

Summerfield Eyed for Top GOP Position

CHICAGO (AP)—A new Republican National Committee was formally named Friday night, and Arthur Summerfield of Michigan was reliably reported to be in line for the chairmanship.

Summerfield, whose last-minute public swing to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower added firepower to the general's first ballot blitz at the national convention, was said to be the first choice for the job if he wants it.

Also in line for a prominent role in the Eisenhower campaign is another man who gave the general's nomination campaign help at critical points—Sinclair Weeks of Massachusetts. He recently came out for the general and urged Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio to withdraw from the race.

Leaders close to Eisenhower said either man could have his choice of jobs. They added that the two probably will sit down with the general to talk the matter over before the national committee meets Saturday to reorganize.

At that time a successor for Guy G. Gabrielson, present chairman, will be chosen and the first move made to add about 31 members to the committee.

These will be the state chairmen of those states which elected (a) Republican governors or (b) a GOP majority among their members of the committee. It also will put men in the majority on the committee, which previously had been divided equally among men and women with one from each state.

Washington's representation on the national committee remained unchanged, with Harlan I. Peyton, Spokane, and Mrs. Neal Tourtelotte, Seattle, as members.

Oregon's representatives are Jesse Gard, Portland, and Mrs. Marshall E. Cornett, Klamath Falls. Gard replaces Ralph Calk, Portland, who retired.

Both states were in the Eisenhower camp.

Noise Gives Eisenhower Extra Votes

CHICAGO (AP)—Because of the noise at the Republican National Convention, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower got four more votes on the official tally than were intended for him.

On the official tabulation, all of Maryland's 24 were listed for Ike. Gov. Theodore McKeldin said that when Maryland's turn came on the roll call he called out that the delegation stood 20 to 4 for Eisenhower, but the tally clerk apparently didn't hear the "to" between the figures.

Thus Ike's total came out 845 instead of the correct 841.

It will go into the record books that way, but it doesn't make much difference. The convention later made the nomination unanimous by acclamation.

Deputies Evict Mrs. Stevens From Property

LAPEER, Mich. (AP)—Graying, 60-year-old Mrs. Elizabeth Stevens was evicted Friday from the 80-acre Lapeer County farm she had defended through 17 years of legal warfare.

She was dragged, screaming, clawing and biting by Sheriff Clark Gregory and a deputy after a family assault on the officers that resulted in two arrests and minor injuries.

The eviction was twice postponed when Gov. Williams' office bargained unsuccessfully for a settlement with Mrs. Grace White, a local attorney. She bought the Stevens farm at auction for \$500, after Mrs. Stevens refused to pay a \$172 assessment levied following the 1935 failure of the Lapeer Farmers Mutual Fire Insurance Association.

On June 2, Gregory and a deputy were thrown off the Stevens property by 50 angry and sympathetic farmers.

Portland Gets TV Go-Ahead

WASHINGTON (AP)—Portland got the go-ahead signal Friday for its first television station.

The Federal Communications Commission, authorizing stations for 14 cities now without TV, granted a construction permit in Portland for the Empire Coll. Co. of New Rochelle, N. Y. The TV grants Friday were the first in four years.

The station will be on channel 27, which is the ultra high frequency band.

That was one of five commercial channels allotted Portland. It was the only one of the five for which there was no contest.

At least two stations are competing for each of the other channels. They are: Channel 6—KGW, KOIN and KXL; Channel 8—KEX, and Portland Television, Inc.; Channel 12—KPOJ and Oregon Television, Inc.; Channel 21—KVAN and KGON.

Hearings will be held before the FCC awards these channels.

Bad Checks Just Won't Stay Down

If there's anything bad luck to Maurice Hamersky, it's rubber checks.

Friday city police arrested him on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses in connection with two bad checks, totaling \$30. He was held in lieu of \$2,000 bail. Just four days ago he got out of jail after serving a six-month sentence for the same trouble.

He had to serve that sentence because of some more bouncing checks. Six months ago, right after Hamersky had been put on parole, city police arrested him for obtaining money under false pretenses.

Fourteen Big Fires in State During 1951

Fourteen fires in 1951 caused 21.41 per cent of Oregon's insured fire damage, State Fire Marshal Robert Taylor reported Wednesday in his annual report to Gov. Douglas McKay.

All of these 14 losses were in excess of \$100,000. Loss of life by fire again maintained total of 70 as against 71 in 1950, Taylor said. Fires in and around Oregon dwelling and rooming houses caused 56 of the 70 deaths and one-third of all property loss during the year.

Total losses by fire during 1951 were \$894,815 less than in 1950 which represents a decrease of 8 per cent but is approximately 38 per cent over the average for the past 10 years.

About 30 million people visited the U.S. national forests for recreational purposes in 1951.

Survivors include sons James W. Clayton, Salem; Alvin L. Clayton, Portland; daughter, Mrs. R. B. Stone, Corvallis; Mrs. Don C. Harger, Salem.

Services for Mrs. Clayton, who was a past matron of the Eastern Star and a member of the Methodist Church, will be announced later by Clough-Barrick Funeral Home.

Can Shortage Worries Big Farm Groups

PORTLAND (AP) — Leaders of Oregon's three major farm organizations are to meet here Saturday to discuss plans for averting loss of the state's canning crop.

George Dewey of the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation called the meeting after canning interests reported that their supply of cans, cut off by the steel strike, was not large enough to handle the state string bean crop.

Representatives from the Grange and Farmers Union as well as canners, wholesalers, retailers and consumers organizations are to attend.

Cecil Tulley, executive vice president of the Northwest Canners Association, reported that the industry has estimated that 20 million cases of canned foods will be lost for every week after July 1 that production of tinplate by steel mills is cut off.

Ike Fingers Coins During Victory Count

CHICAGO (AP)—Tears welled up in Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's eyes Friday.

The tense dramatic scene in the general's Blackstone Hotel suite was described to newsmen by Eisenhower's press secretary, Robert Mullen, who was present.

Here is Mullen's account of what happened as the general watched the convention proceedings on television:

"Ike turned on television just before the balloting started and when things quieted down, he watched the proceedings with his brothers, friends and staff.

"When Oregon cast its all 18 votes for Ike, Brother Ed commented, 'my country'—an allusion to his residence in Tacoma, Wash. "All through the final stages, Ike fiddled with two coins in his fingers. I thought they were half dollars, but I asked to make sure. He tossed them to me.

"One was a Boy Scout memorial coin dated 1952, with the word 'Liberty' on one side and a Boy Scout message on the other. The other coin was a Salvation Army piece, with a cross on one side and the word, 'God' on the other side.

"Ike put them back in his pocket as the count ended and seemed rather quiet and relaxed until Minnesota was recognized. Herb Brownell leaped across the room and was the first to congratulate Ike.

"He (Ike) shook hands with his staff and, with tears coming to his eyes, he walked into the next room to see Mamie.

"He then phoned Taft." Mamie is the general's wife, who watched the proceedings on television in an adjoining room with a group of friends.
