

Reclamation Projects Win Solons' Vote

WASHINGTON (AP)—Ten new Reclamation Bureau projects, including three in the Pacific-Northwest were approved by a Senate-House conference committee Wednesday.

Value of the 10 projects is \$14,950,000, of which \$2,350,000 would be spent in the northwest. The recommendations still are subject to approval of the Senate and House. The action was seen as a victory for the Senate, which had earlier voted nearly 15 million dollars for this work after the house had rejected any funds for new construction.

The three northwest projects were:

- Minidoka, north side pumping division, Idaho, \$150,000.
- Savage Rapids Dam, Ore., \$700,000.
- Yakima, Kennewick Division, Wash., 1 1/2 million.

The conference concluded work on the appropriation for the Interior Department for the year which began Tuesday but did not announce the total nor specific changes made in earlier proposals.

Rep. Kirwin (D-Ohio), chairman of the House conferees, said the total is somewhere between the \$367,327,164 voted by the Senate and the \$486,248,253 proposed by the House.

The 10 new projects and amounts approved for them were revealed by Sen. Hayden (D-Ariz.), chairman of the Senate conferees. He declined to reveal any other changes.

Sen. Chavez (D-N.M.) told a reporter the committee had allowed a flat 17 million dollars for Indian Bureau construction throughout the country. He did not specify where the money was to be spent except to say that \$10,200,000 would be for the Navajo-Hopi long range rehabilitation program.

AFL Teamster Strike Settled

SEATTLE (AP)—A strike of the Teamsters' Union AFL against s'x northwest wholesaler grocery houses was settled Wednesday evening. Union officials said they were attempting to contact teamsters to have them back at work Thursday morning.

The walkout started last Thursday against Safeway Stores Inc., supply houses and the Associated Grocers Co-Op in Seattle. It spread later to four other concerns and had hampered delivery of goods to grocery stores in the region.

A union official said the settlement included a wage increase and other benefits but he said terms would not be revealed until a formal contract is drawn up, probably Thursday.

Kip Wolfer Said Slightly Improved

Kip Wolfer was said by authorities at Good Samaritan Hospital in Portland to be "slightly improved" Wednesday night.

A neighbor of the Wolfer's said he had talked to Martin Wolfer, Kip's father, and he mentioned they were feeding the lad a little solid food Wednesday. The boy has never completely regained consciousness since he was struck by an auto in front of his home at 3835 Monroe Ave. June 23.

Spokane Pea Acreage Cut

SPOKANE (AP)—Many of the Inland Empire's 1951 pea growers turned to wheat this year with the result that green pea acreage is down more than 50 per cent from last year.

This was reported Wednesday by Pete Stallcop, secretary of the Pacific Northwest Pea Growers and Dealers' Association.

Yellow pea acreage is down more than 30 per cent from last year, he added.

He said the fact that wheat prices are supported by the government while peas are not, probably was a prime factor in the smaller pea plantings this spring.

Also the ideal seeding conditions for winter wheat last fall played a part, he said.

Torgeson Fined \$100 for Beef

BOSTON (AP)—Boston Braves' outfielder-first baseman Earl Torgeson was fined \$100 Wednesday for slugging New York Giant catcher Sal Yvars in Tuesday night's game and Yvars drew a \$25 fine for breaking Torgeson's bat.

Dana Asserts Moral Threat Tops A-Bomb

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—Character erosion is a worse threat to the future of the nation than the atomic bomb, Marshall N. Dana, Portland, Ore., banker, said Wednesday.

Dana, a former newspaperman, addressed the Utah Pioneers Luncheon Club and sat for a sculptured portrait by Dr. Avarad Fairbanks, dean of the college of fine arts at the University of Utah. The bust will be placed in the Utah Western Hall of Fame.

"The erosion of character due to carelessly guarded homes, neglected moral principles, shattered faith and surrender to materialism constitute the greatest threat we face today," Dana said.

"This is a greater threat than the atom bomb to the future of the individual American aid to the American future."

Dana said the revolution that marked the nation's beginning must now be followed by a revolution in the hearts of men.

"It is imperative for strong men, free men, to make sure that they do not in apathy or obliviousness surrender the rights that make them free," he said.
