

Oregon Group Eager for Vote To Get Ike In, Cut Expenses

CHICAGO—Oregon delegates, riding high on a wave of confidence that Eisenhower is virtually in, and impatient for the kill, prepared themselves Wednesday evening for an all-night session.

William L. Phillips, Salem, chairman of Oregon for Eisenhower committee, packed a light lunch—one ham sandwich in each coat pocket. "This one's for supper," said Phillips, sampling the pickle, "and this one's for breakfast."

Mark Hatfield, however, wasn't hungry for anything but victory. The legislator found the first day that the amphitheater air conditioner worked too well. He caught cold and has been dosing himself with pills since.

Oregon's anxiety to get on with the presidential nomination sprang from its feeling that Ike will win on the second ballot, but also from a desire to head off a prolongation of feuding that might drag the convention beyond their means.

Several Oregon delegates estimated their trek to Chicago was going to run the price of their party service to nearly \$1,000, including costs of their primary campaigns for delegates.

Sample convention cost: breakfast at Palmer House, a standard practice of the delegation starting each day—\$2.85 per plate; bus ticket for daily trips to amphitheater—\$5; hotel rooms—\$10 to \$17 and up; ticket to Chicago and back from Oregon—\$200.

One consolation was free orange juice at Warren headquarters.

Two Convicts Leave Cherry Picking Gang

Two young inmates of Oregon State Prison were being sought early today by police after the pair walked away from a cherry-picking gang Wednesday afternoon.

Prison officials identified the pair as Joseph Baker, 19, serving a three-year sentence for burglary, and Larry Powell, 18, serving a three-year sentence for larceny.

The pair were members of a convict work crew at the Mott Cherry Farm west of Lincoln. They slipped away from the crew at about 2 p.m. Prison guards and state police began an immediate search of the area.

Baker, who was received at the prison April 6, 1951, was described at 5 feet 8 and weighing 163 pounds. Powell, who came to the prison on Nov. 17, 1951, is 6 feet 1 and weighs 162. Both men were dressed in prison garb of blue jeans and striped shirts.

Salem Firemen Learning All About Pumps

Salem firemen are being familiarized with the working of fire pumps at a pump school conducted by Earl Albright, Corvallis, representative of the State Vocational Division.

Albright has been conducting classes at the central and east fire stations and outdoor classes on Mill Creek near the stadium. In familiarizing the staff with the workings of main pumps and auxiliary boosters, Albright uses working models of the pumps to show the parts within the pump, how they work, and what happens when pressure is boosted within the unit.

The school, part of the firemen's training program, was begun Monday and is to end Friday. Members of rural districts have been invited by Salem Fire Chief William P. Roble, and the school has been made available to all members of his department.

Demo Labels GOP 'Brawl'

As for the GOP convention, Kerr said: "The warring factions demonstrated that they are unable to develop anything but another split, and that they are totally unable to unify their own party or inspire the confidence and support of the American people."

Morse Blasts 2 Planks of GOP Platform

CHICAGO (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse (R-Ore.), a member of the Oregon delegation to the Republican convention, Wednesday criticized the Republican Party's civil rights and foreign policy platform planks.

"The foreign policy plank is too wordy and can be described as a zigzag, fence jumping route for the party to travel in the fall campaign," he said.

Of the civil rights plank, Morse said "It fails to meet directly and head-on the issue that confronts the party. In 1952 as it confronted Lincoln in 1860. The issue then was whether the nation could survive half slave and half free. The issue now is whether the nation can survive under a system of first class citizens vs. second class citizens."

Morse last month at the organizational meeting of the Oregon delegation was defeated by State Rep. Mark Hatfield, Salem, for the Oregon seat on the national platform committee.

Hatfield, who was a member of the subcommittee which worked on the foreign policy and civil rights planks, said they were "good constructive, positive platforms on which we can go to the people in 1952 and really fight."

Truman 'Afraid'
Taft May Lose
GOP Nomination

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman voiced mock fear Wednesday that his "favorite candidate," Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio, might be defeated for the Republican presidential nomination.

The president tore himself away from his television set at the White House, where he had been watching proceedings of the Republican National Convention, to make a hurried trip to the Washington airport. There he met Secretary of State Acheson upon his return from an European tour and another trip to Brazil.

Talking with the state department officials as he awaited Acheson's arrival, he grinningly told them: "I'm worried. It looks like my favorite candidate is going to get beat."
