

West Salem Bus Line Requests Rate Boost

Higher fares for West Salem Bus Co. were asked of the City Council Monday night in a letter from the bus firm. Public hearing was set for July 28 at City Hall.

Council members at their regular session last night heard these West Salem bus proposals:

Raise fares from 10 to 12 cents and children's fares from 5 to 6 cents.

Allow tokens to be sold at 2 for 23 cents or 4 for 44 cents.

Eliminate the 12:15 a.m. trip weekdays, the 11:15 p.m. trip Sundays. These are now the last runs.

Eliminate the 1:15 p.m. trip Sundays.

The bus company operates half-hourly service between the west-side and downtown Salem.

Another hearing was set for July 28, regarding service of City Transit Lines, over a request from 125 Mapleton Addition residents for a route change. They want the Keizer bus to cross from Front to Broadway Streets via Tryon Avenue (in the Mapleton area) and use Broadway into the downtown area.

Final action was taken to vacate North Summer Street between Cheneketa and Center Streets so the state can extend the Capitol Mall (sunken garden) one block. Board of Control Secretary Roy Mills told the Council the state is ready to let a contract for the work.

Other bills passed Monday night allow Miss Mildred Christensen to build a duplex on Judson Street near Mountain View Drive; Southside Veterinary Hospital, 2740 S. Commercial St., to widen its driveway, and Ed Anderson to place a small temporary building on a new used car lot to be established at Cheneketa and Commercial Streets.

Action was deferred on a Highway Avenue controversy over requested commercial driveways. Both property owners interested in paving their street and firms asking oversized driveways will be heard at the July 28 Council session, Mayor Alfred Loucks said.

The bill for special service driveways for Willamette Valley Transfer and Chuck's Tavern on Highway Avenue is sponsored in Council by the mayor and seven of the eight aldermen.

Thirty-two residents of Stortz Addition recently annexed to Salem at north city limits along the Pacific Highway were informed by the Council there are no funds for sewer service they request.

City Manager Fritzen said the \$25,000 sewer project was among items turned down by voters at the recent city election.

The Council authorized these items last night:

Approximately \$12,000 for a dike to protect a sewer pumping station near the west end of the Marion Street bridge, the state's contractor to do the work.

Made Rural Avenue a through street from Commercial to 12th, except at High Street where stop signs would go on all four corners.

A memorial resolution on the death of former police chief Frank A. Minto.

Resolution protecting from cross traffic the part of Center Street from Commercial to the river which will be part of the reconstructed bridge across the Willamette after the new Marion Street bridge is finished.

A 70-foot loading zone for

Oregon Pulp and Paper Co. on the west side of Front Street.

The Council rejected two liquor license applications—a package license asked by William A. Scott for the new Hollywood Market and a class B package license for Edward C. Hawkins' market at 1120 S. 12th. The license committee recommended the former be reconsidered in six months after the business had become established and the latter be considered for a class A license which permits beer sales only.

Elderly Pastor Starts Anew

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—The Rev. Charles A. Logan, a bantamweight 77-year-old Presbyterian minister, has been a minister for 53 years and is still rarin' to go.

He recently came back from a 12,000-mile tour of Japan during which he preached in 200 cities to 35,000 persons. Now he's headed for the suburbs of Nashville, Tenn. to start a church from scratch.

"I never take another man's pulpit," he said. "I start a church of my own. It's sort of like raising children. You raise them, train them, educate them—then you turn them over to somebody else for nothing."

Libya Area Faces Famine

BENGHAZI, Libya (AP)—The Department of Agriculture has estimated that Libya's crops will be only 40 per cent of the 1951 total which was regarded as a lean year.

This will be the third successive year that Libya's farm production has suffered from bad weather and the lack of moisture. There is already some talk of famine conditions prevailing in the fledgling state within the year.

In 1951 there was only 3 1/4 inches of rainfall in Libya. This year there has been nearly 5 3/5 inches. But a dry desert wind occurred consistently during and after the spring rains, and has dried up a substantial portion of the water.

City Aldermen To Attend Gille Rites in Group

City aldermen and city officials will attend in a group the funeral services for Alderman Albert H. Gille who died Sunday. The service will be at 2 p.m. in Virgil T. Golden Chapel.

Aldermen marked the death of their colleague by adopting a memorial resolution Monday night at their City Hall meeting. And as Alderman Gille's name was called in the roll call at the outset, the council and audience rose for a moment's silence. At the late alderman's vacant desk in the Council Chamber was a white carnation in a vase.

The Council resolution praised Gille's contributions to city government during the 10 years he served as alderman. The resolution cited the time and effort he had spent "at the sacrifice of his health" and identified Gille as a constant antagonist for those seeking special influence or favors from the Council.

Selection of a successor to Gille as alderman from the second ward will be up to the City Council, pending the next city election for aldermen in 1954.

New radio relay brings convention telecasts to all West Coast viewers

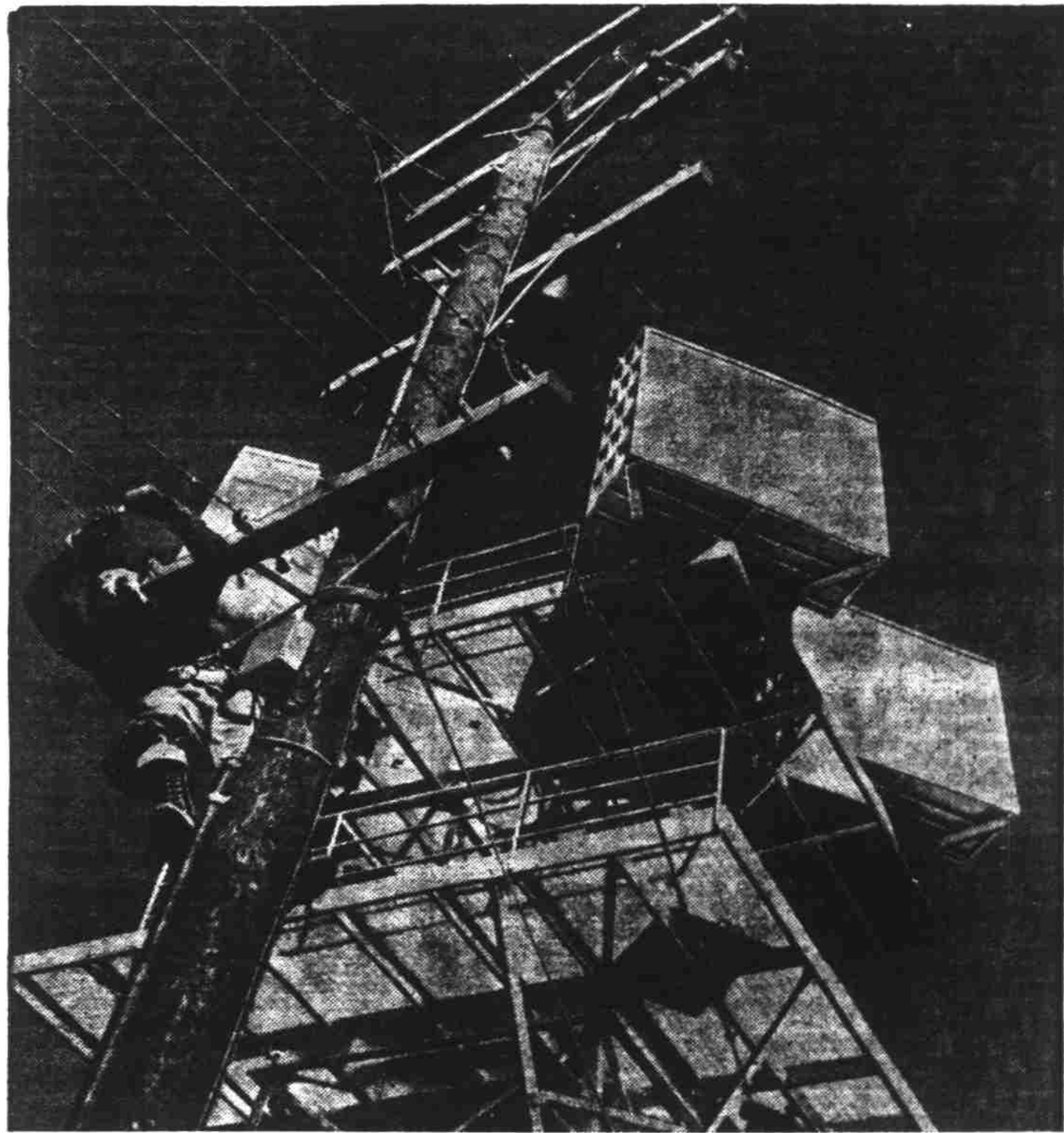
