NEW YORK (AP)—Wes Santee, a 20-year-old University of Kansas sophomore, and Hustlin' Hank Laskau, perennial walking champion, smashed three American track records between them Sunday as the United States Olympic team went through its final workout before departing for Helsinki. It all was to pull in some funds for the team which leaves Monday and Tuesday for the July 19-Aug. 8 games. Santee whizzed around the track in 2:58.2 for three-quarters of a mile. This bettered the American record of 2:58.7 set by Paul Moore of Stanford in 1940. In the process, Santee covered two-thirds of a mile in 2:39.3. The former mark

in that one was 2:42.2 by Bill Hulse of New York University in 1943. Santee will compete in the 5,000-meter run in the Olympics. He didn't try for the 1,500-meter run in the Olympics. PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Sturdy Kid Gavilan ruled a solid 8½ to 5 favorite Sunday to turn back the title bid of 21-year-old Gil Turner Monday night in the third defense of his world's welterweight championship. Because of the tremendous gate appeal of Turner, a home town boy fighting for the 147-pound crown, Promoter Herman Taylor predicted a welter record gate of \$300,000 from 40,000 rabid fans. The 15-round bout is scheduled for 9:00 p.m.

Turner, a tireless buzzsaw who has knocked out 25 men while winning all of his 31 pro fights, counts on youth, punching speed and stamina to wear down the 26-year-old champ from Havana. It will be Turner's first 15-rounder if it goes the route.

The mishaps to Shantz and Reynolds, who were the Nos. 1 and 2 pitching choices of Casey Stengel caused the Yankee manager to look elsewhere for his starter. It was expected that Casey would name Bob Lemon (7-7), Cleveland Indians' right-hander, to hurl the first three innings. National League Pilot Leo Durocher also was expected to switch his opening pitching choice. Originally hopeful of starting Robin Roberts, ace Phil-

lies' right-hander, Durocher was forced to change his plans when Roberts worked Sunday against the New York Giants.

He may nominate Roberts' southpaw colleague, Curt Simmons (7-2).

The fast balling ex-GI has not pitched since Tuesday when he blanked the Boston Braves on two hits. He is the most rested of all National League All-Star pitchers. Starting pitchers and lineups will be announced Monday noon.

The New York Yankees halved a twin-bill with the Philadelphia Athletics and remained three games ahead in the American League. The Yanks won the first game, 5-2, but dropped the second, 7-6.
