

Ritchey Ties For Bat Lead

Luby Breaks Fielding Record in WI League

Vancouver Catcher John Ritchey, the WIL's leading hitter of 1951, climbed into a tie for the lead with Wenatchee's Walt Poceyay through June 30, according to figures released by the Howe News Bureau of Chicago. Both Ritchey and Poceyay were hitting .351 at that time.

Mel Wasley of Spokane was next at .346, and Manager Hugh Luby of Salem was behind Wasley at .335.

Victoria's Granny Gladstone took over the leadership in home runs with 8 and in runs batted in with 58. Poceyay had most hits, 94, total bases, 139, and doubles, 21.

Hugh Luby, Salem manager, broke a record that had stood the test of time for 11 years on June 26 when he participated in his 29th consecutive game at second base without making an error. Through games of Monday, June 30, Luby had extended it to 32 games.

The old record of 28 games was set by Frank Kolski of Yakima, from July 17 through August 12, 1941.

Salem continued as top fielding team with a 97.2 percentage, nine higher than Tri-City. The Senators also led in double plays with 81.

U.S. Flag Goes Up

Russ Lower Iron Curtain At Olympic Helsinki Home

HELSINKI (AP)—A screen of "Red" tape was raised Monday to shield Communist athletes from Western eyes before their appearance at the Olympic Stadium on July 19.

Although only a handful of athletes and technicians have arrived at the Eastern lands' separate training camp at Otaniemi, it is now increasingly evident that opportunities to watch them train or interview them will be hard to come by, if not impossible.

Originally, the procedure was to contact the Otaniemi camp commandant and he was supposed to relay requests for interviews to team captains.

The new method is to contact first the Olympic attaché of the country in question and obtain his permission to begin negotiations with the camp commandant.

Efforts to contact the Soviet Olympic attaché were unavailing. He was reported ill.

HELSINKI, Finland (AP)—The American flag was raised over the Olympic village for the first time Monday.

It flew for the Puerto Rican team of 23 members which arrived here over the week-end. The games run from July 19 through Aug. 3.

The Canadian, Korean and Pakistan flags also were hoisted for the first time. This brought the number of flags flying over the Olympic village to six. The Japanese and Ceylonese banners went up Saturday.

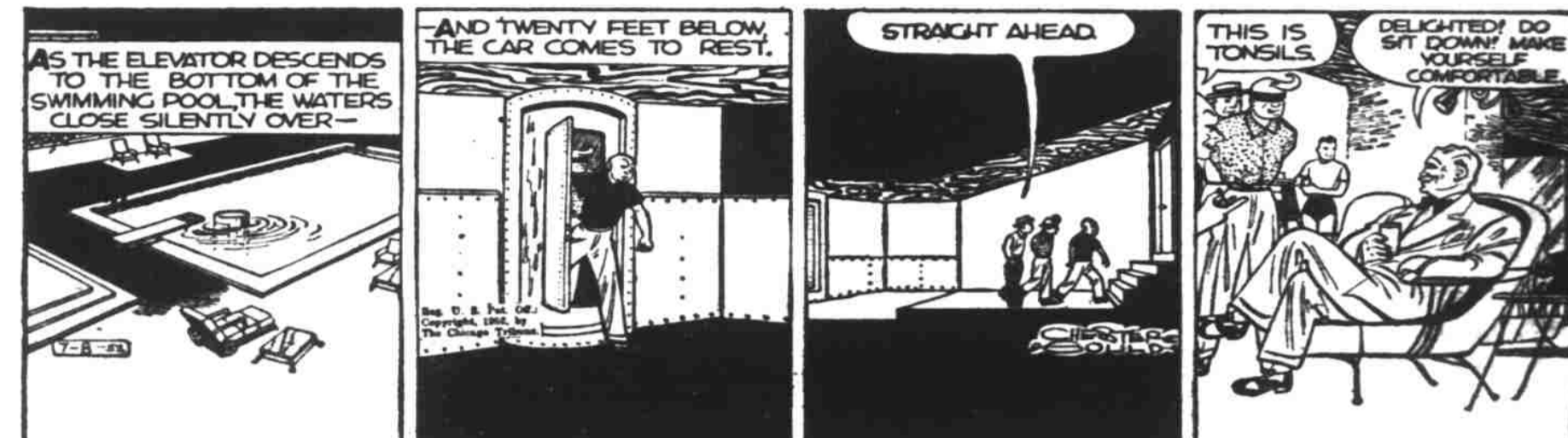

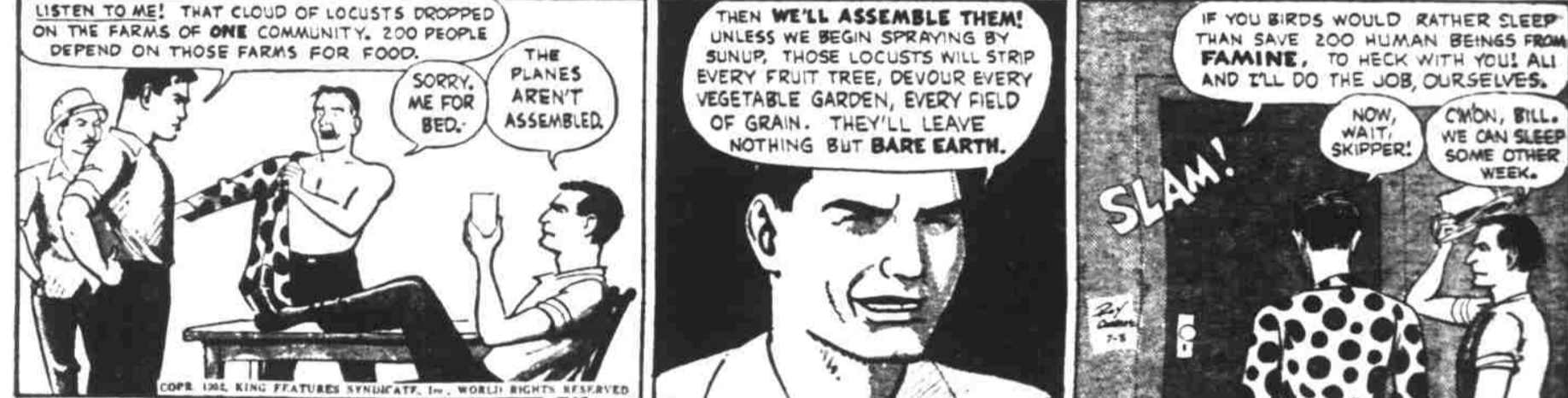
