She married George B. King in Seattle, Wash., in March, 1918. He died in 1936. Mrs. King, "Gram" King to her neighbors and friends in North Salem, had been ill with a heart ailment for some time and was taken to the hospital last Sunday.

Survivors include a son, J. E. Poag, Crescent Lake; a daughter, Mrs. Florence Wilson, Salem; seven grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren. Announcement of services is to be made later by the W. T. Rigdon Company.

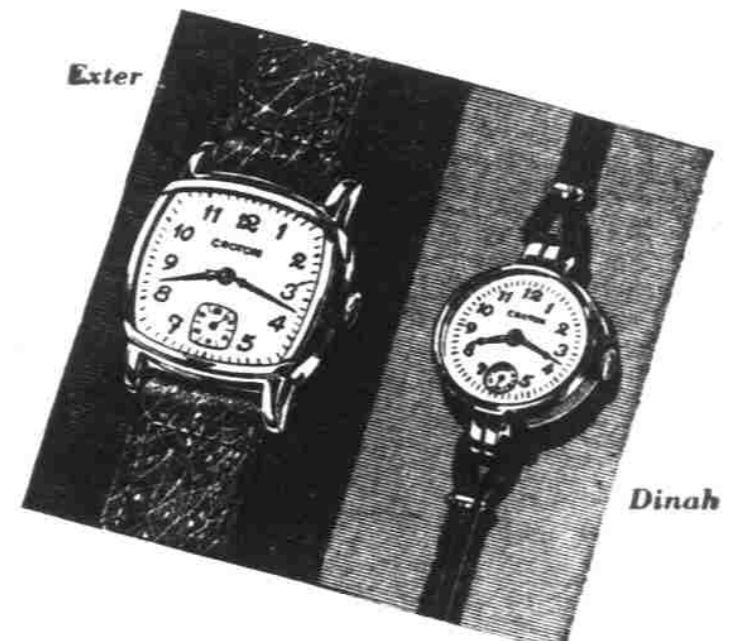

Annual Dog Show Draws Record List

With the largest entry list in its 16-year history the Salem Lions Club annual dog show and obedience trials will be held at the State Fairgrounds on Sunday, July 20.

The one-day show will be out-of-doors in the grove of trees at the Silverton Road entrance to the grounds. The show will be "unbenched," meaning dogs will not be confined to cages or stalls.

Nearly 1,000 exhibitors with about 600 dogs of the "blue blood variety," are entered in the class. Entries are now closed. A total of 65 of the 100 breeds of dogs recognized by the American Kennel Club are included in the entry list, show officials said.

Judging will start at 9 a.m., and will continue without recess until 7 p.m. Judges are Roy M. Cowan, Fresno, Calif.; E. T. Adair, Pittsburgh, Pa.; Vincent Perry, Hollywood, Calif.; William M. Jones, North Hollywood, Calif.; and Kenneth H. Dyer, San Francisco, Calif., all recognized authorities on dogs.

A special feature of the show will be the hurdle, run by teams

of small dogs competing with large ones. Tentative plans for this program set one race at 1:30 p.m. and one at 5 p.m.

Obedience demonstrations and drills are slated to start at noon and continue to 5 p.m. Exact times of various judging and other events will be announced later, show officials said.

Lions Auxiliary will serve food all day starting at 8 a.m. with a breakfast at the fairgrounds coffee shop, adjacent to the dog exhibition area. Proceeds of the show go into the fund which Lions use to assist needy blind persons.

The Lions committee heading the show include C. A. Schaefer, J. H. Willett and Sheriff Denver Young.

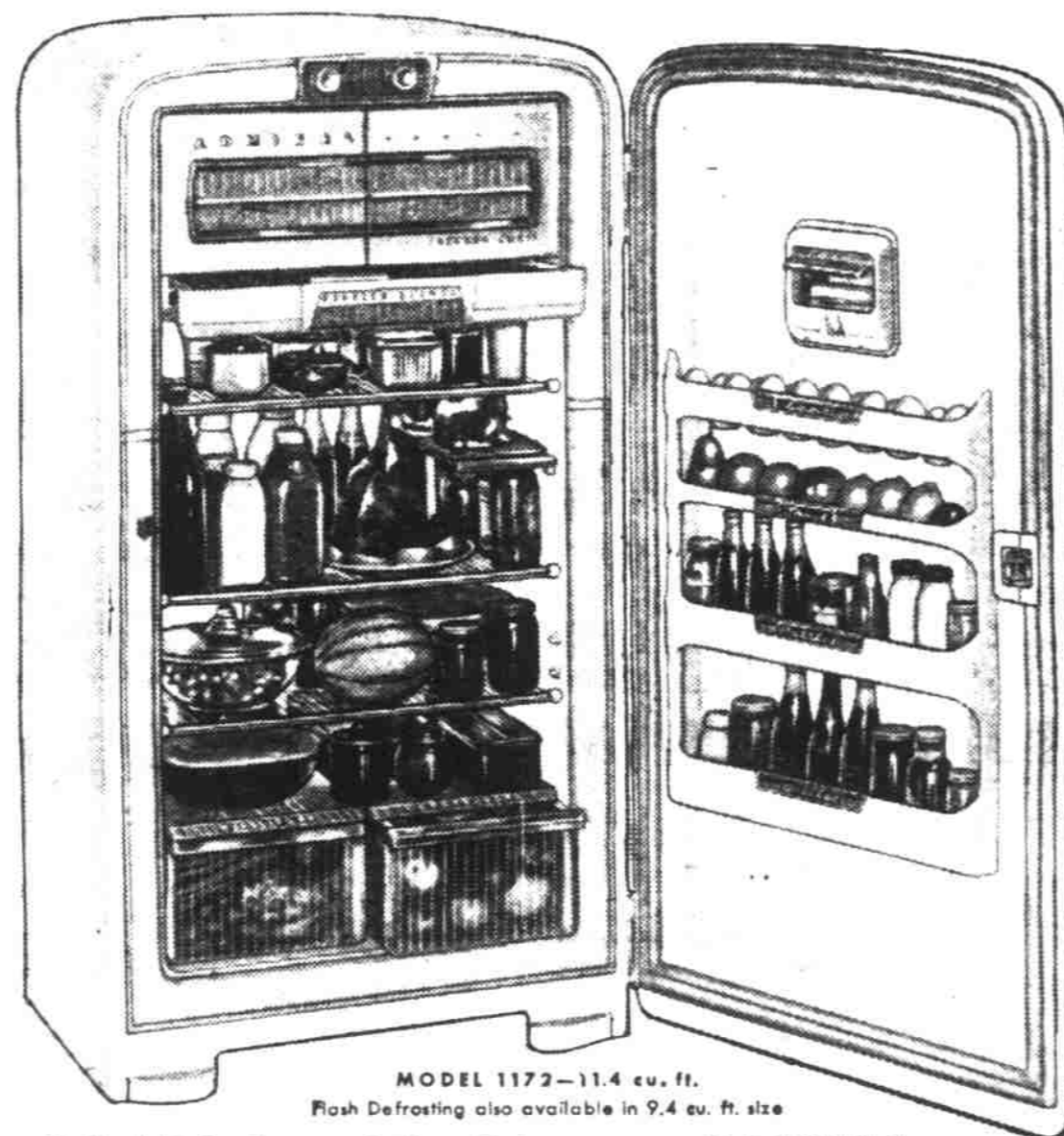

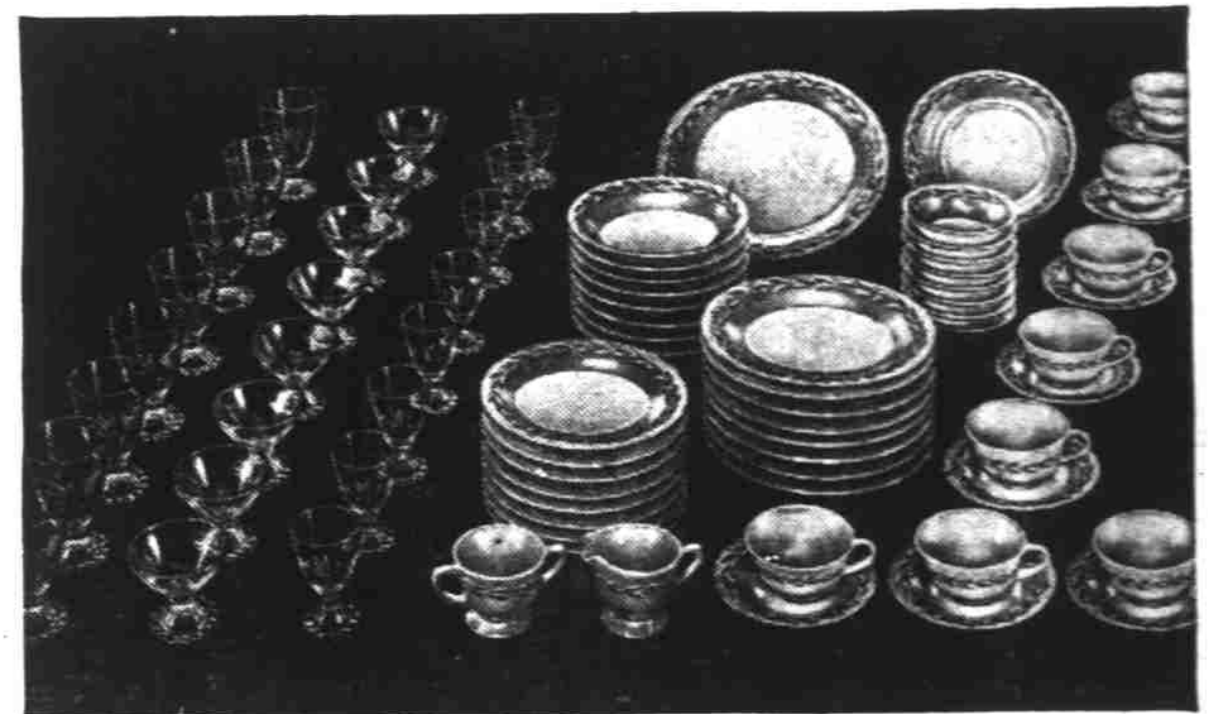
