Need for Law Clerks Told by Supreme Court

Possibility that the 1953 legislature will be asked to appropriate funds for the employment of at least three law clerks for the State Supreme Court was indicated here this week.

This was announced when the Supreme Court found that increased litigation had made it impossible for the court to recess for its customary summer vacation. Although the court will not hear any more cases until September there are 14 cases at issue in which opinions will be written and handed down during the summer months.

It was argued that employment of law clerks for the court would speed up research operations and permit the seven court justices to write and hand down more opinions than under existing conditions.

Employment of law clerks would be in lieu of some agitation to increase the number of Supreme court justices. James T. Brand is now serving as chief justice of the county.

Benes Lecture At Willamette Slated Tuesday

Bohus Benes, visiting faculty member at Willamette's summer school, will present two public lectures this month, the first to be offered on Tuesday at 8 p.m. in Waller hall.

The educator, who is former diplomat and secretary to the late President Edward Benes of Czechoslovakia, will speak on "The Historical Heritage of the Soviet Union" in his initial lecture.

The lecture will be based upon Benes' belief that each nation has definite historical heritage which no regime or government of the nation can disregard. He will present the puzzling enigma of the Soviet leaders in the light of historical antecedents.

According to Prof. Benes, Stalin uses the same reactionary and undemocratic methods as did the Tsars of Imperial Russia to keep the Russian people subjugated. The only difference is in degree, says Benes, with Stalin's methods being more brutal and imperialistic.

As a staff member of the Czechoslovakia Ministry of Foreign Affairs for almost 30 years, Prof. Benes has had ample opportunity to ascertain how much of the historical past of the Russian people has penetrated into Soviet diplomacy and foreign policy.

He personally knew many Soviet diplomats and statesmen, including the late Litvinov, Radek, Madame Kolontay, Molotov and Gromyko.

In his lecture Tuesday evening, Prof. Benes will attempt to project the Russian past into the immediate future and discuss the possibilities of a third World War.

Portland 'Glad' Showing Bids Area Growers

Willamette Valley gladiolus growers, along with others in the state, are being invited to show in the first gladiolus show of the Oregon State Gladiolus Society set for July 26 to 27 at the Portland Woman's Club building. The show is the first of the north-west's summer series of gladiolus shows.

The event will feature divisions for juniors under 18 years, as well as a section for seedlings and sections for professional and amateur hybridizers and the usual displays of one and three-spoke entries, baskets, arrangements, corsages and commercial displays.

Mrs. J. George Eisenhauer at 3452 N. W. Thurman Portland 10, who is in charge of arrangements writes that "If you grow gladiolus—for fun or for profit—the newly formed Oregon State Gladiolus Society invites you to bring or send your finest spikes to the society's first annual state show. You need not be members of the society to show."

The society was organized last January 29 with a membership of 66 from throughout the state. This week, Thurman R. Evans, Portland, president of the group, reports that there are approximately 200 members, representing more than 50 Oregon communities. All of the state officers are amateurs who grow gladioli for pleasure only.

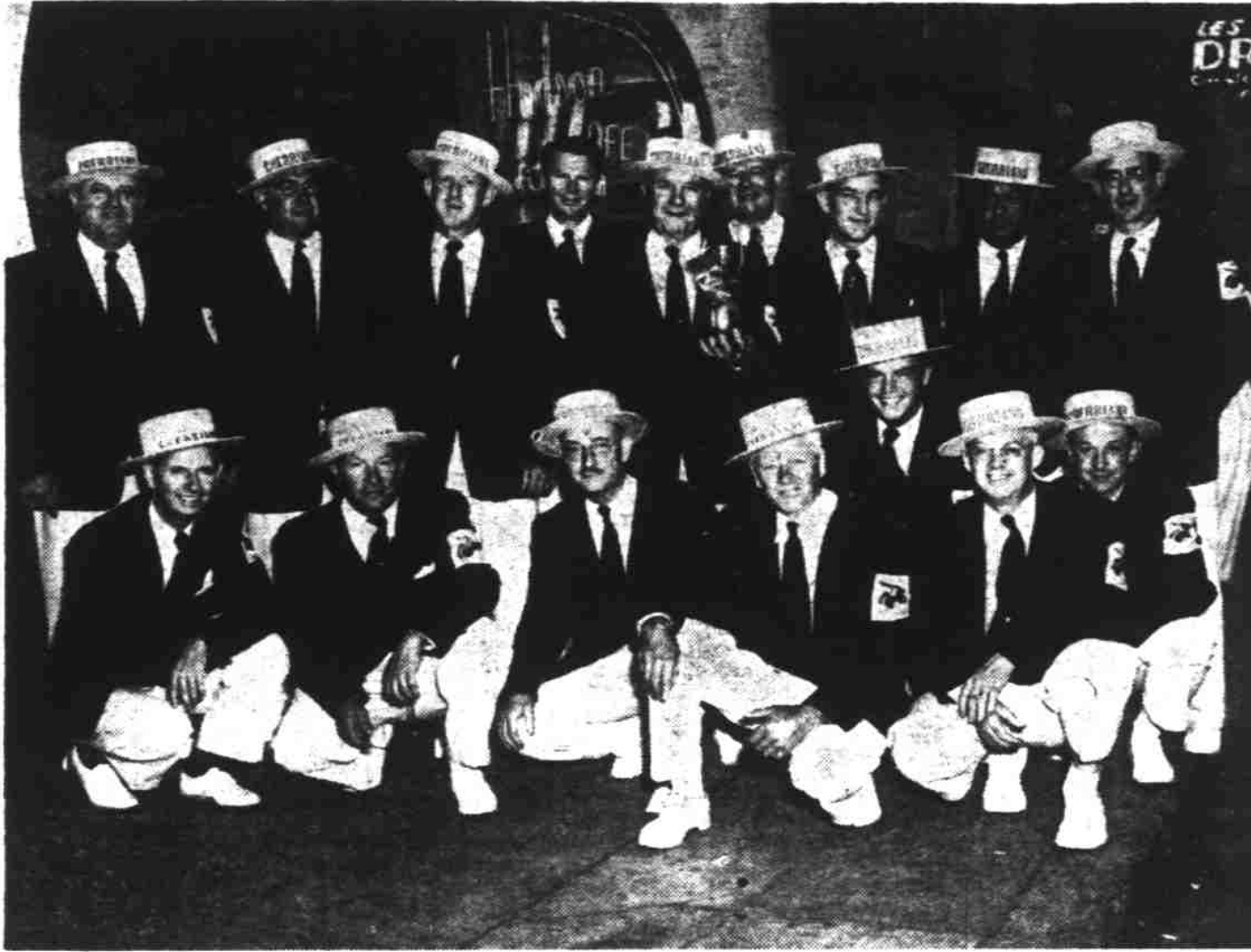
But growing gladioli in Oregon is not merely an amateur hobby. It has entered the channels of Big Business, as in 1951, more than \$1,500,000 worth of bulbs and cut flowers were sold from this state alone. Annual gladiolus plantings in Oregon now total about 750 acres, according to a recent survey from Oregon State College.

President Evans reports that he expects the state event will bring large numbers of gladiolus growers from throughout the north-west and elsewhere to Portland, and that many of these will follow on through to the Grants Pass Gladiolus Society show to be held in conjunction with the annual Grants Pass Gladiolus Festival, August 1 and 2. Show chairman at Grants Pass is Henry W. Turk, well-known to many gladiolus growers in the Willamette Valley.

Other gladiolus show dates set for the summer are August 5, Southern Idaho Gladiolus Society, Middleton; August 8-10, Western International Gladiolus Society, Yakima; August 13 and 14, Pacific International Gladiolus Society, Vancouver, B. C.; August 16 and 17, Washington Gladiolus Society, Auburn, Wash.; August 23-24, Pacific Northwest Gladiolus Society, Everett, Wash.

Karnes Grilled On 4-Year-Old Greenleaf Case

Investigation has virtually cleared Albert William Karnes, confessed slayer of Mrs. Susan Litchfield, of any connection with the Greenleaf murder of Mrs. Gora Rogers in 1946, police say.

Karnes, 24-year-old farm laborer became suspect in the Lane county slaying because of the similar 'modus operandi' or method of operation between it and the

axe slaying of Mrs. Litchfield here June 7.

State Police Captain Ray Howard said Karnes had been questioned extensively about the case and had repeatedly denied any connection in the death of the post-mistress-grocery store operator at Greenleaf. Howard said Karnes was employed and worked for an Idanha mill on Sept. 13 and Sept. 16, 1946, the day before and second day after the slaying.

Records indicate Karnes once was employed at Deadwood, some 20 miles from Greenleaf, but not until 1950, four years later.

Karnes will appear in Circuit Court here Monday to enter a plea in the Litchfield case. He admitted to the Salem police at The Dalles June 17 that he had slain the 81-year-old widow while

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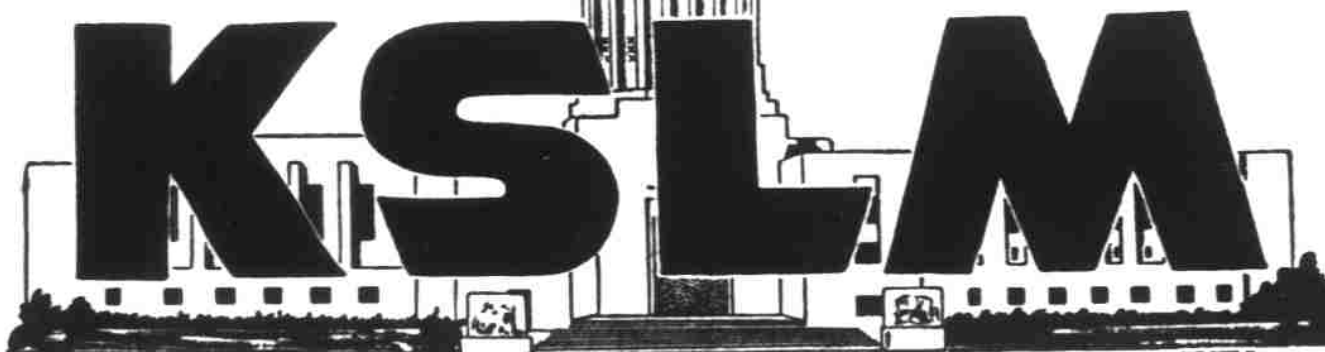

Tourist Rolls Up According to Registration

Tourist registrations at the Statehouse here far exceed those of any previous year, James McGilchrist, in charge of the Guide Service Bureau, reported Saturday.

The registrations show visitors from 35 states, three countries outside of the United States, two territories and the District of Columbia.

Most of the visitors, in registering, referred to the Oregon State Capitol plant as one of the most outstanding in the United States. Many others emphasized Oregon scenery, while others commented on the ideal climatic conditions and freedom from the intense heat now prevailing in many sections of the East and South.

For the first time in the history of the bureau three guides are on duty. Visitors are taken through the Capitol in groups with the dome one of the principal attractions.

Many of the visitors include farmers from the Middle-western states who are on their first trip to the Pacific Coast. A large number were enroute to California and British Columbia.

A liberal supply of literature, involving Oregon's summer resorts, is available to visitors, also located in Salem in the State Highway Department tourist bureau. Officials of the bureau said

they have received more inquiries from prospective Oregon visitors than ever before.

Big Russian Bomb Unearthed in Berlin

BERLIN (AP)—A 300-pound Russian bomb from World War II was unearthed Saturday by workmen at the spot where U. S. Secretary of State Acheson dedicated the American Memorial Library in West Berlin a week ago.

Berlin munitions experts, who took charge of the bomb, said it was live and could have exploded at any time.

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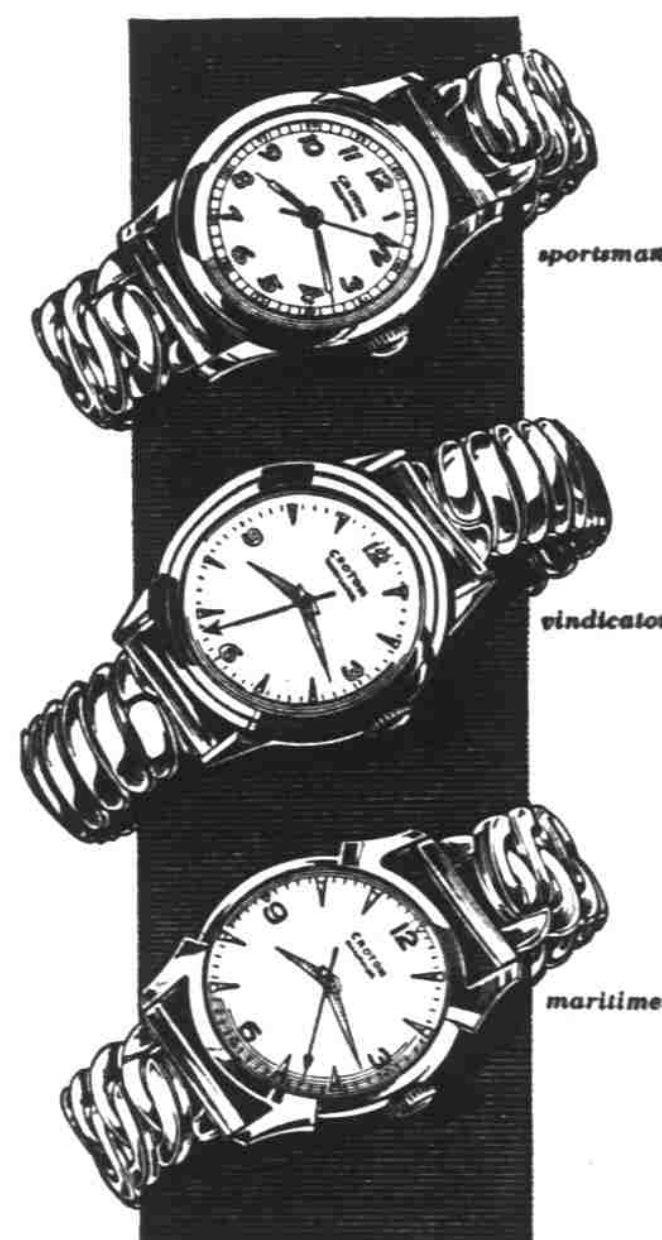
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
