Maj. Wilson J. Wilt, Sr., 48, long-time Salem resident, died Saturday in Eugene, where he had lived for the past two years. He and Mrs. Wilt had lived in Salem for many years prior to moving to Eugene. A veteran of the European campaign in World War II, Maj. Wilt retired from the Army several years ago. He was the son of J. B. Wilt of Newberg and the late Ella M. Wilt, who died in Salem a year ago.

The deceased was born Jan. 8, 1904, in West Virginia. Death was attributed to a heart attack. Survivors in addition to the father and widow, Irene, include daughters, Miss Helen Wilt and Mrs. Beverly Ewing, both of Eugene, and son, Wilson Wilt Jr. of Salem.

Funeral services will be held in Eugene Wednesday at 10:30 a. m. (DST) at the Simon-Lounsbury Funeral Home. Graveside services will follow in Salem at 3:30 p. m. (PST) at Belcrest Memorial Park with the Rev. Lloyd Anderson officiating and under direction of the Howell-Edwards Chapel.

Senator Bain Judged Guilty

State Sen. John Henry (Jack) Bain of Portland was adjudged guilty Monday on a charge of driving while intoxicated when he appeared in Marion County District Court.

The senator, who is up for reelection on the Democratic ticket, was fined \$250. He stood trial without a jury in Judge Val Sloper's court.

Bain was arrested early on Jan. 25 by state police on the Pacific Highway at Gervais Junction. At his trial Monday he denied he was intoxicated.
