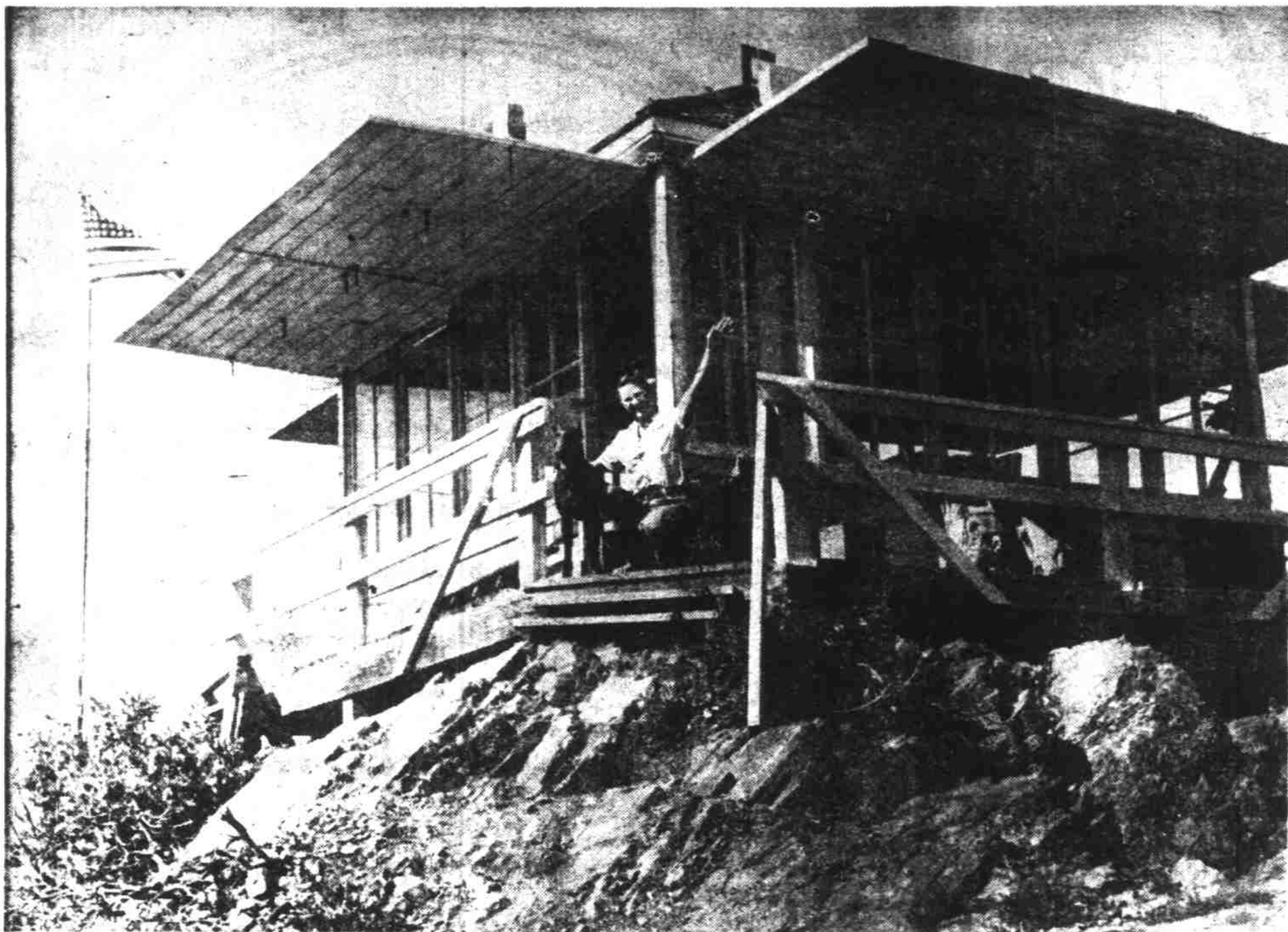


Woman Mans Fire Lookout High Above Detroit

Hayes Scores Civil Defense Apathy in Mt. Angel Speech

MT. ANGEL—Jack Hayes, Oregon director of Civil Defense, told members of the Mt. Angel Business Men's Club Monday night that people were simply not interested in civil defense and that the greater portion of the population were divided into two classes, "the ostrich and the fatalist" groups. The former, he said, closed their eyes to impending danger and the latter said, "What is the use; there is nothing you can do about it anyway."

Russian threat and explained the need for preparedness in caring for the injured and homeless that he said would far outnumber the dead in the event of an atomic attack.

Have stated that in spite of public indifference and opposition, preparedness for civil defense was much greater than a year ago and all that was lacking were volunteers to train for the work.
