston scored its first victory of the season in Yankee Stadium. Two of the Yankee blows were home runs by Joe Collins and Bobby Brown.

Brown's third error of the game in the eighth inning enabled Vern Stephens to score the Red Sox' winning run.

Old Joe Dobson set the Tigers down on five hits to gain his ninth victory. Shaine Loller clinched it with a two-run homer in the seventh.

Spec Shea scattered seven Philadelphia hits to post his sixth victory. Jim Busby sewed up the game with a three-run double in the first inning off Harry Byrd.

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## Harlow-UO Sever Pact

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Journal reported Monday that Gene Harlow, University of Oregon football line coach, will be at Tulane University next fall.

Harlow was quoted as saying he had telephoned his resignation to Oregon officials in order to become line coach at Tulane.
