

House Votes Indian Bureau Investigations

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House voted Tuesday to have the Bureau of Indian Affairs investigate the American Indian, and then decided to have one of its own committees investigate the Bureau.

In separate actions approved by voice vote it ordered the Bureau to investigate and find out how soon the Indians will be able to manage their own affairs without government control, and directed the Interior Affairs Committee to probe the Bureau.

Specifically, the Interior committee will try to find out what the Bureau is doing to provide self-management for the Indians, how it has handled its guardianship of the Indians, and how it has taken care of the property of Indian wards.

The House decision to investigate the Bureau came on a resolution sponsored by Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.), which called attention to alleged irregularities in land transactions by Bureau employees in Oregon and directed the committee to study the adequacy of present laws regulating the Bureau's handling of Indian lands.

A report of the committee's findings is to be made before the new Congress is sworn in next Jan. 3.

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—Lightning struck a blow for life—a temporary reprieve for a man sentenced to die in the electric chair. Albert Jackson Jr., 23-year-old Charlottesville Negro, was slated to be electrocuted Monday for the rape of a 40-year-old white woman.

But lightning damaged the power line leading to the chair at the state penitentiary here on Friday. Repairs were not completed until Monday.

Now the case goes back to the trial court—for a new death date.

'Green' Pilots May Explain Absence of Red Air Force During Power Plant Raids

TOKYO (AP)—The mystery of why the Chinese Communist air force made no attempt to save the vital Yalu River power plant from destruction may be solved.

It may be that the U. S. Air Force chose June 23 for the smashing raid because it knew the Reds had just brought to Manchuria a batch of green pilots for training.

Pilots who pressed home the great assault on the Suhoi plant saw 200 Soviet MIG-15 jets parked on the Manchurian base of An-tung, only 30 miles away. Not one of these jets challenged the raiders, to the astonishment of U. S. air commanders.

Whether the raid was timed to catch the Red forces at a low point is, of course, an Allied secret. But there are indications.

Ability Varies
For months the Allied pilots have noted a periodic up-and-down in the fighting ability of their MIG foes. This has been shown to mean that the Communists are using "MIG Alley" near the Manchurian border as a school.

A particularly poor showing means a new class of MIG pilots has arrived. A good showing means the class is near graduation.

Pilots in May were saying the MIG pilots they met were very sharp and "just about to finish school."

From the looks of the Far East Air Forces monthly summary, a new Communist class went to school in "MIG Alley" in June.

MIG's Destroyed
In that month 22 Red planes—18 of them MIGs—were destroyed in air combat. One U. S. jet was shot down in air battle in that period.

Communists last week mentioned the date for the Suhoi raid had been changed. The raid could have been postponed until the experienced Red pilots had finished "school."

One hundred speedy U. S. Sabre jets flew over the Suhoi raid. But the Reds have showed no hesitancy before in challenging the Sabre cover when Allied raids endangered valuable installations.

If the Red pilots were fledglings it is possible the Communist air command kept them grounded in the Manchurian sanctuary to prevent a massacre and the loss of front-line jets.

Commiss Ask Truce Delay

MUNSAN, Korea (AP)—Communist truce negotiators Wednesday asked for a surprise one-day postponement of the Korean armistice talks. The United Nations Command agreed.

No reason was given by the Reds for the postponement. It was asked at a meeting of liaison officers.

The Communists may still be studying an Allied outline of armistice proposals which gave the Reds an opportunity to save face on the deadlocked prisoner of war exchange issue.

Fire Destroys Liberty Barn

LIBERTY (AP)—Fire of undetermined cause Tuesday destroyed a barn at the S. M. Earle farm, a mile west of Liberty on Skyline Road.

A tractor, duster, trailers, ladders and fruit boxes were lost in the blaze. Earle estimated damage at \$3,000 which he said was partially insured.

The entire roof of the barn was ablaze when a neighbor first noticed the fire about 1:30 p.m. Liberty-Salem rights firemen responded and were credited with keeping the fire from spreading.

No Change in Boy's Condition

With little more than "mostly unconscious" reported Tuesday by Good Samaritan Hospital in Portland, two-year-old Kip Wolfer continued to struggle for wakefulness in his fight for life.

Kip, son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Wolfer, 3825 Monroe Ave., is going into his second week of unconsciousness since being struck by an auto in front of his home June 23. He is suffering a skull fracture.

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—Democratic Congressman Victor Wickersham and Toby Morris headed for a run-off election Tuesday night on the basis of incomplete returns from Oklahoma's first primary.

Districts of the two were combined as a result of a 1950 population decline.

Four other state Congressmen who were seeking reelection were holding commanding leads and apparently escaped a run-off.

The Sixth District was the hottest because of the two incumbents being thrown together in a big, new 23-county district. Both have campaigned actively. The Democratic nominee is virtually assured of election, in all but the first and fifth districts.

GREENWOOD LAKE, N. Y. (AP)—Rocky Marciano, Brockton, Mass., heavyweight, opened his camp Tuesday for his July 28 Yankee Stadium bout with Harry Matthews of Seattle. The Brockton boxer said he weighed 194 pounds and that he had been doing 10 miles of roadwork a day for the past three weeks and had been strengthening his arms by throwing heavy stones and rocks.
