#### QUICK CHANGE FOR A STUDIO BED

For the black and white plaid denim cover here, pillows and bolsters might combine black and white or black and white and bright colors, and the black might be velveteen.

For the Little Guy

The nursery, whether it is a separate room, or a corner in mother's room, should be carefully planned for the baby's well being—and mother's, as well. Light and air are the matters of first consideration. Crib should be placed where sun will not shine in baby's eyes during sleep. Venetian blinds and/or traverse curtains provide wonderful light control for this area. Use a standing floor screen, if needed, for draft protection.

Safety is of major importance here. A linoleum floor, painted or splatter-dashed in gay colors, is easily kept clean. SHOULD NEVER BE WAXED. Small unanchored rugs are dangerous—they are prone to slide around and have been the cause of many accidents.

Several factors have been combined to put the nursery sketched above "in character." Walls have been covered with pale yellow-and-blue washable wallpaper.

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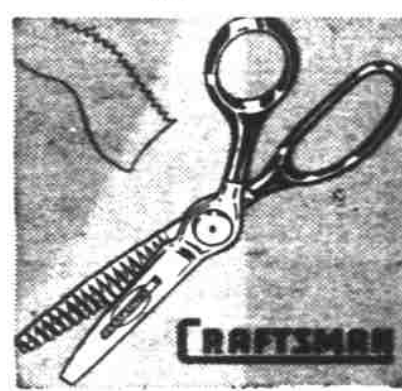
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
