Three-Day 4-H Tour Includes Mt. Hood Visit

Everything from cow pastures to timberland will be enjoyed by the 40 4-H boys and girls who are taking the North Willamette Valley livestock and crops tour on July 24-26, Anthol Riney, Marion County 4-H director, reported this weekend in announcing plans for the event.

The tour is open to all livestock and crop club members, Riney stated, but the space is somewhat limited. A quota was set up with 30 for Marion County and 10 for Salem. No more will be taken, Riney said, as he urged all of those planning to go to let him know by July 18.

The total cost of the trip for each member, payable at the start or in advance of the tour, is \$7. Youngsters will use a bed roll or sleeping bag at night.

The group will assemble at 8 a.m., Thursday, July 24, at the 4-H office in Salem and by 8:30 be on the road toward the first stop, Milwaukie, where the International Harvester Assembly Depot will be visited. A sack lunch (which each member is to bring) will be enjoyed at Westmoreland Park. That afternoon the Gresham area including berry fields and pastures will be visited, with a swim, supper and camping at the Gresham Fairgrounds.

On the second day of the tour the Portland Union Stock Yards will be visited prior to going to Bonneville, where lunch will be served, fish ladders, dam and power plant inspected before going to Hood River for the usual swim, supper and camping.

Early Saturday morning Hood River rural area will be visited with the group to be on the road for Government Camp (lunch en route) by 11 a.m. A big feature at Government Camp will be the cable car ride to Timberline Lodge and back.

The schedule calls for the group to be back at Salem between 5 and 6 o'clock on Saturday night, July 26.

Some club leaders and others will accompany to assist with the "gang", Riney reported.

Europe Tour Scheduled by Dr. Anderson

The Olympic Games, an international convention and a visit to displaced persons' camps in Germany are ahead during the next month for Dr. Robert F. Anderson of Salem.

Anderson, chairman of the physical education committees of Salem YMCA and the Northwest Area YM, will leave by air Tuesday night for a five-week North European tour.

The area YM is sponsoring his attendance at the Olympics and an international YM convention on health and physical education, both at Helsinki, Finland. From New York and back he will travel with a study tour from Springfield, Mass. YM College, which this year will include the games.

Anderson also has made contact with YM leaders in Germany, where he is to visit DP camps for former East German residents who have escaped to West Germany. He said they had notified him some 160,000 of these were in the camps now. He will spend more than a week in Germany, France and Belgium.

During the trip Anderson will shoot about 2,000 feet of colored motion picture film for the use of YMCA organizations.

Death Takes Mrs. O'Keefe

Death of Mrs. Elizabeth O'Keefe of Portland, mother of a former pastor of St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church here, was learned Sunday.

Solemn requiem mass will be Tuesday at 10 a.m. in St. Stephen's Catholic Church in Portland, where the Rev. George L. O'Keefe is pastor. He will be celebrant of the mass. Burial will be at Mt. Calvary Cemetery in Portland. Recitation of the rosary will be tonight at 8 at the residence, 4023 S.E. Taylor St.

The Rev. Mr. O'Keefe was at St. Vincent's from 1945 to 1950. Other survivors include two other sons and three daughters, two of whom are members of the church order of Sisters of the Presentation.

Warren Delegation Eyes Compromise Possibility

CHICAGO (AP)—A vigorous band of Californians went to work Sunday to talk up Gov. Earl Warren as a compromise candidate and "a man who can win."

Each of the 70 Warren-pledged delegates from the Golden State set out on a political mission. Their assignment: To invite other delegations to meet the governor.

Warren himself spent a busy second day in this mad convention town.

He reiterated that he's not in Chicago to make any deals with his 76 pledged delegates—six of them from Wisconsin.

And once more he said there was no truth to stories that he has entered into an alliance with Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and Harold E. Stassen.

"I'm not going to be in any coalition," he said in a television interview.

"If I don't get the nomination, I don't want to be in the role of kingmaker."

Warren said he saw no reason to rule himself out of the running. "We came to Chicago with 76 pledged votes and there possibly may be a few more on the first ballot," he said. "No one knows what will happen from that point on."

Do his chances look any better now that he's here?

"I feel the situation is as good as I can expect it to be," he replied.

Thomas J. Mellon of San Francisco, vice chairman of the California delegation, told a reporter he has found "a very friendly attitude" toward Warren's candidacy by supporters of both Eisenhower and Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio. He said delegates from Oregon, Connecticut and New Jersey had shown interest in the California governor as a second choice.

Another California delegate, Mrs. Mildred Younger of Los Angeles, said delegates who want to see the Republicans win in November are "becoming more and more interested in Gov. Warren because he has refused to involve himself in splitting the party."

She referred to the Taft-Eisenhower battle over disputed delegations. Warren is siding with Eisenhower forces in their attempt to prevent contested delegates from voting on the seating of other disputed delegates.

"It happens to be the Eisenhower position," the governor said, "but I would feel the same if it were the position of any other candidate."

Funeral Rites Scheduled for Mrs. Becken

Funeral services for Mrs. Rahno Louise Becken, 48, former resident of Independence who was killed Friday night in an automobile accident near St. Paul, will be held in the Hodson Mortuary in Newberg at 2 p.m. (DST) Wednesday.

The Rev. Donald McIntire will officiate and interment will be in Belcrest Memorial Park in Salem.

Mrs. Becken, and her husband operated the Becken Dairy in Independence until October 1950. She was born in New Brunswick, Canada, Feb. 8, 1904, but spent her youth in Long Island, N. Y. She married Ben F. Becken Aug. 22, 1927. He died Aug. 1, 1951.

They had lived in Independence since 1928 and Mrs. Becken moved to Newberg following her husband's death. She was a member of the Pythian Lodge of Independence.

Surviving are daughters, Mrs. Doris E. Backland and Mrs. Joyce Bell, both of Newberg and Mrs. Marjorie J. Young of Salem; three grandchildren and three brothers in Canada.

BREMERHAVEN, Germany (AP)—The U. S. Army transport Gen. Maurice Rose limped into port Sunday after a short-lived fire destroyed part of her engines at sea.

Naval officials said the blaze, which broke out Saturday, could easily have caused disaster. They praised the crew and the 1,600 troops and their dependents aboard for great courage.

No one was injured.

Tokyo Fire Believed Started Deliberately

TOKYO (AP)—Four barracks buildings at the former Hamamatsu military aviation school were destroyed by fire Sunday and police believe the blaze was deliberately set, the newspaper Asahi said Monday.

The school is about 120 miles southwest of Tokyo and recently was turned over to the armed police reserve, Japan's defense force.

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Rebels Leave Gen. de Gaulle

PARIS (AP)—A sizeable bloc of rebels pulled out of Gen. Charles de Gaulle's Rally of the French People (RPF) Sunday to form their own party. Their move tumbled the general's supporters from top numerical position in Parliament.

The bolt highlighted the closing day of an RPF National Council session here. Reports said the rebels totaled about 55, including 35 in the National Assembly and 20 in the Council of the Republic, France's upper house.

Mossadegh Reappointed

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Iran's lawmakers Sunday overwhelmingly approved the reappointment of Prime Minister Mohammed Mossadegh to another term at the helm of this crisis-ridden country of virtually padlocked oil riches.

The under-strength Majlis—lower house of Parliament—with only 76 of its normal 130 seats filled gave the fiery Nationalist leader a wide majority of 52 votes.

Two other votes went to former Prime Minister Ahmed Qavam and another to former Iranian ambassador to Washington, Nasrollah Entezam. There were 10 absences and 11 deputies were absent.

Learn-to-Swim Program Set At Two Pools

Those who want to learn to swim, or improve, will have their choice beginning today, at Salem's two out-door pools, in the annual campaign. Sponsors of the free program are Marion County Chapter of the Red Cross and the city-school playgrounds.

In past years as many as 700 have begun the training, and from one-fourth to one-third have passed the final tests, according to Vernon Gilmore, recreation director.

Instruction will be Monday through Friday for two weeks, at both Leslie and Olinger pools.

Boys' classes are at 10 a.m. for intermediates and beginners, 12 years and up; 11, beginners, 12 to 12 years; 1 p.m., beginners, 6 and 7.

Girls classes are at 10:30 a.m. for intermediates and beginners, 12 and up; 11:30 a.m., beginners, 8 to 12; 1:30 p.m., beginners, 6 and 7 years.

Combined classes are at 2 p.m. for boy and girl swimmers.

Junior and senior lifesaving classes are from 6 to 7 p.m., and adults, both beginners and swimmers at 7 p.m.
